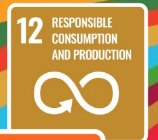

The Practice



The University has a focused approach for sustainable green practices on the campus, geared towards implementing environmentally conscious activities, having spin-off short and long term financial benefits.

The University admissions, administration, finance, attendance, examinations are fully digitized, reducing the use of paper. The University 'Waste Management Policy' provides for segregation of solid waste into biodegradable waste (wet waste); non-biodegradable waste (dry waste) and hazardous waste. The wet waste is converted as compost, the dry waste is segregated into the recyclable and non-recyclables for disposal. The food and wet waste is processed/ decomposed by an on-campus Compost Plant. Rainwater harvesting system of the University ensures reduction, recycle and reuse of water. There is a 400KLD capacity STP and 30KLD ETP for treating effluents; the recycled water is used for horticulture and flushing system, and the sludge for manure.

Biomedical waste is disposed-off in accordance with the statutory norms. Due process is also followed in handling hazardous chemicals and radioactive waste management. The e-waste management involves e-waste segregation and disposal through empaneled vendors following government guidelines.

For energy conservation, energy efficient appliances are used to reduce radiation, heat and expenditures. A solar power plant has been set up. Sensor-based switches have automated the on/off of lights, increasing the optimum use of energy. Reduce, recycle and reuse policy is implemented in case of water. For irrigation, sprinkler and drip irrigation system is used, wherever feasible. University has procured automated water spray vehicle to control the dust in the campus. Battery operated vehicles have been introduced to move around the campus. The campus has been declared 'No-Noise Zone'.

Used paper is reused. Massive plantation has resulted in more than 4000 plants succeeding. Students through Students' club, NSS and Eco-Task Force actively engage in green practices and thereby safeguarding the environment. Landscaping and attractive greenery also serve the purpose of reduced pollution. Complete ban on smoking and burning any material on the campus has been imposed. The University has embedded three-credit course on green practices in curricula and its relevance for conservation of natural resources and environment. Community Connect course also contributes in spreading awareness on issues such as pollution and the measures to contain the same by the community.

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Evidence of Success

The energy audit carried out by the University recently has brought out substantial savings on expenditure due to various energy saving practices adopted. The Solar PV energy, solar geyser system and replacement of tube lights (4200) with LEDs, etc. have led to annual electricity saving of more than 14.54 lakhs KWh/per year. The efforts of the University have been duly recognized by U.P. Government as 1st ranked institution in energy

Sharda University has developed many facilities for alternate sources of energy and also to follow the energy conservation measures. Some points indicating the same are as given below:

Installation of Solar PV System - The University is having very much concern on the environment aspect and therefore a project of installation of Roof Top Solar Power System of One Mw has taken up . The Solar PV System consisting of 3226 Solar Plates has been installed on Roof 11 No of identified Buildings. The system has been made operational w.e.f. 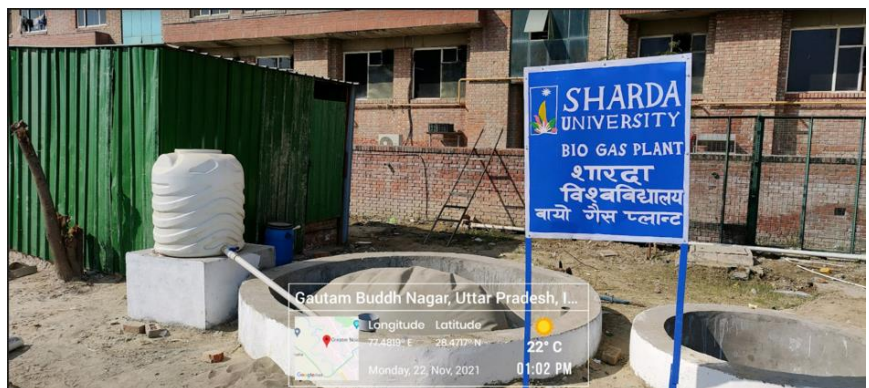
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Biogas Plant

A biogas power plant is installed to facilitate undergraduate and post graduate students in the study and usage of renewable energy. The 15 cubic meter biogas plant is set up behind Mandela Hostel. Food waste of 100- 300 kgs approx per day drawn from Mess canteens and added with cow dung water mixture is used as raw material. The raw material content takes 3-4 days for biogas formation which is



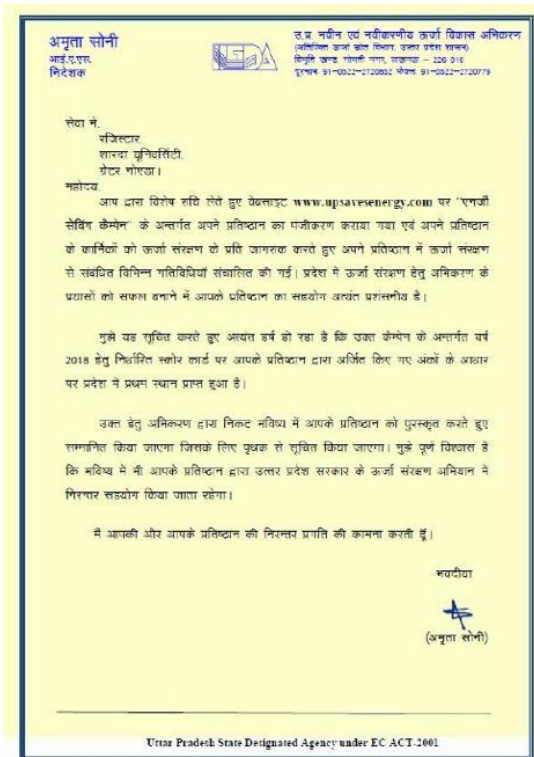
used to regenerate approx. 4KVA electric energy. Thus, food waste is converted into a resource and creating value in the form of electric power generation. The plant is utilizing the recent technology to generate the efficient energy.

Water bodies

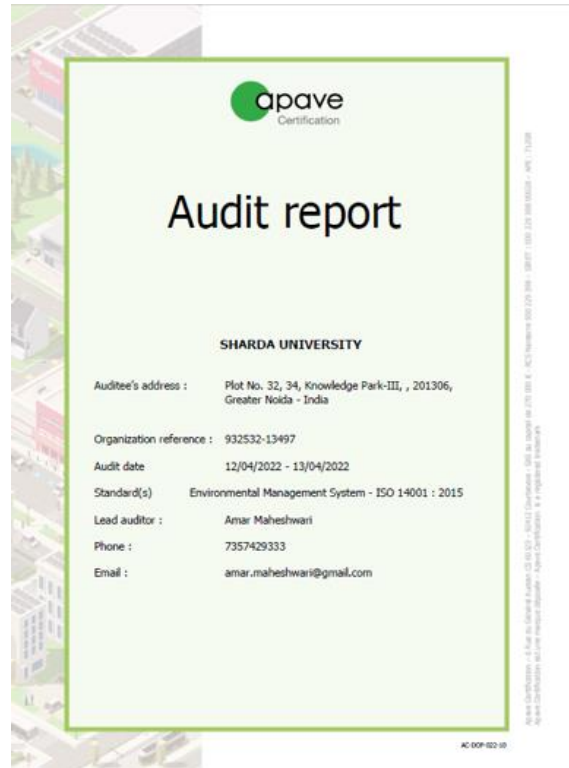


The University maintains a clean and green water body near block 7 to conserve the rain water in a natural way. Presently the capacity of water body to conserve the water is 75KLD. This conserved water is useful to multiple activities such as in agriculture and plantation and recharge of the ground water level. 
II. Research Initiatives:

In addition, there are Central Instrumentation Facility (CIF) and other advance research labs to promote research culture. The school is continuously associated with academic/sponsored research and industrial consultancy work.

- The dental school has signed Memorandum of Understanding with international health universities focussing on collaborative research and faculty & student exchange. The school also collaborates with NGOs like Rajkumari foundation and Mon Ami Foundation to increase their outreach and spread awareness about good oral health and hygiene. Most of the research carried out at SDS focuses on finding diagnosis and newer and more efficient therapeutic modalities to common dental problems. The focus of much of the research work is targeted at ensuring early diagnosis of oral diseases and their treatment through cost-effective means. This focus ties up with SDG 03 and helps School of Dental Sciences play a small role in helping achieve this goal.
- Sharda School of Allied Health Sciences has a major contribution in the generation of allied health professionals who are ready to strengthening the medical and health services by being the major assisting and support system to the mainstream medical and health personnel in the patient care systems and promoting health in the society. In our quest to further train and provide maximum academic exposure to our students, the school has signed MoU with Codon Biotech Lab- a DSIR Approved Laboratory, Legal Dezire, Saroj Hospital, Mahaveer Cancer Hospital, Jaipur and an International MoU with Nîgata University, Japan.
- Under Mission Niramaya, Sharda school of Nursing Science and Research has signed a MoU on 2nd December 2022 with UPSMF to improve the quality of nursing education in U.P. Under this MoU, Sharda School of Nursing Science and Research is recognized as a “*Mentor institute*” and is working along with UPSMF to improve the standards of other nursing institutes. Till date, Sharda School of Nursing Science and Research has recognized 3

- The School of Basic Sciences and Research has a number of live projects sponsored by AICTE, DST-SERB, DST-ASEAN, ICMR, DRDO, ISRO, NIDM and MSME. The school has different research centres BioPOSITIVE Laboratory, Advanced Virology Centre, BioEnergy Research & Technology Development Centre, Atmospheric Research Laboratory, Computational Chemistry Lab (CCL) and Advanced Polymeric Materials Research Laboratory in addition, Centre of Excellence on Solar Cells and Renewable Energy, Centre of Excellence in Artificial Intelligence in Medicine, Imaging and Forensics, Central Instrumentation Facility (CIF) solely dedicated for carrying out research activities of Government/Non-Government funded research projects. The outdoor sports facilities include, a cricket ground, football ground, four basketball grounds, five badminton courts and four volleyball grounds. There is a large open space for field and track sports that enables student-athletes to make full use of it to excel in field and track events. There is a nearly every sport for every student, irrespective whether a student wishes to enhance his/her sports skills or takes it as a stress buster to seek a joy or fitness.

Indoor facilities include a large sized, fully air-conditioned gymnasium with most modern equipment. This facility is extensively used by the students. In addition, there are a number of indoor sports like, Table Tennis, Carom and Chess etc. quite favorite among students. Yoga facility is guided under a trained yoga teacher for the students, faculty and staff.

Sports facilities are headed by a qualified physical educationist, the Assistant Director- sports. Sports officers and coaches have been appointed to take charge of day-to-day games and sports activities. For students who excel in their respective sports at the State and National level, a trainer/coach is organized by the university. A sports calendar is prepared at the beginning of an academic year, ensuring that it doesn't overlap with the students' examination and other important events. Sports competitions are accordingly held as per the calendar.

Sharda University college teams take part in intra college and inter college/universities' competitions. Sharda University teams have been participating in AIU (Association of Indian University) Championships. A grand Annual Sports Fest "Ojasvat" of the University is held annually, where teams of various colleges of neighboring States participate in increasing number, year on year.

The University hosted 21st Senior National Women Football Championship in the year 2015 once again in the year 2018 hosted 72th Sr. National Men's Football Championship North Zone.

3.3.4 Sexual and reproductive health care services for students



- Sharda School of Nursing Science and Research, Sharda University students actively participate in various events such as workshops, rally and skits to enhance awareness regarding various sexual and reproductive health care services. A total of 5 events in the form of training programs, workshops and seminars were organized in the year 2022. On 22nd April, a *Hands on Training programme* on “*Physical Examination of Antenatal Mothers*” was organized to obtain baseline data for mother and fetus health and to evaluate abnormal presentation and position. On 15th July, an “*Awareness program regarding Menstruation Hygiene and Personal Care*” in collaboration with NGO (NIINE FOUNDATION)” was conducted to educate students about menstruation hygiene and personal care during menstruation and to distribute sanitary napkins. From 14th to 18th October, a 5 days workshop was conducted for B. Sc 4th year students on “*Management of Obstetrical Emergencies and New Born Care*” to provide a safe training environment in which a learner can be observed and be provided with the feedback necessary to improve. It also allows the learner to do tasks repetitively under supervision till the desired level of competency is achieved. On 18th October, “*World Menopausal Day*” on the theme “*Brain Fog and Memory Difficulties in Menopause*” The students of BSc IV Year gathered the post-menstrual females at the venue. Students performed Skits, Charts Presentations, and Poem Recitation which helps to spread awareness about Menopausal syndromes and the management of menopause to maintain a healthy and balanced life. On 17th November, “*Cervical cancer awareness programme*” was conducted by B. Sc 4th year and PBBS 2nd year students to spread the awareness about the disease and benefits of early vaccination. With a comprehensive approach to prevent, screen and treat, cervical cancer can be eliminated as a public health problem within a generation. In continuation with providing knowledge regarding antenatal care, a training session on “*Setting up of Labour Room and its Protocol*” was conducted on 10th December to prevent cross infection and ensure safe delivery.

