1. Introduction

1.1 Introduction to Community Connect

Around the world, initiatives to engage higher education institutions (HEIs) with local communities have been ongoing for a long time, and have become more prominent as a means to encourage practical education and social sensitivity among students. This is designed to help students understand the relevance and significance of their education to society, as well as help local communities benefit from it.

In 1999, the 1st International Conference on Higher Education was held by UNESCO, which led to the support for a new global network of universities called Global University Network for Innovations (GUNI) (URL: www.guninetwork.org). Its purpose was to foster strengthen the role of higher education in society contributing to the renewal of the visions and policies of higher education across the world under a vision of public service, relevance, and social responsibility.¹

In 2009, the 2nd UNESCO Conference on Higher Education was held in Paris. It led to the declaration that," Higher education has the social responsibility to advance our understanding of multifaceted issues...and our ability to respond to them... Through its core missions of teaching, research and service, it should lead society in generating global knowledge to address global challenges, inter alia, food security, climate change, water management, intercultural dialogue, renewable energy and public health."²

In 2014, the 5th World Report on Higher Education, held by GUNI, stated that "Knowledge, Engagement & Higher Education: Contributing to Social Change. Community University Engagement (CUE) is central to the creation of a new citizenship. This Report proposes integrating CUE into all institutional, teaching, and research activities, as a way of thinking and acting."³

1.2 Community Engagement Programme in India

In 2011, a national review was conducted by a Committee of Experts, which recommended to MHRD about fostering social responsibility and community engagement of HEIs in India.⁴ These recommendations contain several important elements for the new policy:

- 1. Improving the quality of teaching/learning in HEIs, by **bridging the gap between theory and practice** through community engagement
- Promoting deeper interactions between higher educational institutions and local communities for identification and solution of real-life problems faced by the communities in a spirit of mutual benefit
- 3. Facilitating partnerships between local communities and institutions of higher education so that students and teachers can learn from local knowledge and wisdom
- 4. Engaging higher institutions with local communities to **make curriculum courses and pedagogies more appropriate** to achieving the goals of national development
- 5. Catalysing acquisition of **values of public service and active citizenship** amongst students and youth alike, which would also encourage, nurture and harness the natural idealism of youth

6. Undertaking **research projects in partnership with the local community** through community-based research methods.

1.3 Key Principles for Community Engagement

In the light of the global and national approaches, the following key principles shall guide community engagement in HEIs:

- Partnership between HEIs and local communities should be based on mutual learning and respect.
 - Students visit villages and other communities to learn from.
 - Students provide services and benefits to the community in various forms.
- University-wide implementation of the programme, in each faculty and discipline.
 - All schools of Sharda University have made it mandatory for all students to perform Community the Connect programme once during their course.
- Formal crediting for students and teachers.
 - The community connect is a 2-credit course in all schools of the University, except the Schools of Nursing Sciences, Dental Sciences, Allied Health Sciences, and Medical Sciences and Research which are Council based.
 - o Faculty are awarded 5 points for carrying out Community Connect activities.
- Linkages with local institutions, such as local governments, district administration, local entrepreneurs, businesses local NGOs.
 - The University provides help in the form of services, advice, awareness campaign, etc. the lives of people it touches.
 - Apart from the 5 villages that the University has adopted, the Community Connect touches the lives of people in dozens of other communities.

2. Community Connect Programme

2.1 University Level Operations

Community Connect uses experiential learning approach to help the students gain practical experience as well as increase their sensitivity and maturity towards the larger surrounding society.

In pursuance of the University Grants Commission Regulations, the University introduced the Community Connect Programme from the Academic Year 2018-19. The programme was adopted in schools incrementally and now is mandatory for students of all schools to do once during the period of their course with Sharda University. It is now run by all its 14 schools. Wherein the four schools of Medical, Nursing, Dental and Allied Health Services have Community Connect as an integral part of their syllabuses as per their Council guidelines, and the remaining 10 schools follow the general guidelines for Community Connect formulated by the University

Community Connect programme has special significance for the University as it is one of the two Best Practices named for NAAC accreditation.

In pursuance of the objectives of the programme, the university has implemented the following:

- 1. Deans of all schools are responsible for the success of the programme.
- 2. Training programmes have been conducted for development of teachers in-charge of the projects under Community Connect.
- 3. Increase the scope of research from survey-based projects and awareness campaigns to include secondary research, review or articles/statistics, scientific/lab experiments, and interventions.

- Medical schools, of course, continue to carry on their programmes as per the norms of the respective Councils.
- 4. Student development will take place by making them more sensitive to their surrounding society, making them able to take on more responsibility at an earlier age.
- 5. Recognition to be given to the best groups of students.

The University wide organizational chart of the Community Connect programme is as under




Figure 1: Organizational Chart of Community Connect

The Community Connect brings together aspects including academics, market research, project management and consultancy. These different requirements create many demands, which can sometimes create their own management challenges.




Figure 2: Stakeholders of Community Connect

3.5 School of Business Studies (SBS)


This section provides the gist of the activities undertaken during the year for Community Connect.




Graph 1.1: Focus Areas of Community Connect Projects, 2020-21, 2019-20 and 2018-19

This year, we have seen a stabilization of expectations related to Community Connect programme – from students, faculty as well as community members. It indicates that they are now familiar with the programme.

