It gives me great delight to release the Annual Report of Community Connect for the year 2019-20. Even though the activities were disrupted due to COVID-19, particularly in even semester of the 2019-20, we were able to successfully complete all the Community Connect projects across all Schools and Departments. Due to the national lockdown policy, which was followed by social distancing protocols, students undertook some projects online, which focused mainly on the topic of COVID-19. The efforts made by faculty and students to manage and successfully complete all the stipulated requirements is commendable. This academic year saw some notable milestones in Community Connect.

We have now established Community Connect as a separate vertical with a dedicated Professor-in-charge of the programme. Community Connect requires a continuous adaption and learning process and we will do our best to connect ourselves with our communities.

1. INTRODUCTION

India is a signatory to the global commitment to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) by 2030. The Higher Educational Institutions given their strong intellectual and social connect through students and faculty can perhaps play a significant role in advancing well-being of communities around them. It is with recognition of this role that the University Grants Commission introduced a compulsory course for all Universities to comply with a view to foster social responsibility and community engagement of HEIs in 2019. Sharda University complying with the direction of the University Grants Commission also introduced the 'Community Connect'' course and since then the programme has been introduced across all its schools.

'Community engagement', as defined by the Carnegie Foundation (Carnegie Foundation, 2020), 'is the collaboration between institutions of higher education and their larger communities for the mutually beneficial exchange of knowledge and resources in a context of partnership and reciprocity...to enrich scholarship, research, and creative activity; enhance curriculum, teaching and learning; prepare educated, engaged citizens; strengthen democratic values and civic responsibility; address critical societal issues; and contribute to the public good."

Community engagement is also often known as University Social Responsibility (USR). This too has been defined in numerous scholars.

Vasilescua, (Vasilescua, Barna, Epure, & Baicu, 2010) defines USR from the citizenship perspective, as "the need to strengthen civic commitment and active citizenship; it is about volunteering, about an ethical approach, developing a sense of civil citizenship by encouraging the students, the academic staff to provide social services to their local community or to promote ecological, environmental commitment for local and global sustainable development".

Giuffré & Ratto (Giuffré & Ratto, 2014) on the other hand define USR as "the ability of the University to disseminate and implement a set of general principles and specific values, using 4 key processes: Management, Teaching, Research and Extension, through the provision of educational services and transfer knowledge following ethical principles, good governance, respect for the environment, social engagement and the promotion of values".

The five key principles of the community engagement as required by the University Grants Commission includes:




Figure 1: Principles of Community Connect

I.I.I MUTUAL LEARNING AND RESPECT

All the Schools of the University have been arranging for visits to different villages and in the process have earned recognition for the University in the villages. Besides, it has also been carrying out various projects with a wide cross-section of stakeholders resulting in enhanced understanding between both stakeholders.

I.I.2 UNIVERSITY WIDE IN EACH FACULTY AND DISCIPLINE:

The Community Connect programme has already been introduced in all the Schools of the University without exception although the modalities of the course may differ in some schools mainly those of Medical, Dentistry, Nursing and Allied Health Sciences. These Schools have their own Community Based Medical courses mandated by their respective Councils. Further on an average, around 100 faculty members in each Semester takes part in Community Connect across the balance 10 Schools. Therefore, at least once in a year or sometimes twice in a year, a fair number of faculty in each school gets an exposure towards Community Connect

I.I.3 CREDIT BASED FOR STUDENTS

This is a 2- credit course for all students in Sharda University except in Schools of Nursing Sciences, Dental Sciences, Allied Health Sciences and Medical Sciences and Research. The course was introduced as a compulsory 2 credit course for students in 9 Schools, now 10 since School of Agricultural Sciences has also recently been set up and has students being registered for Community Connect.

1.1.4 PROVIDING CREDIT TO TEACHERS FOR ENGAGEMENT ACTIVITIES

A certain number of points are awarded to faculty for carrying out these activities which includes 5 points for visit carried by the faculty. Recently a proposal to award points for faculty guidance for projects and community connect coordination has also been introduced. It is under consideration by management.

1.1.5 LINKAGES WITH LOCAL INSTITUTIONS

The University has formally adopted 5 villages. However, the Community Connect programme has often extended beyond these 5 villages and in the last one year or so has extended over to approximately 30-40 villages. Besides the following, the University has now branched out to connect to many NGOs. A beginning has been made to connect to around 4 NGOs/Schools for the coming Community Connect projects.

For conducting the community connect course, the University is presently using a combination of the following approaches:

- 1. Linking learning with community service: This involves application of knowledge to address a specific need or challenge of the local community. At this moment, this approach is largely used by the School of Basic Sciences and Schools of Nursing, Pharmacy, Dental Sciences and Medical Sciences. This may also relate to services such as soil testing, holding of various camps etc.
- 2. Linking research with community knowledge: This involves devising joint research projects in partnership with communities and local agencies. Quite a few projects are based on research carried out in the local communities although one needs to acquire more skills relating to community based participatory research to make it a more two-way process.
- 3. **Knowledge sharing and knowledge mobilization**: Sharing of knowledge and awareness happens regularly through various interventions. This could take the shape of awareness drives, legal aid clinics, cleanliness and hygiene teachings, skill building sessions etc. The University also has a Community Radio station, Suno Sharda, which regularly carries out knowledge sessions. The radio has a reach of around 10 km radius around the University.
- 4. Devising new curriculum and courses: Although certificate courses have not been introduced in areas such as rural economies, health economics, health systems, disaster management, technology and social innovations, gender budgeting and mainstreaming, financial inclusion, social audit, participatory evaluation and even rural entrepreneurship, the University regularly carries out webinars and skill building sessions on topics related to the above areas
- 5. **Including practitioners as teachers**: This is a regular feature that happens across the various webinars and skill-building sessions. Almost all schools are carrying out webinars some of which are completely open to free participation by anyone.
- 6. **Social innovations by students:** A lot of students are creating valuable social innovations in their respective labs and schools with a view to address the practical issues in rural communities. This, however, may not necessarily happen as part of formal Community Connect courses.

2. OBJECTIVES OF COMMUNITY CONNECT

In keeping with the spirit of the Community Connect programme, Sharda University has adopted a set of comprehensive objectives for Community Connect:

- 1. Contribute to the holistic development of students by making them more aware of socially and economically disadvantaged communities and their specific issues
- 2. Provide more richer context to classrooms, so as to make them more effective laboratories of learning by aligning them to social realities beyond textbooks
- 3. Provide scope to faculty members to align their teaching and research goals by giving them ample opportunity to carry out community-oriented projects
- 4. Ensure that the Community Connect projects provide benefits to communities in tangible ways so that they may feel perceptibly better off post the interaction and involvement of the Sharda academic community
- 5. Provide ample opportunity for Sharda University and the academic community to contribute effectively to society and nation building

The University, understanding the need to contribute to a new vibrant and inclusive India, decided to adopt a broad definition of communities. This was also necessary to fully utilize the diversity and expertise of its various Schools. The term community therefore can be inclusive of any of the following:

- A defined geographic or political area such as a neighborhood, town or region;
- A population that possesses certain common characteristics such as its race, ethnicity, age or gender;
- An entity that functions in society (and outside of the researcher's own institution) such as a business, civic organization, educational facility, religious group, or governmental agency

Some of the preferred communities that the University would like to work with, apart from village and village communities, include communities such as Daily wage workers/ Migrants, Domestic Workers/ Construction workers, Urban-Semi Urban spaces, Non-Government Organizations, Self-Help Groups, Artisans and Craftsmen, Local Panchayat and Urban Bodies, Schools and Students, Resident Welfare Associations, Tiny/ Micro/ Medium Scale Industries, Industry Associations, Social Media groups in Advocacy and Relief, Old age homes/orphanages, Relief and Rehabilitation communities

Organizing Community Connect throughout the University requires immense teamwork and coordination. The formal organizational chart as to how the Community Connect is organized in given in **Figure 1**:




Figure 2: Overall Organizational Chart of Community Connect


This section summarizes all the activities that were performed during the year.


Graph 1: Focus Areas of Community Connect Projects, 2019-20 and 2018-19

- 4. Q4 Would you like to go for similar projects in future?

The questions that were asked of the faculty are:

- I. QI How do you like the idea of Community Connect?
- 2. Q2 Were you clear about the execution of the project?
- 3. Q3 How do you rate the learning of the students from the program?
- 4. Q4 Would you like to guide Community Connect projects in future?

The questions that were asked of the community members are:

- 1. QI How was your experience of students visiting your community?
- 2. Q2 Did student and community members interact respectfully?
- 3. Q3 How do you rate the benefit from students' visit?
- 4. Q4 Would you like to have more such visits by our students in future?

The questions were chosen to maintain comparability with the previous year, so that it is possible to track the progress.

The feedback from students remains quite positive, with a steady decline in negative sentiment, as our process becomes streamlined. This positive sentiment is even more significant when we noted that it has taken place in the backdrop of the pandemic.


Question I: How to you like the idea of Community Connect program?


Graph 3.1: Student Feedback on the Concept of Community Connect

Graph 3.2: Student Feedback on the Training Received


Question 3: How would you rate your learning from the field?




Graph 3.3: Student Feedback on the Learning Experience


Graph 3.4: Student Feedback on the Attractiveness for Future Projects


Graph 4.1: Faculty Feedback on the Concept of Community Connect





Graph 4.2: Clarity of the programme execution


Graph 4.3: Faculty rating of students' learning

Graph 4.4: Faculty Feedback on the Attractiveness for Future Actions


Question 1: How was your experience of students visiting your community?


Graph 5.1: Community response to Community Connect programme in their community


Question 2: Did student and community members interact respectfully?

Graph 5.2: Community Feedback on the Quality of Interaction with the students


Question 3: How do you rate the benefit from students' visit?

Graph 5.3: Community Feedback on the Benefits Received


Question 4: Would you like to have more such visits by our students in future?

Graph 5.4: Community Feedback on the Attractiveness of Future Visits


6. GLIMPSES OF COMMUNITY CONNECT ACTIVITIES - 2019-2020






Graph 6.1: Satisfaction with available medical facilities in villages around Greater Noida




Graph 6.2: Motivations for enlisting with social media sites






Graph 6.3: Registration of Births in Selected Villages around Greater Noida