The cell adhere to the strictest of ethical and professional standards with regards to privacy, confidentiality and competence.

The Psychological Counselling Cell team includes Chief Psychological Counsellor, Counsellors, and Student Counselors/Coordinators. This cell is offering services to all age groups. We ensure that every person including student, faculty, and staff should avail our services. We will do our best to provide effective emotional and psychological support. The services of this cell offer individual counselling, group counselling, workshops, supportive resources (referrals based on the psychiatric need), and advice for staff related to behavioural aspects.

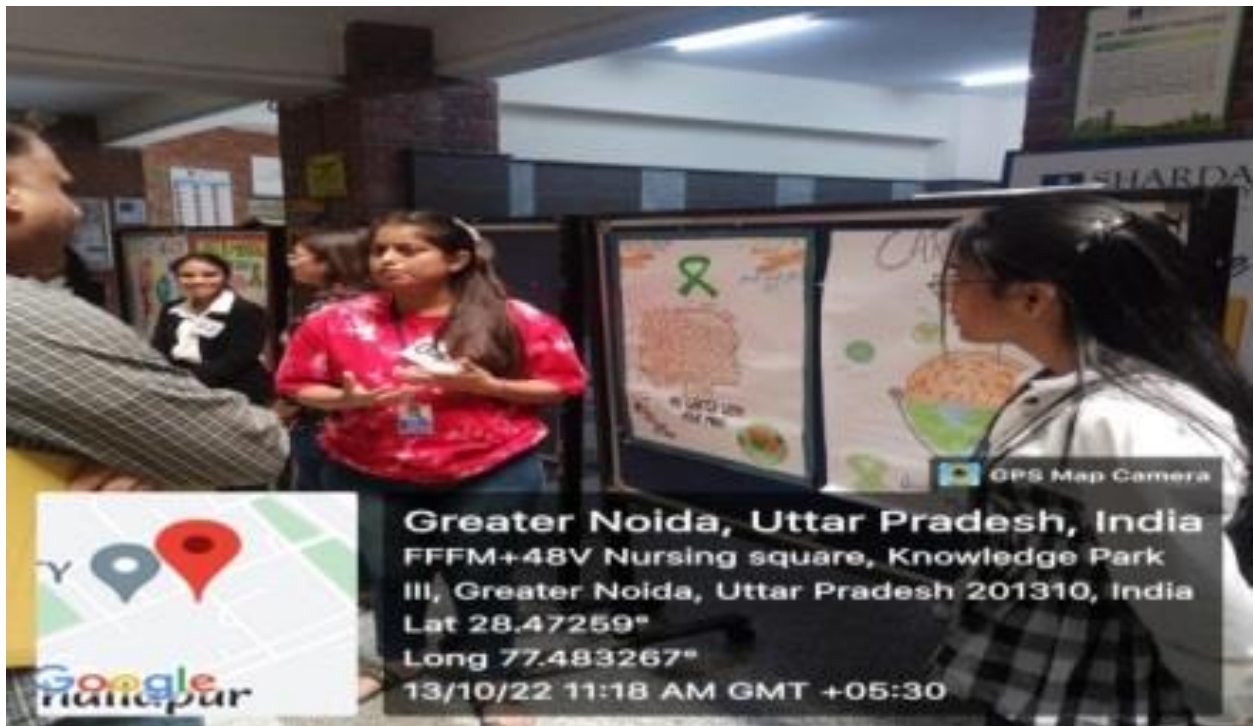



- a) indulgence in the activities prohibited by the University include:

 - ii. accepting membership of religious, terrorist, and anti-national groups prohibited by the University/Government;
 - iii. encouraging or indulgence in violence or any act of moral turpitude.
- b) possession of or carrying of or use of any weapon, potential weapons, ammunition, explosives or fireworks, contrary to law or University instructions on the campus or off-campus;
- c) possession or use of harmful chemicals and banned drugs;
- d) indulging in physical assault or threat to use physical force against any member of the teaching, non-teaching staff or any student of the University.
- e) indulgence in any form of gambling, bribing, or corruption in any manner;
- f) indulgence in absenteeism, unpunctuality, and resorting to mass bunking, and or boycotting examinations, or extra-curricular activities;
- g) smoking on the University campus or University provided transport;

- h) possessing, consuming, distributing, selling of alcohol on the University campus and/or throwing any empty/filled bottles inside the campus or on the University road, particularly with an intention to harm someone;
- i) parking a vehicle in a no parking zone or in area earmarked for parking other type of vehicles or bringing vehicle inside the University campus, without proper authorization;
- j) rash driving on the campus that may cause any inconvenience or injury to others;
- k) not disclosing a pre-existing health condition, either physical or psychological, to the Mentor/Warden, which may cause obstruction to the academics of either self or other students or putting them to any kind of risk;
- l) theft of University property or the property of any student, staff and faculty;
- m) unauthorized access to the privacy or property of the University and other fellow students, Staff and Faculty members;
- n) misbehavior with other students, faculty and staff at any time, including at the time of University events or activities;

II.a. Performing Arts and Fine Arts

Worli and Madhubani paintings are given a lot of importance at the University level. Narmadeshwar Jha (1994) points out that Tagore's 'Sri Niketan aimed at combining work with joy. Picnics, excursions, games, music, theatrical performances and celebrating socio-religious festivals constituted regular features of the calendar. New Year's Day, the Rainy Season festival, the New Rice festival, the Spring festival were—and still are—all regular features. Tagore added Halkarshan (ploughing the land festival) and Van Mahotosava (tree planting). Apart from adding joy to dreary village life, some of these festivals brought students and villagers to work together. For years Tagore tried to convince his countrymen through his speeches, stories, novels, poems and songs to work for rural revival.' Sharda University also focusses on Aesthetics like fine arts and performing arts to cement community ties and bring about a revival in Education. 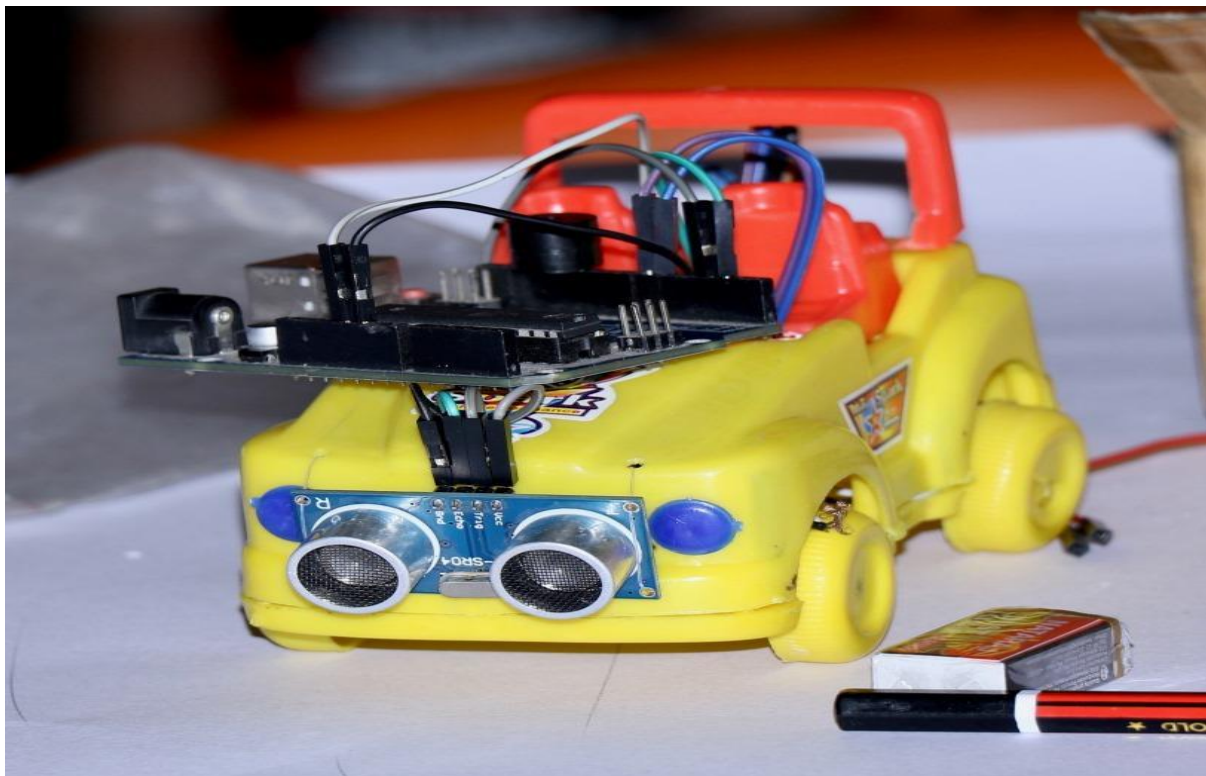

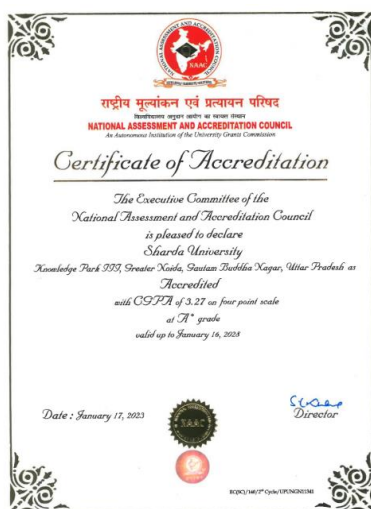




Credit Trasfers

5 GENDER EQUALITY



The University follows a conscious policy of promoting gender equality amongst the teaching and non-teaching employees, and the students of the University. The University today has a male and female ratio of 58:42 in respect of students, 53:47 for teachers and 60:40 for non-teaching staff. It has taken adequate measures for ensuring a safe and secure environment for female members on the campus. The University has deployed CCTV cameras at all sensitive and vantage points, which are regularly monitored by a team of security personnel, for ensuring physical security and prevention of harassment. The wardens and security officials are duly sensitized for ensuring safety and security of female students in hostels. Necessary measures have also been taken to keep a 24x7 vigil on unauthorized persons and unsavory, suspicious conduct and behavior inside the campus. The University has constituted an Internal Complaint Committee (ICC) which apart from handling the specific cases of complaints from female students/employees regarding sexual harassment also undertakes measures for its prevention and strengthening the safety and security of women on the campus. It spreads awareness on gender related issues through seminars, group discussions, debates, poster making competitions, workshops, skits and street plays. The University also offers several courses related to gender issues in different programmes. The gender sensitization events organized by Schools include a street play – ‘DASTAK’ presented by Asmita Theatre Group on the issues of gender and sexual harassment; ‘‘International Girl Child Day’’ and ‘National Girl Child Day’, ‘Nukad’ Natak on gender equity, slogan competition on gender awareness, essay and poster competitions on health promotion and nutrition. A series of Webinars have been conducted by the University under Mission Shakti Programme to emphasize that ‘gender equality is not only a fundamental human right, but a necessary foundation for a peaceful, prosperous and sustainable world’. Eleven days ‘Mission Shakti Abhiyan’ (March 2021) event was organized, emphasizing women safety, independence, empowerment, and gender equity. Similarly, webinars have been organized on health promotion and nutrition of female child and women. In July 2021 an International symposium was organized that highlighted the importance of gender equality, women empowerment and maternal health. For empowering women, a session on ‘Digital Literacy and Online Safety’ of women was organized wherein emerging threats to the safety of women on digital platforms, the cybercrimes committed against women, and the recourse available to them to prevent and redress such crimes were discussed. The ICC administers an oath to ensure dignity and safety of women on the ‘Oath Day’, 24th October. The ICC has also organized a webinar on Psychological Counseling of female students, in addition to the counseling offered by the Psychological Counseling Cell of the University. A website has been created for students and staff to provide psychological counseling. Online counseling is also made available on yourdost.com. Each academic block is equipped with separate common rooms for boys and girls. The University has created a day care facility for the children of faculty members, scholars, senior students and staff. There are competent facilities supporting the students since joining the University so as to enable them to concentrate on their academics, research and career goals. The automation of the University functions and digitalization of library, accounts and examination has supported the error free timely services to the students. The security system of the University for its stakeholder is enabled with advanced technology and IP cameras and women stakeholders have the feeling of safety and security 24x7 on the campus.

