First announced by UNESCO on 17th November 1999, it was formally recognized by the United Nations General Assembly with the adoption of UN resolution 56/262 Multilingualism in 2002. Mother Language Day is part of a broader initiative to promote the preservation and protection of all languages used by people of the world.

Sharda University is a hub of students coming from different parts of the world who speak different languages. The students studying at Sharda are from many different countries: Afghanistan, South Korea Burkina Faso, Ivory Coast, Nigeria, Congo, Guinea to name a few. Educational Excursion to Parliament

Department of Political Science (Ānvīkṣikī) School of Humanities and Social Science (SHSS), Sharda University has organized an Educational Excursion for the students of Political Science to Parliament (Lok Sabha), Parliament Museum and Nehru Memorial Museum & Library on 11th February 2020.

Objectives of Event:

- To acquire first-hand knowledge about the Parliamentary proceedings especially of Lok Sabha
- To provide students an opportunity to interact with Member of Parliaments.
- To know about the life and works of Pt. Nehru and other historical materials and papers pertaining to the life of nationalist leaders of modern India

Details of Proceeding while in Lok Sabha

At that point of time Lok Sabha had cleared Bill to include more tribes in ST category in Karnataka: -The CONSTITUTION (Scheduled Tribes) order (Amendment) Bill, 2019, which seeks to grant Scheduled Tribes status to certain communities in Karnataka, was passed by voice vote in the Lok Sabha on 11th February. Moving the Bill for consideration, Tribal Affairs Minister Arjun Munda said, "Certain communities in Karnataka were worried for years because they were not included in the list of Scheduled Tribes.... Parivara and Talwara belongtotheNayaka Community but they were deprived of ST category due to lack of synonyms.... Now the government has brought this proposal to expand the scope of the synonyms of Nayaka and Siddi communities".

The Bill was passed by the Rajya Sabha during the winter session. All Parties supported the Bill but the opposition demanded a comprehensive legislation for inclusion of any community in the ST list. Congress leader Adhir Ranjan Choudhary said, "We need a holistic and comprehensive legislation in so far as inclusion of any community in the Scheduled Tribe list is concerned". Trinamool Congress MP Sougata Ray raised the issue of Maoism in tribal areas, "I want to mention that one of the reasons why Maoism spread in Chhattisgarh is that big corporates like Vedanta & others are trying to grab lands in the tribal areas because tribal areas are rich in minerals. In Odisha, also Malkangiri is full of tribals and full of Maoists. This is, again, because big corporates are trying to grab land," Ray said. Earlier, opening the debate, Congress, MP Kodikunnil Suresh said, "After Independence, there was a number of communities which were included in the Scheduled Caste or the Scheduled Tribe lists. You are not enhancing the reservation facilities. The percentage of reservation has not enhanced." Shiv Sena member Arvind Sawant and NCP's Supriya Sule demanded that the Dhangar community from Maharashtra also be included in the list. Sawant also raised the issue of assaults on Marathi people in Belgaum in Karnataka.



Visit to Exhibition and Agrasen ki Baoli

Students from the Department of Sociology and Department of History (BA IV Semester), School of Humanities and Social Sciences went for an educational visit to an exhibition on 'Celebrating the 70 Years of Constitution of India' organised by SAHMAT Trust on Tuesday, February 11, 2020. The students were accompanied by faculty members, Ms. Prachi Patil, Dr.SebantiChatterjee and Dr.Sweta Singh. The exhibition helped students understand essential values that bind the India society together. Students also interacted with the exhibition curator and artist Ms. AbanRaza, who gave everyone a guided tour. The exhibition touched on various aspects of the Constitution dealing with citizenship and the ideals of freedom and secularism. After exhibition tour, students visited the nearby AgrasenkiBaoli, a 14thcentury step-well. The students were exited to explore the place as it offered a chance to integrate textual knowledge with visual experience. The structure of the medieval time step well also made them think about water conservation process and whether it can be reused in this era of water scarcity. Overall the trip was useful from the perspective of evoking thought processes of the students both in the context of constitution and architecture.

In conversation I observed that most fearful feeling was people aren't aware fully aware of the disease and how to protect themselves. Their main tension is to earn money to feed their family because they say if they won't earn they will die, not because of disease but because of hunger and poverty. Doctors who are doing treatment of diseases like this and come in contact with several people, they don't have the proper medical equipment, facilities with they should be provided to treat the ones. He said we don't need salute we just need the proper the facilities so that they can be alive to treat the ones.

Hence what I observed in my area is literacy is very important because wearing the mask isn't the solution but there must be a proper social distancing which can't be seen in rural areas. Everything can be recovered or gained but if we really want to fight against COVID 19 awareness is much important, which is almost zero in rural areas.