Such a development is heartening, especially when it was done in the face of adverse circumstances created by the COVID crisis.

The questions that were asked of the students are:

- 1. Q1 How do you like the experience of Community Connect?
- 2. Q2 Was the background training and information sufficient for you to work in the field?
- 3. Q3 How would you rate your learning from the field?
- 4. Q4 Would you like to go for similar projects in future?

The questions that were asked of the faculty are:

- 1. Q1 How do you like the idea of Community Connect?
- 2. Q2 Were you clear about the execution of the project?
- 3. Q3 How do you rate the learning of the students from the program?
- 4. Q4 Would you like to guide Community Connect projects in future?

The questions that were asked of the community members are:

- 1. Q1 How was your experience of students visiting your community?
- 2. Q2 Did student and community members interact respectfully?
- 3. Q3 How do you rate the benefit from students' visit?
- 4. Q4 Would you like to have more such visits by our students in future?

The questions were chosen on the basis of their ability to help understand how well the programme is being conducted as well as the potential for improvement in the scope of the programme.

4.3.1 Student Feedback


The feedback from students is found quite positive. Compared to previous years, a steady increase in attraction of the programme has been reported.

Question 1: How to you like the idea of Community Connect program?

Students were asked how well they have liked the idea of community connect. The feedback shows that the response to Community Connect idea has become stable as compared to the previous year, with both liking and not liking remaining similar to previous years.


Graph 2.1: Student Feedback on the Concept of Community Connect


Graph 2.2: Student Feedback on the Training Received

Graph 2.3: Student Feedback on the Learning Experience


Question 4: Would you like to go for similar projects in future?

The question about likelihood of repeating is asked in order to judge the final impact on the respondent. Therefore, students were asked if they would like to do similar projects in future. Overall, the numbers are stable, but when compared to last years (2019-20), we see a slight decline in the likelihood of repeating. This can be explained that in the current year, there was lockdown in both the semesters, while in the previous year, there was lockdown only in one.

As community interaction is a vital part of this programme, the lack of social contact has contributed to the decrease in this statistic.

4.3.2 Faculty Feedback


The faculty feedback is also found generally positive. And the reception to the idea of community connect has improved from previous years.


Graph 3.1: Faculty Feedback on the Concept of Community Connect

Graph 3.2: Faculty Feedback on the Training Aspect


Question 3: How do you rate the learning of the students from the program?

Graph 3.3: Faculty rating of students' learning


Question 4: Would you like to guide Community Connect projects in future?

Graph 3.4: Faculty Feedback on the Attractiveness for Future Actions


4.3.3 Community Feedback


Graph 4.1: Community response to Community Connect programme in their community


Graph 4.2: Community Feedback on the Quality of Interaction with the Students

Graph 4.3: Community Feedback on the Benefits Received


Question 4: Would you like to have more such visits by our students in future?

Graph 4.4: Community Feedback on the Attractiveness of Future Visits


5. Glimpses of Community Connect Activities

5.1 Highlighted Insights – Impact of COVID-19 on Education in India

The COVID-19 crisis and the resultant reactions to it caused considerable havoc to all parts of society, and the student class was no different. As Sharda University is an institute of higher learning, several studies were conducted on the impact of COVID-19 on the education process within the ranks of Sharda students. The section summarises the findings of the studies. It must be kept in mind that the experience of online education was deeply impacted by the chaotic conditions prevalent in society at that time. 46% of the students reported that they and their families suffered greatly during the pandemic.

Insights:

- 1. The opinion of online education was low among students, despite the presence of smartphones and internet.
- 2. Most students do not have access to desktops or tablets, but they have access to laptops (70%), which might be shared with others in the family (32%).
- 3. Regarding the effectiveness of online education, students were split about evenly between 'least agree with' (37%(, 'somewhat agree with' (32%) and 'strongly agree with' (31%).
- 4. Students agreed with the idea that both faculty (43% strongly agreed and 39% somewhat agreed) and students (46% strongly agreed and 41% somewhat agreed) need to work harder to make online education more effective.
- 5. 89% students agreed with the statement that quality in online education is possible with the joint efforts of faculty, students and administration (53% strongly agreed and 36% somewhat agreed).



Graph 5.1: Student Quantification of Decline in Family Income



5.2 Categories of activities conducted under Community Connect


- 1. Awareness camp held for cancer, anti-smoking, natal care, eye donation, contraception, polio, PTSD, diabetes, and COVID care and prevention
- 2. Screening and treatment camps for oral care were held, which saw participation by several hundred patients
- 3. Studies done on how people are coping with COVID crisis, vaccine hesitancy, preventive measures taken by people
- 4. Social issues investigated, such as philanthropy, mental health in COVID times, the well-being of senior citizens, among others
- 5. Studies done in the field of agriculture and related commerce
- 6. Projects conducted under Shiksha Setu, for which students went to local schools to teach their students
- 7. Students several apps to address problems faced by communities
- 8. COVID-related studies formed a large part of our efforts, wherein the students investigated the impact of the pandemic in various industries and on society in general



Graph 5.2: Anti-COVID Practices by People; Study on COVID preventive measures




Graph 5.3: Pre COVID use of social media; Study on COVID impact on social-media usage