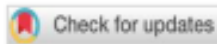
Research on gender equality

According to the definition, customer experience is "the sum of all customer encounters with the company, based on all customer contacts and views about the company." 95% of all client interactions are expected to take place through

channels supported by artificial intelligence by 2025. By making the consumer experience more friendly, useful, and engaging, artificial intelligence helps to increase customer satisfaction and loyalty.

2. LITERATURE REVIEW

In order to further the theoretical discussion in consumer research, Bag S, Srivastava G, Kumari S, et al.2022 used primary data gathered from consumers in a developing nation (India) to conduct a study and test their theoretical model. The results of the study demonstrate that using AI technology has a favourable link with user engagement and conversion, which is further established by the study's empirical testing.

The empirical study on the impact of artificial intelligence on impulsive purchasing decisions was carried out by Jain S. and Gandhi A. in 2021 using an online poll of Indian consumers. Multiple regression analysis and factor analysis were used to analyse the data that was obtained. The end result demonstrates the relationship between the application of artificial intelligence parameters, such as the duration of the purchase, recommended products, product information, and human interaction, and its impact on impulse purchases. The results showed that all of these parameters, with the

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Assembling a global database of child pneumonia studies to inform WHO pneumonia management algorithm: Methodology and applications

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World Health Organization Pneumonia Research Partnership to Assess WHO Recommendation (PREPARE) study group

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Background The existing World Health Organization (WHO) pneumonia case management guidelines rely on clinical symptoms and signs for identifying, classifying, and treating pneumonia in children up to 5 years old. We aimed to collate an individual patient-level data set from large, high-quality pre-existing studies on pneumonia in children to identify a set of signs and symptoms with greater validity in the diagnosis, prognosis, and possible treatment of childhood pneumonia for the improvement of current pneumonia case management guidelines.

Methods Using data from a published systematic review and expert knowledge, we identified studies meeting our eligibility criteria and invited investigators to share individual-level patient data. We collected data on demographic information, general medical history, and current illness episode, including history, clinical presentation, chest radiograph findings when available, treatment, and outcome. Data were gathered separately from hospital-based and community-based cases. We performed a narrative synthesis to describe the final data set.

Results Forty-one separate data sets were included in the Pneumonia Research Partnership to Assess WHO Recommendations (PREPARE) database, 26 of which were hospital-based and 15 were community-based. The PREPARE database includes 285 839 children with pneumonia (244 323 in the hospital and 41 516 in the community), with detailed descriptions of clinical presentation, clinical progression, and outcome. Of 9185 pneumonia-related deaths, 6836 (74%) occurred in children <1 year of age and 1317 (14%) in children aged 1-2 years. Of the 285 839 episodes, 280 998 occurred in children 0-59 months old, of which 129 584 (46%) were 2-11 months of age and 152 730 (54%) were males.

Leverage Edu: caught between novelty and efficiency

Deepa Kumari and Ritu Srivastava

It was the beginning of October 2021 – the season of humid afternoons and pleasant breezy evenings. Akshay Chaturvedi was deeply engrossed in a discussion on Leverage Edu with his co-founder Rajeev Ganjoo at his Gurugram office in Haryana, India. Chaturvedi found himself in a tricky situation. On the one hand, he was delighted that Leverage Edu had raised equity funds, venture debts and growth capital of over US\$10m in the past three years, at a valuation of US\$14.9m (Medhi, 2021; Leverage Edu, Traxcn). On the other hand, he felt the pressure of using the funds in the best way possible. Chaturvedi needed to determine Leverage Edu's primary short-term strategy to define how it would develop in the next five years. Competing firms were taking the same steps as his company, and there was a visible surge in the number of students applying to foreign universities. Additionally, there was a threat of forward integration by leading EdTech companies, such as BYJU's and Unacademy, looking to enter the higher education space.

In this regard, Chaturvedi had to decide whether to focus on increasing traffic by targeting Tier II and III cities, increasing the number of universities on the list and partnering with more mentors (Best Country to Study and Work for Indian Students, 2021), or concentrating on building a novel platform that would offer a range of complementary services, including arrangement for visa-related services, accommodation, student loans and other allied services. He could also choose to focus on both strategies simultaneously. He concluded that making a decision was difficult, but that it had to be made quickly, as there was little time at hand. An increasing number of students were vying for admissions, and competitors would soon move a step ahead and change the game forever.

Akshay Chaturvedi

Chaturvedi grew up as part of the Indian bourgeois. His parents insisted that he read English literature classics to improve his language skills. He differentiated himself as a member of the middle class and decided that he would do something related to education for the middle class when he grew up (Chakraborty, 2020):

If ever there was a problem that I was going to solve, it was to be in education, aimed towards the middle India [...] those who aspire to and successfully transform their children's future (Chakraborty, 2020).

Years later, Chaturvedi, a student at the Indian School of Business (ISB), Hyderabad, where he was also the director of the student board, began to identify business opportunities in higher education. His cause began to see the light of day as he began manifesting his ideas into action. However, he also recognized the challenges of breaking into the higher education market, which he described as "a huge white space, tough to crack and difficult to build solid moats" (Chakraborty, 2020).

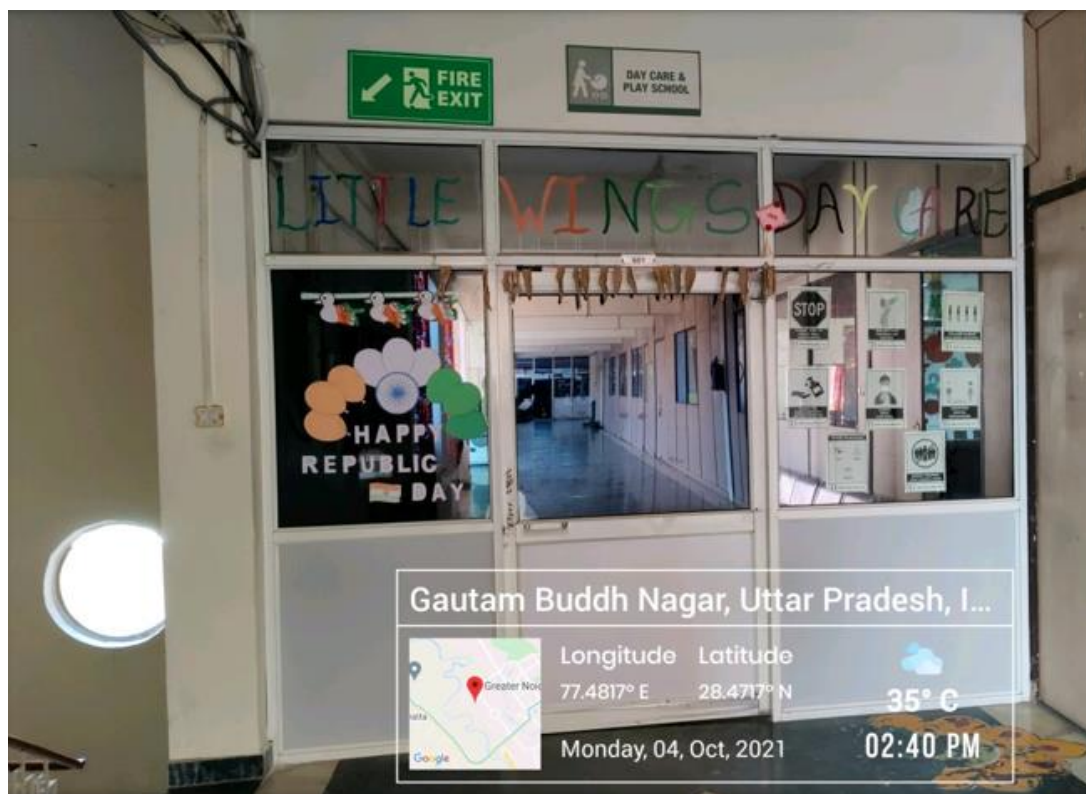

Policy for women applications for admission

Every application or admission related query is recorded in the system to be attended by the admission officer to assist the applicant and the parents during the admission process. The girls are especially motivated to secure the admission in various programme in the University. The efforts of the admission cell have supported the increment in girls' admission even in the courses where their presence was very low earlier, like mechanical engineering, bio-technology or the solar energy technology. In addition to the admissions, the University also track the progress of the studies of the students to ensure the successful completion of the programme by the student. The successful completion rate of the studies is also supported by the implementation of new education policy (NEP 2020) by the University which further permits the multiple exit and entries by the student and academic credit bank, especially the girl students will be benefitted through these options. The University maintains a dedicated web-portal for admissions and related queries by the applicant across the world. The University has developed a digital platform– EZONE for handling the data related to various academic operations including the admissions of the students.

Women access schemes and women's application in underrepresented subjects

The university has established a dedicated psychological mentoring cell where women students can visit and take the professional guidance for their issues. Similarly, there is a separate career counselling cell which facilitates the students to analyze and opt the career option best suited to their abilities and skills. There is also online portal for these services on which student can register in advance and on the given date and time s/he can visit the professional counsellor staff.

There is mechanism of prior interaction with subject experts and visit to concerned school so as to facilitate the student and his/her parents to make their decision confidently after discussion with Dean and Professors available in the school. There is separate web portal for the students to keep the records of mentoring to them by the allocated mentor from their school. The name of the portal is – Paramarsh which is given for login to every teacher mentor.

As mentioned in Para 11.9 of NEP 20 the undergraduate degree programme will be of 3 or 4 years duration, with multiple exit options within this period, with appropriate certifications, e.g., a certificate after completing 1 year, in a discipline or field including vocational and professional areas, or a diploma after 2 years of study, or a Bachelor's degree after a 3-year programme. The 4-year multidisciplinary Bachelor's programme, however, shall be the preferred option since it allows the opportunity to experience the full range of holistic and multidisciplinary education in addition to a focus on the chosen major and minors as per the choices of the student.

We would also consider the Inter University Migration by accepting credits stored at ABC (Academic Bank credit) as & when it would be established as laid down in NEP 20.

CULTURAL FEST-CHORUS

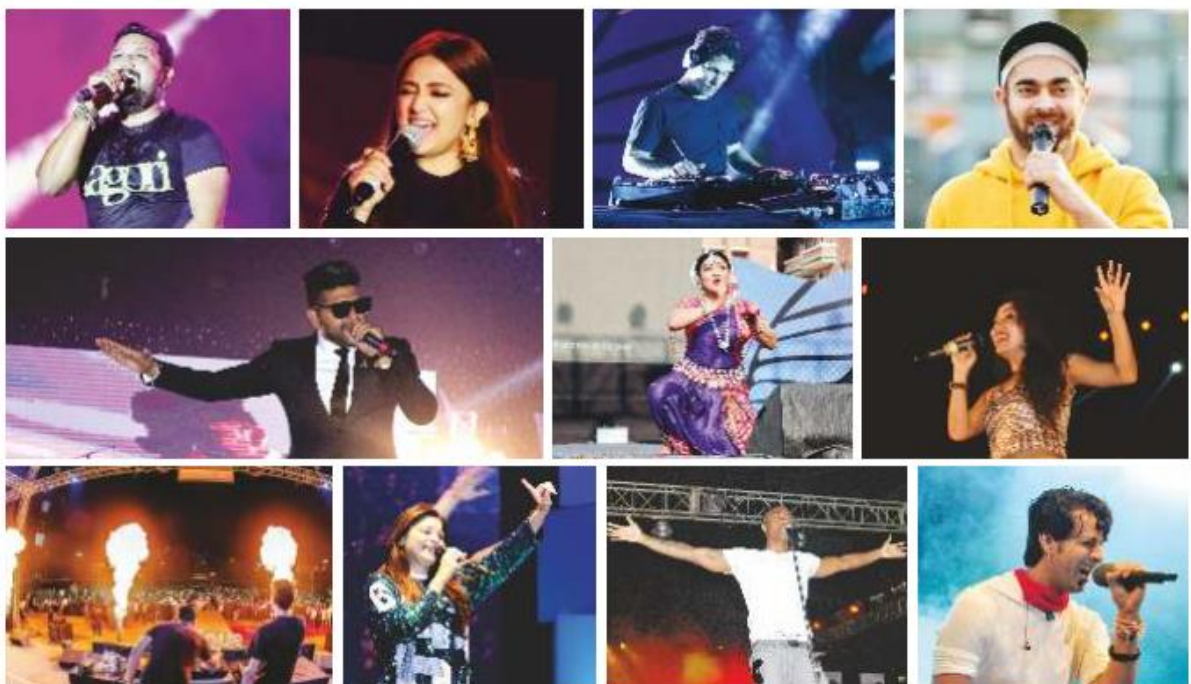

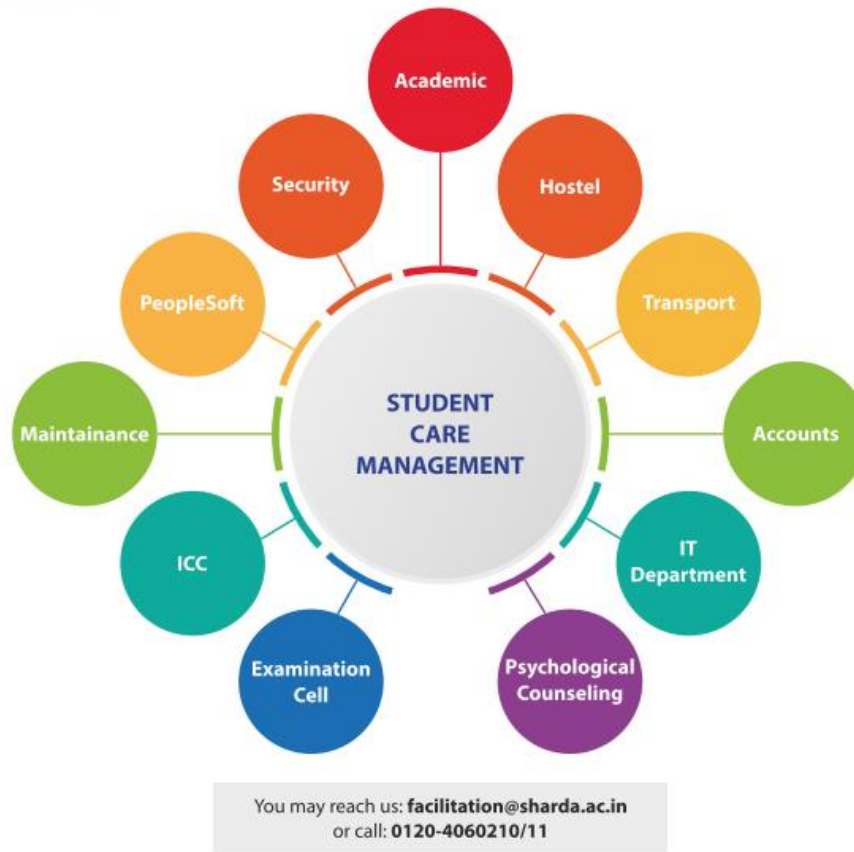

HOSTEL RULES AND REGULATIONS

For Students:

1. Ragging is strictly prohibited in any form. If anyone is found guilty, strict action will be taken against defaulters, as per the UGC Regulations on Curbing Menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institution, 2009, and the instructions issued by the University in this regard from time to time.
2. The Permission of the warden should be obtained in advance while going out of the hostel. The student will have to make entry to that effect in the register maintained at the hostel office. She must write the address of the place where she is going, along with contact telephone number.
3. Students are not authorized to go out of station/leave station/night leave without prior Parents' approval in writing through their registered email ID, etc. and express permission of the Warden. A fine of Rs. 1,000/- per day will be imposed if any student is going on leave/home or elsewhere without prior permission from the Hostel Warden / Manager. All such cases will be liable for strict disciplinary action which may even lead to expulsion from hostel/restriction for University.
4. Student will ensure that they will enter their complete details in the in-out register. Wrong entry, improper / lack of entry in exit register, signing on behalf of another person, tampering with the entries, proxy attendance and misguidance of any nature are punishable.
5. Students have to mark their attendance on biometric machine at the stipulated time daily. Non-compliance of the same is liable to fine and strict disciplinary action.
6. All girl students are expected to be back in the hostel by 9.00 P.M. (in Summers) & by 8.00 P.M. (in Winters) in the night. All students are required to sign on the attendance register kept with the hostel/manager positively on or before the stipulated time. Any student who fails to do so/refuses will be liable for disciplinary action. The parents and guardians will also be notified regarding their absence and explanations will be sought in writing.
7. A fine of up to Rs. 5,000/- will be imposed if any external/unauthorized person/student is identified along with a student in the hostel room/mess without prior permission of Warden/ Manager. Repeated offence will lead to expulsion from the hostel.
8. Guests are not allowed to stay in the hostel. Visitors (Parents, relatives, local guardians) are allowed to visit the hostellers in the Guest Room only, with permission of warden/manager, after entering their details in the Visitors' Register available at the Hostel Reception with the security guard. Visitors must leave the premises before 7.00 P.M. except on special occasion with the permission of the Warden.
9. Students are personally responsible for the safekeeping of their valuables like Cash, Jewelry, Laptop, Mobiles and any other expensive items. Students should use their own locks and should take proper care of their belongings.
10. Students are not supposed to use any electrical Equipments/Gadgets in the hostel room such as Induction Plate, Room Heater, Electric Kettle, Electric Iron, Immersion Rod, Refrigerator etc. without prior permission of authority. A fine up to Rs. 5,000/- is imposed if anyone is found using the same for the first time and Rs. 15,000/- for the second time with confiscation of Gadgets/Equipments. A fine of Rs. 25,000/- or more is imposed if anyone is found using third time onwards and strict disciplinary action will be taken against them as decided by authorities.
11. Students should handle hostel equipments, furniture, mess property carefully and not abuse or tamper with it. If they do so,

- applicable fine will be charged by the hostel management.
12. Students must switch off all lights and fans, and electrical appliances including mosquito repelling machines, if any, before leaving their rooms.
 13. Private cooking is not allowed in the hostel premises. If anyone is found guilty, than a fine up to Rs. 25,000/- can be imposed or disciplinary action will be taken on the recommendation of the University.
 14. Care is to be taken to avoid misuse of water coolers.
 15. Every case of illness and accident must be reported immediately to the hostel authorities. Students suffering from contagious disease will not be allowed to stay at hostel. Decision of the Warden/IHA Head in this regard will be final and binding.
 16. Substance abuse, Smoking/chewing of tobacco and related substances, consumption of alcohol, use of drugs and narcotics and even possession of such things is strictly banned in the hostel. Anyone found indulging in such things, a fine of up to Rs. 25,000/- will be imposed.
 17. Possession of any lethal weapon or any instrument / contrivance, which is likely to cause physical harm to others, is strictly prohibited.
 18. No function or celebration shall be organized at hostel premises except with the prior permission of the Warden/IHA Head.
 19. Playing music/record player etc. loud enough to cause disturbance to his/her neighbor(s) is prohibited. Defaulters will be punished. Repeated acts will render cancellation of allotment of Hostel room.
 20. Students are not permitted to take food to their own rooms. A fine up to Rs. 3,000/- will be imposed if anyone is found doing it.
 21. Students will not enter rooms of other students without permission of the inmate(s).
 22. All matters relating to differences among students and complaints regarding theft shall be brought to the notice of the hostel management. No police complaint will be lodged by the student before taking prior permission from the hostel administration.
 23. Students indulging in use of abusive and threatening language, physical fights, use of force, etc. to get anything accomplished, etc. will be liable to disciplinary action. Further, they are liable to be expelled from the Hostel/University.
 24. Students are requested not to paste or sketch on the walls and doors of their rooms. The furniture and fixture as per inventory list must be handed over to the designated staff member. Any damage/breakage to hostel property will be charged to the occupant(s) of the room along with penalty as decided by the competent authority. Disciplinary action may also be initiated
 25. Students during their stay in the hostel will be governed by the hostel management rules. Students are instructed to cooperate with Warden/Manager as well as other staff of the Hostel/University.
 26. Spitting is strictly prohibited and the hostel premises are to be kept neat and clean.
 27. The Hostel/University authorities will conduct surprise checks periodically and if anyone is found violating the rules, disciplinary action will be taken against him/her.
 28. Students are requested to visit the Notice Board regularly. All instructions/ notices displayed on Notice Boards in the hostels will be deemed to have been read by all students and excuses of ignorance and consequent to non-compliance of the rules and instructions put up from time to time will not be accepted.

Room Allotment:

1. Allotment of room, furniture etc. will be entirely at the discretion of the Warden.
2. Hostel accommodation (room) is liable to be changed by the university at the end of every academic year or if necessary, at any point of time in exceptional circumstances. Student and Parents are expected to comply with the same.

REGULATIONS REGARDING MAINTENANCE OF DISCIPLINE AMONG STUDENTS

- (a) All powers relating to maintenance and enforcement of discipline and taking disciplinary action against the students shall vest in the Vice-Chancellor.
- (b) On the recommendation of Vice Chancellor, the Executive Council may, however, delegate any or all of the disciplinary powers, to such other Officers/ Persons, as it may deem fit.
- (c) The Deans of Schools may be delegated powers to exercise disciplinary control over the students in their respective Schools.
- (d) Dean Students' Welfare may be delegated powers to exercise disciplinary control over the students staying in Hostels and for the act of indiscipline committed in common areas of the University campus.
- (e) Without prejudice to the generality of the power to maintain and enforce discipline under this ordinance, the following shall constitute as an act of misconduct on the part of a student of the University:
- (i) Physical assault or threat to use the physical force against any member of the teaching or non-teaching staff of the University or against any student of the University.
 - (ii) Remaining absent from a class, test or examination or any other curricular or co-curricular activity without permission of the competent authority;
 - (iii) Carrying of, use or threat to use any weapon;
 - (iv) Misbehaviour with a member of Faculty, Staff or a fellow student.
 - (v) Encouraging or indulging in violence or any act of moral turpitude;
 - (vi) Violation of status, dignity and honour of a student belonging to scheduled caste, Scheduled tribe or a socially deprived class.
 - (vii) Discrimination against any student or staff on grounds of Nationality, Caste, Creed, Language, Place of origin or Social and Cultural background;
 - (viii) Practicing casteism and untouchability in any form or inciting any other person to do so;
 - (ix) Any act, whether verbal or otherwise, derogatory to the status of a woman;
 - (x) Any violation of the provisions of the Civil Rights Protection Act, 1976;
 - (xi) Any form of gambling;
 - (xii) An attempt at bribing or corruption of any manner or description;
 - (xiii) Wilful destruction of the University property;



- (xiv) Behaving in a rowdy, intemperate or disorderly manner in the premises of the University or encouraging or inciting any other person to do so;
- (xv) Creating discord, ill-will or intolerance among the students on sectarian or communal grounds or inciting any other student to do so;
- (xvi) Causing disruption in any manner or description of the academic functioning of the University;
- (xviii) Indulging in or encouraging any form of disruptive activity related with the assessment or the examination work or any other activity of the University.
- (xix) Absenteeism and unpunctuality;
- (xx) Indulging in an act of Ragging.
- (xxi) Use of drugs or other intoxicants except those prescribed by a qualified doctor;
- (xxii) Any other act that may be construed to be against the rules of the University, viz:
- An act of sexual harassment perpetuated against a student, employee or a visitor in and around the University campus.
 - Resorting to mass bunks.
 - Participation in any political activity.
 - Staging Dharna or any other form of protest.
 - Committing theft of equipments, books, appliances and gadgets.
- (f) The Vice-Chancellor, on the recommendation received from Chief Proctor through the Dean Students Welfare or a Committee appointed by him, and in exercise of the powers vested in him, order or direct that a student:
- (i) be expelled from the University, in which case he shall not be re-admitted to any programme in the University in future,
- (ii) be, for a stated period, rusticated in which case he shall not be admitted to any programme in the University, till the expiry of the period of rustication;
- (iii) be, for a stated period, not admitted to a course or courses,
- (iv) be imposed fine of a specified amount of money;
- (v) be debarred from taking examination(s) for a specified period;
- (vi) be punished by cancellation of examination results.
- (vii) be placed on probation for such period as may be specified in the order

POLICY FOR PERMITTING CHANGE IN SPECIALIZATION (MBA)/ STUDY ABROAD PROGRAMME (BBA AND MBA)

For Change in Specialization

Case	Remarks
A student who has opted for dual specialization and needs to change to single specialization.	The student is allowed to change the specialization by the end of the first semester, no change will be allowed there after. However, the fee paid will not be refunded or adjusted.
A student who has opted for single specialization and needs to change to dual specialization.	The student is allowed to change the specialization by the end of the first semester, no change will be allowed there after. The student would be required to pay the fee for dual specialization program.
A student can change from single specialization to other single specialization	The student is allowed to change the specialization by the end of the first semester, no change will be allowed there after.

Note: A student who wishes to change his/her specialization (dual to single, single to dual & single to single) is required to submit an application for the change to the Assistant Registrar, School of Business Studies by the end of the first semester.

For change in International Immersion Programme

Case	Remarks
Student who have opted international immersion programme but due to any genuine reasons cannot avail the option.	The case will be considered only after thorough verification by the AR office of the respective school.
Student who later wish to opt for international immersion programme	May be allowed to do so. However, the student would be required to pay the fees as calculated.

- The International immersion programme for BBA students will be held at the end of the second year.
- The International immersion programme for MBA students will be held at the end of the first year.
- The student of the MBA Integrated program will avail the international immersion programme only once during the entire programme (If they have opted for foreign study tour)
- The students who have opted for international immersion programme should keep their passports ready by the end of the first semester.

For Change in Specialization in B.Tech.

In second year for change in specialization in B.Tech. is allowed only of a student who has secured more than 8.00 CGPA and for B.Tech (CS) 8.50 CGPA in first year with duly permitted by HoD/Dean/Director Admission.

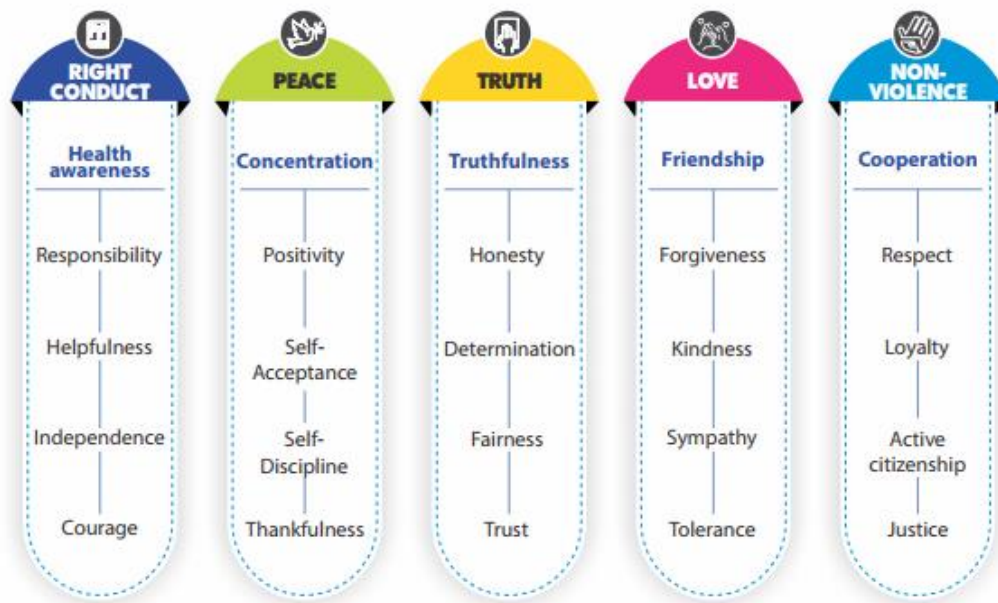
OBJECTIVES

The first and foremost outcome of this endeavour is to inculcate values and ethics. It is crucial to have the big things at place but it is also important to have the smallest things at the place. To create such an environment, following five systems need to be created:

- (1) The learning process for holistic development
- (2) Impeccable governance
- (3) Effective institutional management
- (4) Well laid system of rewards and chastisement
- (5) Institutional climate where 'rights' enjoy and 'wrongs' are discouraged.

Notification

In supersession of the SU/Reg./Notification/2075/264 dated October 5, 2015, the University hereby makes the following Ordinance namely Sharda University (Redressal of Grievances of Students), Ordinance, 2019. It was considered and approved vide item no. 17.12 in its 17th Meeting of the Executive Council held on September 21, 2019.

1. SHORT TITLE AND COMMENCEMENT:

The Ordinance shall be called as Sharda University (Redressal of Grievances of Students) Ordinance, 2019 and shall come into force from the date of its notification.

2. OBJECTIVE:

To provide opportunities for the redressal of certain grievances of students already enrolled in the University, as well as those seeking admission to such institutions, and a mechanism thereto.

3. DEFINITION UNLESS THE CONTEXT OTHERWISE REQUIRES:

- a. "Act" means the Sharda University Uttar Pradesh Act, 2009 (14 of 2009);
- b. "Aggrieved Student" means a student, who has any complaint in the matters relating to or connected with the grievances defined under these regulations.
- c. "Commission" means the University Grants Commission established under the UGC Act, 1956.
- d. "Declared Admission Policy" means such policy, including the process there under, for admission to a course or program of study as may be offered by the University by publication in the prospectus of the University.
- e. "Department and School of the University" means Departments of Studies, Schools of Studies, respectively, and includes a centre of studies and research established/ maintained/ constituent to the University in accordance with the University Act, Statutes and Ordinances.
- f. "Government" means State Government of Uttar Pradesh.
- g. "Grievance" means, and includes, complaint(s) made by an aggrieved student in respect of the following, namely:
 - i. admission contrary to merit determined in accordance with the declared admission policy of the institution;
 - ii. irregularity in the process under the declared admission policy of the institution;
 - iii. refusal to admit in accordance with the declared admission policy of the institution;
 - iv. non-publication of prospectus by the institution, in accordance with the provisions of these regulations;
 - v. publication by the institution of any information in the prospectus, which is false or misleading, and not based on facts;
 - vi. withholding of, or refusal to return, any document in the form of certificates of degree, diploma or any other award or other document deposited by a student for the purpose of seeking admission in such institution, with a view to induce or compel such student to pay any fee or fees in respect of any course or program of study which such student does not intend to pursue;

- vii. demand of money in excess of that specified to be charged in the declared admission policy of the institution;
 - viii. violation, by the University, of any law for the time being in force in regard to reservation of seats in admission to different category of students;
 - ix. non-payment or delay in payment of scholarships or financial aid admissible to any student under the declared admission policy of such University, or under the conditions, if any, prescribed by the Commission;
 - x. delay by the University in the conduct of examinations, or declaration of results, beyond the schedule specified in the academic calendar of the institution, or in such calendar prescribed by the Commission or the State Government;
 - xi. failure by the University to provide student amenities as set out in the prospectus, or is required to be extended by the University under any provisions of law for the time being in force;
 - xii. non-transparent or unfair practices adopted by the University for the evaluation of students;
 - xiii. delay in, or denial of, the refund of fees due to a student who withdraws admission within the time mentioned in the prospectus, or as may be notified by the Commission;
 - xiv. complaints of alleged discrimination of students from the Scheduled Castes, the Scheduled Tribes, Other Backward Classes, Women, Minority or persons with disabilities categories;
 - xv. denial of quality education as promised at the time of admission or required to be provided; and
 - xvi. harassment or victimization of a student, other than cases of harassment, which are to be proceeded against under the penal provisions of any law for the time being in force.
- h. "Institution" means, an institution established within the University for a particular discipline or activity;
- i. "Institutional Student Grievance Redressal Committee" (ISGRC) means a committee constituted under this notification at the level of the University, for dealing with grievances which do not relate to a School, Department or Centre of the University, e.g. Administration, Accounts, Admission Cell, International Division, Examination Cell, Inter-Hostel Administration(Hostel & Mess/Food), Estates, Maintenance, House Keeping, Student Welfare & Sports, Transport, Security and other common facilities.
- j. "Ombudsperson" means the Ombudsperson appointed by the State Government in terms of UGC (Redress of Grievances of Students) Regulations, 2019;
- k. "Prospectus" means and includes any publication, whether in print or otherwise, issued for providing fair and transparent information, relating to University, to the general public (including to those seeking admission in the University) by the University or any authority or person authorized by it to do so;
- l. "School Level Student Grievance Redressal Committee" (SLSGRC) means a committee constituted under this Ordinance, for a School, Department, or Centre within the School.
- m. "Student" means a person enrolled, or seeking admission to be enrolled, in the University;
- n. "University" means the Sharda University Uttar Pradesh established under the Sharda University Act, 2009; and

- o. "University Student Grievance Redressal Committee" (USGRC) means a committee constituted at the level of the University under this Ordinance, for dealing with the grievances arising out of decisions of the SLSGRC and ISGRC.

4. MANDATORY PUBLICATION OF PROSPECTUS, ITS CONTENTS AND PRICING:

- (1) The University, shall publish and/or upload on its website, before expiry of at least sixty days prior to the date of the commencement of the admission to any of its courses or programs of study, a prospectus containing the following for the information of persons intending to seek admission to the University and the general public, namely:

- (a) the list of programs of study and courses offered along with the broad outlines of the syllabus specified by the appropriate statutory authority or by the University, as the case may be, for every course or program of study, including teaching hours, practical sessions and other assignments;
- (b) the number of seats approved by the appropriate statutory authority in respect of each course or program of study for the academic year for which admission is proposed to be made;
- (c) the conditions of educational qualifications and eligibility including the minimum and maximum age limit of persons for admission as a student in a particular course or program of study, specified by the University;
- (d) the process of selection of eligible candidates applying for such admission, including all relevant information in regard to the details of test or examination for selecting such candidates for admission to each course or program of study and the amount of fee prescribed for the admission test;
- (e) each component of the fee, deposits and other charges payable by the students admitted to the University for pursuing a course or program of study, and the other terms and conditions of such payment;
- (f) rules/regulations for imposition and collection of any fines in specified heads or categories, along with details of minimum and maximum fine as may be imposed.
- (g) the percentage of tuition fee and other charges refundable to a student admitted to the University in case such student withdraws from the University before or after completion of course or program of study and the time within and the manner in which such refund shall be made to that student;
- (h) details of the teaching faculty, including their educational qualifications, along with their type of appointment (Regular/visiting/guest) and teaching experience of every member thereof.
- (i) information with regard to physical and academic infrastructure and other facilities including hostel accommodation and its fee, library, hospital or industry wherein the practical training is to be imparted to the students and in particular the amenities accessible by students on being admitted to the University;
- (j) all relevant instructions in regard to maintaining the discipline by students within or outside the campus of the University, and, in particular such discipline relating to the prohibition of ragging of any student or students and the consequences thereof and for violating the provisions of any regulation in this behalf made by the relevant statutory regulatory authority; and
- (k) Any other information as may be specified by the Commission and the State Government:

Provided that the University shall publish/upload information referred to in the above clauses, (a) to (k) of this ordinance, on its website, and the attention of prospective students and the general public shall be drawn to such publication being on the website through advertisements displayed prominently in different newspapers and through other media:

- (2) The University shall fix the price of each printed copy of the prospectus, being not more than the reasonable cost of its publication and distribution and no profit be made out of the publication, distribution or sale of prospectus.

5. STUDENT GRIEVANCE REDRESSAL COMMITTEES (SGRC):

A. School Level Student Grievance Redressal Committee (SLSGRC)

- (i) There shall be a School Level Student Grievance Redressal Committee (SLSGRC) constituted at the level of each School of Studies. The composition of the Committee shall be as under:
- a) Dean of the School - Chairperson;
 - b) Two Professors, from outside the School to be nominated by the Vice Chancellor- Members;
 - c) A Faculty of the School, well-versed with the mechanism of grievance redressal, to be nominated by the Chairperson- Member;
 - d) A representative from among students of the School to be nominated by the Vice Chancellor based on academic merit/excellence in sports/performance in co-curricular activities - Special Invitee.

Note: To ensure representation of women on the committee, the Vice-Chancellor of the University may induct one women faculty.

- (ii) The term of the Chairperson, members of the Committee and the nominees shall be of two years.
- (iii) The quorum for the meeting of SLSGRC, including the Chairperson, but excluding the special invitee, shall be three.
- (iv) Any complaint relating to the School, Department or Centre of the School shall be addressed by the aggrieved student to the administrative officer of the said School, who will either deal with it at the School level or shall remit it to the concerned Department or Centre of the School.
- (v) In case the said grievance does not get resolved within five (05) working days of the receipt of the complaint in the School, the same shall automatically be forwarded to the SLSGRC.
- (vi) In considering the grievances before it, the SLSGRC shall follow principles of natural justice.
- (vii) The SLSGRC shall submit its report with recommendations, if any, to the Registrar of the University, with a copy thereof to the aggrieved student, within a period of fifteen (15) days from the date of receipt of the complaint.
- (viii) In case the aggrieved student remains unsatisfied, he may take up the matter to the level of University Student Grievance Redressal Committee (USGRC). Likewise, the University may either accept the recommendations for follow up action or may, at its discretion, take up the matter to the level of USGRC.

B. Institutional Student Grievance Redressal Committee (ISGRC)

- (i) There shall be a Institutional Student Grievance Redressal Committee (ISGRC) constituted by the Vice Chancellor at the level of the University to deal with such complaint that do not relate to any academic Department, School or Centre of the University. The composition of the Committee shall be as under:
- (a) Dean/Senior Professor of University, nominated by the Vice-Chancellor- Chairperson;
 - (b) Dean, Students Welfare - Member;

- (c) One senior non-academic functionary nominated by the Vice-Chancellor - Member;
- (d) Proctor - Member;
- (e) A representative from among students of the University to be nominated by the Vice Chancellor based on academic merit/excellence in sports/performance in co-curricular activities - Special Invitee.

Note: To ensure representation of women on the committee, the Vice-Chancellor of the University may induct one women faculty.

- (ii) The term of the members/nominee of the committee shall be of two years.
- (iii) The quorum for the meetings of the ISGRC, including the Chairperson, but excluding the special invitee, shall be three.
- (iv) Any complaint other than those relating to the School, Department or Centre of the School shall be addressed by the aggrieved student to the concerned administrative head, who will deal with it at his level, in consultation with his staff.
- (v) In case the said grievance does not get resolved within five (05) working days of the receipt of the complaint in the Department, the same shall automatically be forwarded to the ISGRC.
- (vi) In considering the grievances before it, the ISGRC shall follow principles of natural justice.
- (vii) The ISGRC shall send its report with recommendations, if any, to the Registrar of the University, along with a copy thereof to the aggrieved student, within a period of 15 workings days from the date of receipt of the grievance.
- (viii) In case the aggrieved student remains unsatisfied, he may take up the matter to the level of University Student Grievance Redressal Committee (USGRC). Likewise, the University may either accept the recommendations for follow up action or may, at its discretion, take up the matter to the level of USGRC.

C. University Student Grievance Redressal Committee (USGRC)

- (i) The Vice Chancellor of the University shall constitute such numbers of University Student Grievance Redressal Committees (USGRC), as may be required to consider grievances unresolved by one or more SLSGRC or the ISGRC.
 - a) Pro-Vice Chancellor or in his absence a Dean nominated by the Vice-Chancellor - Chairperson;
 - b) Dean, Student Welfare or equivalent - Member;
 - c) Two Deans drawn from the Schools of the Studies, other than those connected with reports of SLSGRC under review, to be nominated by the Vice-Chancellor - Members;
 - d) One Professor of the University nominated by the Vice-Chancellor- Member;
 - e) Two representatives from among students of the college to be nominated by the Vice Chancellor based on academic merit/excellence in sports/performance in co-curricular activities - Special Invitees.

Note: To ensure representation of women on the committee, the Vice-Chancellor of the University may induct one women faculty.

- (ii) The Chairperson, members and the special invitee/nominee shall have a term of two years.
- (iii) The quorum for the meeting, including the Chairperson, but excluding the special invitee, shall be three.

- (iv) In considering the grievances before it, the USGRC shall follow principles of natural justice.
- (v) The USGRC shall send its report and recommendations, if any, to the Dean of the School, Heads of Department & Centre, or the Registrar and other administrative Heads, with a copy thereof to the aggrieved student, within 15 days of the receipt of the grievance by the Committee, for necessary compliance and report to the Vice-Chancellor.
- (vi) Any student aggrieved by the decision of the University Student Grievance Redressal Committee may prefer an appeal to the Vice-Chancellor who shall, within a period of fifteen days from the date of receipt of the appeal, take a final view which shall be communicated to the aggrieved student within the next three working days.

6. OMBUDSPERSON:

Any student aggrieved by the decision of the University Student Grievance Redressal Committee and disposal of the appeal by the Vice-Chancellor, may prefer further appeal to the Ombudsperson appointed by the State Government in terms of the University Grants Commission (Redress of Grievances of Students) Regulation, 2019, within a period of fifteen days;

pending appointment of the Ombudsperson by the State Government, the Vice-Chancellor, Sharda University shall be the final authority for disposal of the appeal.

7. FUNCTIONS OF OMBUDSPERSON:

- (i) The Ombudsperson shall hear appeals from an aggrieved student, only after the student has availed all other remedies provided under this Ordinance.
- (ii) While issues of malpractices in the conduct of examination or in the process of evaluation may be referred to the Ombudsperson, no appeal or application for revaluation or re-totalling of answer sheets from an examination, shall be entertained by the Ombudsperson unless specific irregularity materially affecting the outcome of specific instance of discrimination is indicated.
- (iii) The Ombudsperson may avail assistance of any person, as amicus curiae, for hearing complaints of alleged discrimination.
- (iv) The Ombudsperson shall make all efforts to resolve the grievances within a period of 30 days of receiving the appeal from the aggrieved student(s).

8. PROCEDURE FOR REDRESSAL OF GRIEVANCES BY OMBUDSPERSON AND STUDENT**GRIEVANCE REDRESSAL COMMITTEE:**

- (i) The University shall, within a period of one month from the date of issue of this notification, have an online portal where any aggrieved student may submit an application seeking redressal of grievance.
- (ii) On receipt of an online complaint, the University shall, depending on the nature of complaint refer the complaint to the appropriate Administrative Officer in the Schools of Studies (for academics) or the Head of the Service Departments (other than academics) for appropriate necessary action, as indicated in the preceding para-5 of the Notification, through the Grievance Redressal Committee(s).
- (iii) The Student Grievance Redressal Committee, as the case may be, shall fix a date for hearing the complaint which shall be communicated to the concerned officials in the University and the aggrieved student.
- (iv) An aggrieved student may appear either in person or authorize a representative to present the case.


- (v) Grievances not resolved by the University Student Grievance Redressal Committee or on appeal to the Vice Chancellor, shall be referred by the student to Ombudsperson, within the stipulated period.
- (vi) University shall extend co-operation to the Ombudsperson or the Student Grievance Redressal Committee(s), as the case may be, in early redressal of grievances; any failure to do so may be reported by the Ombudsperson to the Commission, who shall take action in accordance with the provisions of these regulations.
- (vii) The Ombudsperson shall, after giving reasonable opportunities of being heard to both parties, on the conclusion of proceedings, pass such order, with reasons thereof, as may be deemed fit to redress the grievance and provide such relief to the aggrieved student, as may be appropriate.
- (viii) The University, as well as the aggrieved student, shall be provided with copies of the order under the signature of the Ombudsperson, and the University shall place it for general information on its website.
- (ix) The University shall comply with the recommendations of the Ombudsperson; and the Ombudsperson shall report to the Commission any failure on the part of the University to comply with the recommendations.
- (x) The Ombudsperson may recommend appropriate action against the complainant, where a complaint is found to be false or frivolous.

9. INFORMATION REGARDING OMBUDSPERSON AND STUDENT GRIEVANCE REDRESSAL COMMITTEES:

The University shall furnish, prominently, on its website and in its prospectus, all relevant information in respect of the Student Grievance Redressal Committee(s) under its purview, and the Ombudsperson for the purpose of appeal.

10. CONSEQUENCES OF NON-COMPLIANCE:

The Commission shall in respect of any Institution, which willfully contravenes the University Grants Commission (Redress of Grievance of Students) Regulation, 2019, or repeatedly fails to comply with the recommendation of the Ombudsperson or the Grievance Redressal Committee(s), as the case may be, proceed to take one or more action(s) as specified under the UGC Regulations in this regard.

4.9.7 Maternity Leave:

- (i) Maternity leave on full pay shall be granted to a woman employee for a period not exceeding 26 weeks or 6 months. Also this leave is applicable in case of miscarriage including abortion, subject to the condition that the total leave granted in respect of this to a woman employee in her career shall not be more than 45 days, and the application for leave is supported by a medical certificate.
- (ii) Maternity benefit to women employees having two or more than two surviving children shall be 12 weeks or 3 months, of which not more than 6 weeks shall precede the date of her expected delivery.
- (iii) Maternity benefit to a woman employee who legally adopts a child below the age of three months shall be 12 weeks from the date the child is handed over to the adopting mother.
- (iv) Maternity leave may be combined with earned leave or extraordinary leave but any leave applied for in continuation of maternity leave may be granted if the request is supported by a medical certificate. The total leave admissible should not exceed one year.
- (v) A woman employee who has worked in the organization for a period of 6 months is entitled for payment in maternity leave.

Childcare facilities for staff, faculty and students:

The University is running a professionally managed Day-care Center for the kids of students, staff and faculty on the campus. This facility can be enjoyed during the working hours of the University. There are competent facilities and trained staff to care for children. The children are engaged in educational and recreational activities and are provided with a balanced fresh diet so as to support their good mental and physical health in future.




Women Mentoring schemes:

The University executes regular efforts on mentoring of students through its faculties. Students are allocated among teachers for mentorship. There is a separate dedicated University web-portal in the name of Paramarsh' wherein there is counselling type and contents records. Students' parents are also kept in look while working for a student. This online record of mentoring related efforts facilitates the easy navigation in the information by the University authorities to plan and execute any required strategies to support the students' achievement.

"On Being a Mentor to Students"

1. Mentoring Definition:

Mentoring, as defined by Eric Parsloe, is to support and encourage people to manage their own learning in order that they maximize their potential, develop their skills, improve their performance and become the person they want to be.

2. Importance of Mentoring in Sharda University:

Student mentoring in Sharda University is important for the following reasons:

- a. Diverse student community with varying linguistic, socio-cultural, economic and academic backgrounds,
- b. International students belonging to different countries face challenges in coping with the Indian Culture as well the academic environment both inside and outside the classroom,
- c. Students embarking on their academic career at the university come with many expectations and apprehensions about learning in a new environment,

Thus, it is essential that students get guidance, hand-holding and support to facilitate their adjustment into the academic environment, Campus life and culture. The guidance is required for enhancements in academic performance and move beyond studies, Overall, mentor role is manifold; focused for academic growth and well-being of students in a new paradigm.

The type of student's mentoring depends upon scholastic level of the program:

- a. Undergraduate students: The focus will be on academic foundation, career development and tackling personal problems. These students are also made aware of the university policies and encouraged to participate in co-curricular and extracurricular activities.

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3. Mentoring Program of Sharda University:

It is designed to serve the following:

- a. Acclimatize students from diverse backgrounds about the University educational system and learning environment.
- b. Provide a space to the students for their academic and personal challenges arising in a new environment
- c. Identify the reasons that lead to shortfall in attendance and/or class participation and help students address those issues,
- d. Help students to face challenges to keep pace with the academic environment in keeping pace with the academics in the classroom.
- e. Extend support beyond the classroom for improvement of student development and maximize their potential,

4. Mentoring Policy

- a. Every student is assigned a faculty mentor on day-one of the concerned School shall take necessary steps for the same.
- b. The mentor will remain same throughout the course of the study of the mentee. The mentor shall be changed only with the approval of the HOD in appropriate circumstances or as per the directions laid down by the concerned school from time to time,
- c. The University shall organize Orientation Programs / Sessions for the newly admitted students at the beginning of the academic year where they will be familiarized with the program, academic policies, practices, and resources
- d. The mentees will be intimated names of the mentors to whom they will be assigned, and the mentor details shall also be shared with the parents / wards of the students.
- e. An orientation program will be conducted in the first semester and a refresher session will be conducted in the second semester.
- f. The School shall take necessary steps to ensure that the faculty mentors are able to meet their assigned mentees at the time of the orientation session, A special session shall be set aside for the same. Thereafter, the mentor will hold a familiarization meeting to find out student's previous educational experiences, decision to join this university and what the student hopes to achieve.
- g. Mentor shall advise and approve of the courses (core, elective and open elective) that mentee Seek to choose in each semester,
- h. It shall be the responsibility of the mentee to contact faculty mentor at the appointed hour. However, the mentor may also take steps to contact mentees through e.mail / social media and other appropriate mediums. The mentors should let the mentees know the time and place for meeting. Mentors may give special attention to the needs of students who are challenged due to cultural and ethnic issues,
- i. The mentoring shall cover academic and non-academic issues faced by the mentees. Where required mentor shall recommend for professional help,
- j. For first year students, the mentor should preferably conduct at least one session per month. However, each School of the University will have the flexibility to decide on the number of sessions as per their curriculum requirement; as the new students are just learning the ropes and fretting about the long and

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challenging road ahead in their new environment. The sessions can be adjusted from a regular basis to a requirement based mentoring when the students progress to the second year.

- k. The mentors shall record mentee interactions every time the student approaches the mentor for the purpose of mentoring.
- l. The mentors shall encourage the students to use their time effectively and productively.
- m. The mentors review students' progress quarterly via examining attendance and academic performance records.
- n. The mentor shall take up academic issues of a serious nature and initiate action for resolution of the same
- o. The mentors must make best efforts to dissuade their mentees from harmful practices of smoking, drugs, alcohol etc.
- p. The mentor should encourage the mentee to take up challenging academic paths during his/her course of study.

5. Mentoring Program Governance

- a. There shall be a Mentoring Program Coordinator at the University level to oversee the mentoring program who, in tandem with mentoring program coordinators of the School, and the Department, will facilitate the smooth functioning of the program at the School/ Department level.
- b. The Vice Chancellor shall appoint a Chief Mentoring Program Coordinator from among the senior faculty members, The person should be well informed about the effective mentoring practices/ managed student affairs at the University level and is well versed with the nature of common problems faced by the student community in the Sharda University.
- c. The tenure of the Chief Mentoring Program Coordinator shall ordinarily be for a period of two years and can be extended with the due approval of the competent authority.
- d. The Chief Mentoring' Program Coordinator shall have the following functions:
 - Disseminate aims and objectives of the mentoring program to school mentoring coordinator,
 - Coordinate mentoring activity with the Mentoring Coordinators at the School/ Department level
 - Organize Mentor Training and Student Induction Programs at the commencement of the academic year to ensure uniformity of mentoring program delivery across all Schools and Departments.
 - Monitor the overall mentoring program by having regular interaction/ meetings with the Deans, School/Department Mentoring coordinators, Mentors, preferably once every month.
 - To identify and address the concerns of mentors arising out of interaction with mentees,
 - To facilitate technical support by coordinating with the IT Support team in case of technical glitches, if any,
 - To review the mentoring program policy document, whenever required, to improve mentoring practices/ process and the general effectiveness of mentoring.

7. Mentoring Coordinator (School/Department level)

- a. The Mentoring Coordinator at the School/ Department level shall oversee and coordinate the functioning of the Mentors of the respective School/ Department,

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- b. The Mentoring Coordinator shall be appointed by the Dean of that School in consultation with the Chief Mentoring Program Coordinator and the Vice Chancellor.
- c. The tenure of the Mentoring Coordinator shall be two years, and can be extended or shortened depending upon the performance.
- d. The role of the Mentoring Coordinator shall be:
 - To be a single point of contact for overall information concerning the mentoring program at the school level,
 - To make timely mentee allocation, monitor the mentoring program, maintain the mentor-mentee lists and file. Prepare monthly school level mentoring reports and share it with Dean.
 - To take up cases of indiscipline reported from the office of the Chief Proctor with concerned mentors for providing necessary counseling and guidance.
 - To seek feedback from mentees and analyze the same,
 - To help newly recruited faculty mentors understand the aims and objectives of the mentoring program and share the context and common student concerns.
 - To keep regular checks on the online portal and encourage/ remind mentors to participate actively,
 - To report technical issues in the online mentoring portal, if any,
 - To attend meetings convened by the Chief Mentoring Program Coordinator or the Dean for the purpose.
 - To convene interactive sessions with mentors to understand the challenges faced by them.

8. Assignment of Mentors

- a. All the faculty members including the HoD and the Dean shall be mentors for students admitted to the program that the school offers. The Dean / HoD shall allot the students to the mentors from the date of registration. There shall be equitable distribution of students among faculty (including HoD and the Dean)
- b. In case a mentor is on leave for more than a month, Dean / HoD shall make re-allotment among the available faculty, If a new faculty joins the department, HoD / Dean shall carry out re-allotment so that all the faculty members have almost equal number of mentees,
- c. The Mentors at the School/ Department shall carry out mentoring and will have preferably not more than 20 mentees, It is the responsibility of the mentoring coordinator to ensure that every student of the School is assigned a mentor,
- d. The functioning of the mentees shall be coordinated by Coordinators of the respective School/ Department'
- e. All issues relating to the allotment of mentees or mentors the notice of the mentoring coordinator.

9. Role of Mentors

Mentors are expected to: the Mentoring shall be brought to

- Establish a sustained connect with the mentees, be helpful and encourage them to come up with their problems.
- Mentor shall be available to the mentees beyond the classroom and keep them informed if for some unforeseen reason they are unavailable for a scheduled mentoring session,

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- Engage with the mentees to identify and understand their strengths and areas of improvement,
- Take regular feedback on mentees attendance regularity, academic performance, conduct, etc. and advise/mentor on short fall, if any.
- Counsel mentees who have been involved in disciplinary issues.
- Keep the Mentoring Coordinator/ Mentoring Program Coordinator informed of the issues that require attention,
- Identify mentees who have attitudinal problems requiring psychological, counseling and arrange for the same,
- Conduct interactive sessions apart from one to one session to the extent possible.
- Positively communicate mentee's concerns about a particular course/ other matters to the concerned teachers/ officials.
- To maintain strict confidentiality on mentees' concerns that is of personal/sensitive nature.
- To inform the parents any issue that needs attention
- To encourage a thought process in the students that would encourage a all round holistic growth and development of the mentee.
- To identify the interest area and talent of the mentee and encourage the mentee to pursue the talent,

10. Role of Mentee

All mentees are expected to:

- Take best advantage of the mentoring program of the University and meet designated mentors on a regular basis to resolve academic/ other issues,
- To maintain healthy attendance of the mentor-mentee meetings, University authorities may, in their wisdom, debar students from taking end-semester examination if a mentee does not attend at least 75% of the scheduled meetings,
- Take the feedback provided by the Mentors positively and seriously act upon it,
- Be open and receptive to the new ways of teaching/learning and seek help whenever required.
- Be focused on achieving desired results,
- Have a sense of responsibility and commitment towards their learning pursuits and towards University, Be disciplined, focused and make best use of the University's facilities and experience for maximizing their potential, developing skills/competencies and improve their performance.
- Uphold dignity and prestige of Sharda University. . Shall not indulge in any act which is deemed to be of unbecoming of a student,

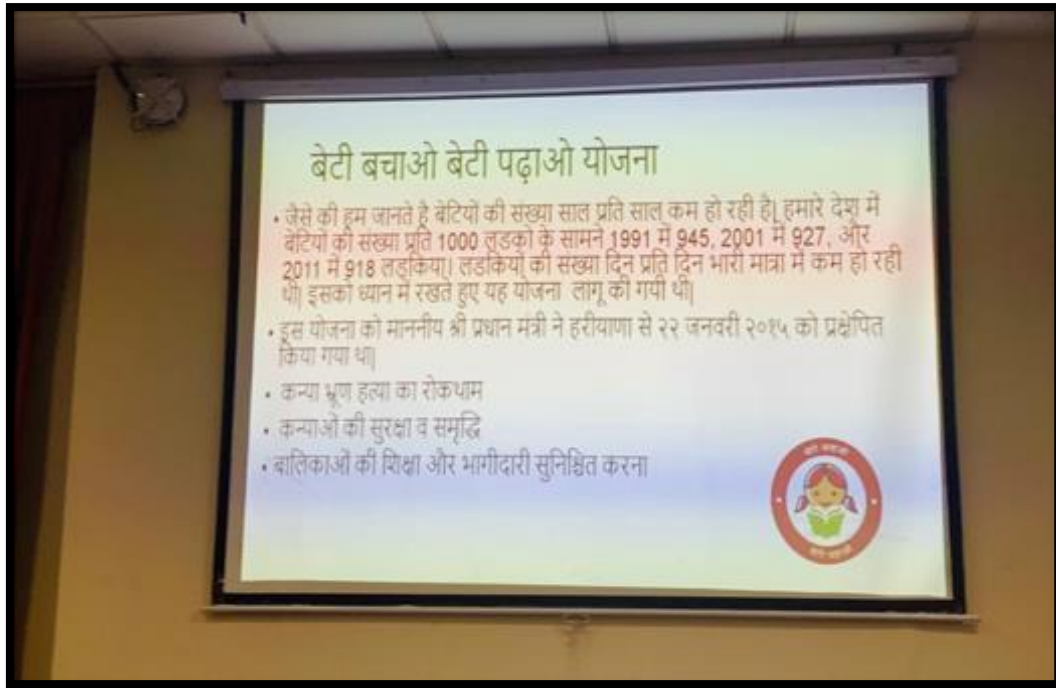



6 CLEAN WATER AND SANITATION



SDG 06 i.e. Clean Water and Sanitation

Introduction

As per the sustainable development goal “Clean water and Sanitation” Sharda University is fully committed to provide access to basic water, sanitation and hygiene services inside the University as well as in community. The University is inhabited by about 16000 people engaged in many diverse activities over an area of about 63 acres. As an institution of higher learning and social change, one of the missions of the University is to ensure holistic development of students as future responsible citizens. In this context to develop a healthy future, best management of water and sanitation facility are on top priority.

All the school buildings, hostels and hospitals of Sharda University are equipped with RO system and have proper sanitation facilities. Hygiene practices are strictly followed in hostel, mess and Sharda hospital.

The University has initiated the promotion of green practices in all its possible academic and non-academic operations. The University has a focused approach for sustainable green practices on the campus, geared towards implementing environmentally conscious activities, having spin-off short and long term financial benefits. Greener and safer practices are followed in labs. Chemical and biochemical wastes are collected and submitted to waste collection agency. Labs are equipped with fume hood, glove box.

The University ‘Waste Management Policy ‘provides for segregation of solid waste into biodegradable waste (wet waste); non-biodegradable waste (dry waste) and hazardous waste. The wet waste is converted as compost, the dry waste is segregated into the recyclable and non-recyclables for disposal. The food and wet waste is processed/ decomposed by an on-campus Compost Plant. Rainwater harvesting system of the University ensures reduction, recycle and reuse of water. There is a 400KLD capacity STP and 30KLD ETP for treating effluents; the recycled water is used for horticulture and flushing system, and the sludge for manure.

Biomedical waste is disposed-off in accordance with the statutory norms. Due process is also followed in handling hazardous chemicals and radioactive waste management. Reduce, recycle and reuse policy is implemented in case of water. For irrigation, sprinkler and drip irrigation system is used, wherever feasible. University has procured automated water spray vehicle to control the dust in the campus. Battery operated vehicles have been introduced to move around the campus. The campus has been declared 'No-Noise Zone'. Used paper is reused. Massive plantation has resulted in more than 4000 plants succeeding. Students through Students' club, NSS and Eco-Task Force actively engage in green practices and thereby safeguarding the environment. Landscaping and attractive greenery also serve the purpose of reduced pollution and ground water recharging. Complete ban on smoking and burning any material on the campus has been imposed to maintain the hygiene. The University has embedded three-credit course on green practices in curricula and its relevance for conservation of natural resources and environment. Community Connect course also contributes in spreading awareness on issues such as pollution and the measures to contain the same by the community. The large scale plantation has perceptibly brought down temperature on the campus. Similarly, rain water harvesting measures and conservation of water, structured waste management, etc., have contributed to the overall improvement in the maintenance and up keep of the University at a lower operational cost. Participation of students in environmental protection practices is a positive sign for a clean and green future. It is expected that the future generation will benefit from improved sanitation and water quality.

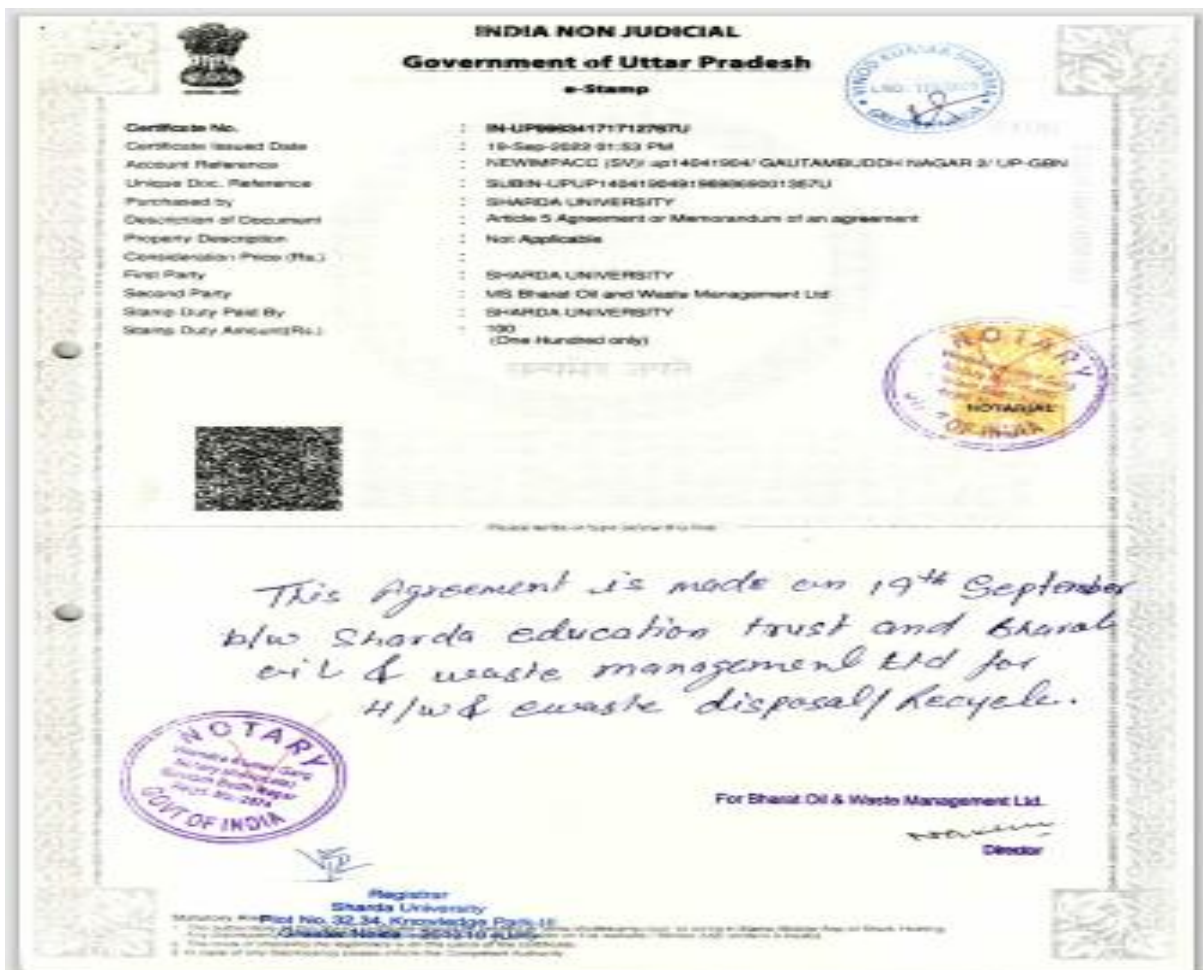


Fig. Agreement between Sharda University and waste management agency

Faculty members and students go out in the communities, create the awareness and distribute the masks, liquid soaps, sanitary pads etc.

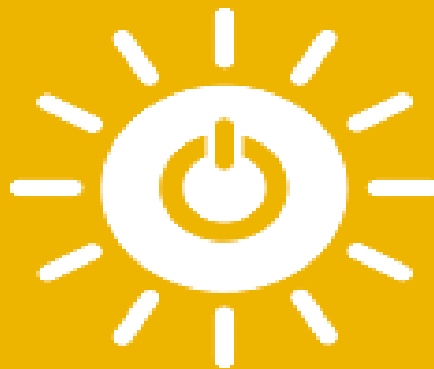

7.2 University Measures Towards Affordable and Clean Energy

Affordable and clean energy measure is one of the top priorities at Sharda University of Eminence. Teaching about and conducting research on clean and alternative energy sources are two ways to support clean energy programme. On campus, we have also made great strides towards environmental sustainability through clean energy projects, waste management procedures, energy conservation measures, and collaboration with stakeholders to have a beneficial impact on the surrounding community large. With sustainable, affordable and clean energy, we address the pressing need to slow down climate change and the world's rising energy consumption. It concerns the availability of inexpensive, clean energy. Energy research is one of the top priorities of the Sharda University of Eminence. Through our teaching and research on clean and alternative energy sources, we contribute to promote futuristic approaches towards clean energy. On campus, we have also made great progress toward environmental sustainability via waste management techniques, energy saving measures, sustainable energy programs, and partnerships with stakeholders to benefit the larger community.

7.2.1 Energy-efficient renovation and building

Have a policy in place for ensuring all renovations or new builds are following energy efficiency standards

Response: Newly constructed building is energy efficient

Sharda university newly constructed building standards and practices to develop energy - efficient and sustainable buildings, which can significantly reduce energy consumption to promote clean energy. The Indian Green Building Council (IGBC) created the GRIHA (Green assessment for Integrated Habitat Assessment) assessment system to evaluate all Indian buildings' environmental performance. The goal is to encourage the design and construction of buildings using sustainable and energy-efficient methods. Sharda University newly constructed building is certified by GRIHA in the case of a university building means that the structure uses sustainable features and adheres to environmentally conscious practises. GRIHA places emphasis on a number of important elements. In order to minimise energy usage, the building should include energy-efficient technology like insulation, solar panels, and energy-efficient lighting systems. To reduce water usage and handle water resources efficiently, the building should have wastewater treatment facilities, rainwater harvesting systems, and water-efficient fixtures installed. The planning and selection of the building's site should give special

consideration to the building's accessibility to public transit, waste management systems, and green spaces, all of which will lower pollution and provide a healthier atmosphere. The choice of materials for the building should take into account the building's life cycle impact, as well as the usage of low-carbon and sustainable resources and minimal waste production. To give residents a healthy and cosy environment, the building should guarantee excellent thermal comfort, natural lighting, and indoor air quality. GRIHA-certified university buildings use these ideas to provide healthier environments for workers and students, lessen their negative effects on the environment, and promote sustainable development.

Have plans to upgrade existing buildings to higher energy efficiency

Response: University building is highly energy efficient.

The university buildings are IGBC1 and LEED2 certified, and steps have been taken to increase energy efficiency by adding solar panels, energy-efficient lighting in new construction, lean occupancy sensors in restrooms, reviewing, analysing, and renovating laboratories for

operational safety and environmental preservation, computing carbon footprints, and launching initiatives to achieve carbon emission neutrality. To update our Energy consumption analysis and conservation strategy, we constantly evaluate how we consume energy and look for areas where we can improve. Through energy-efficient practises in campus operations, this aids in the optimisation and wise use of energy. We're dedicated to moving towards clean and green energy initiatives. With the assistance of university management, strategic activities have been launched to transition to "clean power" and lessen reliance on "fossil fuels" in order to accomplish. Selected hostels now have solar water heaters and a 430kwp solar power plant has been erected to switch from entirely relying on captive power to solar power.

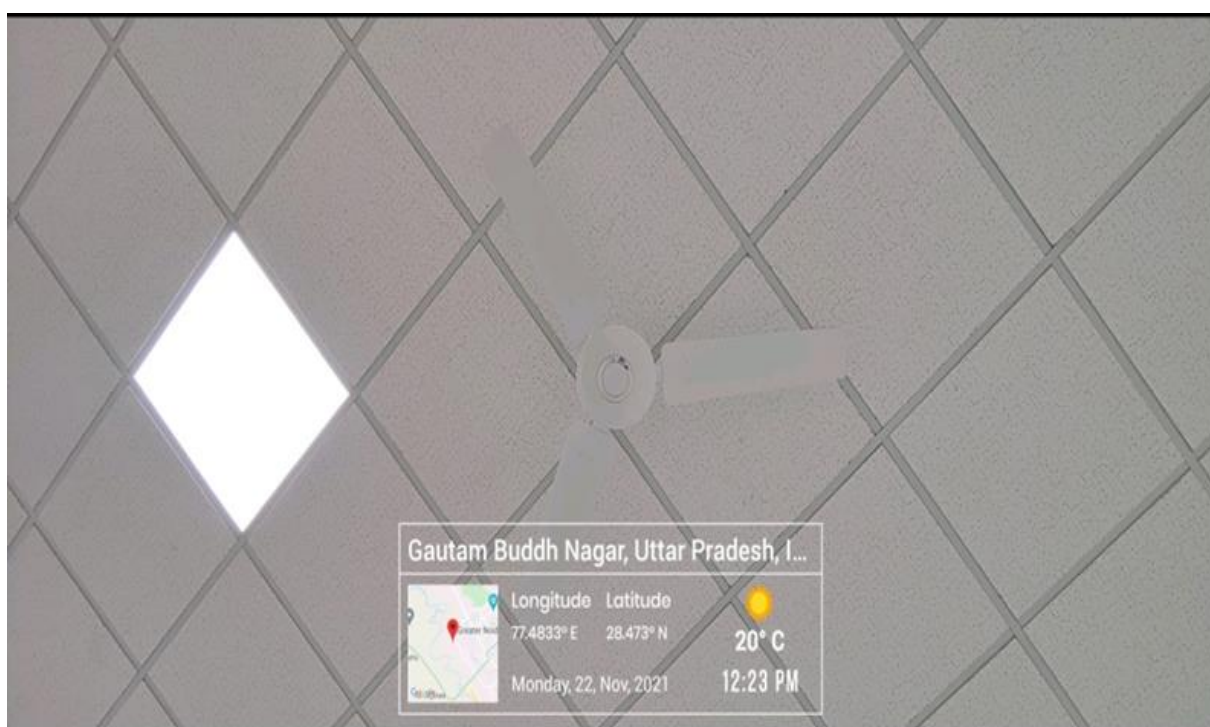


Fig.2. BLDC Fans in Building

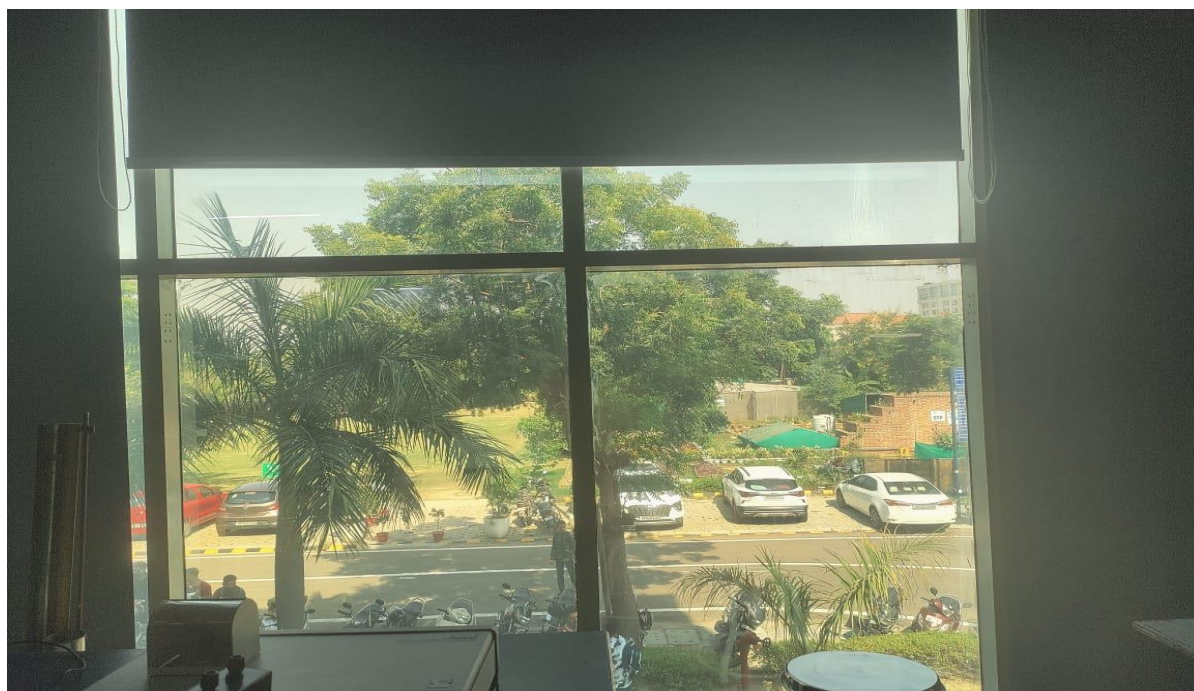


Fig.6. Heat protected films are used on window to energy conservation

7.2.3 Carbon reduction and emission reduction process

Have a process for carbon management and reducing carbon dioxide emissions.

Response: Ecofriendly vehicles are promoting to carbon management .

To encourage carbon reduction and less carbon dioxide emission, Sharda University have started green campus projects. These programmes include energy conservation, waste management, energy-efficient building construction, and the promotion of environmentally friendly transportation choices. Indian universities conduct campaigns and outreach initiatives to inform students and the community at large about the significance of clean energy. The aforementioned programmes seek to raise awareness, facilitate behavioural modifications, and stimulate the integration of clean energy practises throughout society. Sharda University also take initiative to develop new innovation to detect and prevention of Carbon emission not only in campus also in different areas of Greater Noida. A biogas power plant is installed to facilitate undergraduate and post graduate students in the study and usage of renewable energy. The 15 cubic meter biogas plant is set up behind Mandela Hostel. Food waste of 100- 300 kgs approx per day drawn from Mess canteens and added with cow dung water mixture is used as raw material. The raw material content takes 3-4 days for biogas formation which is used to regenerate approx. 4KVA electric energy. Thus, food waste is converted into a resource and

creating value in the form of electric power generation. The plant is utilizing the recent technology to generate the efficient energy.

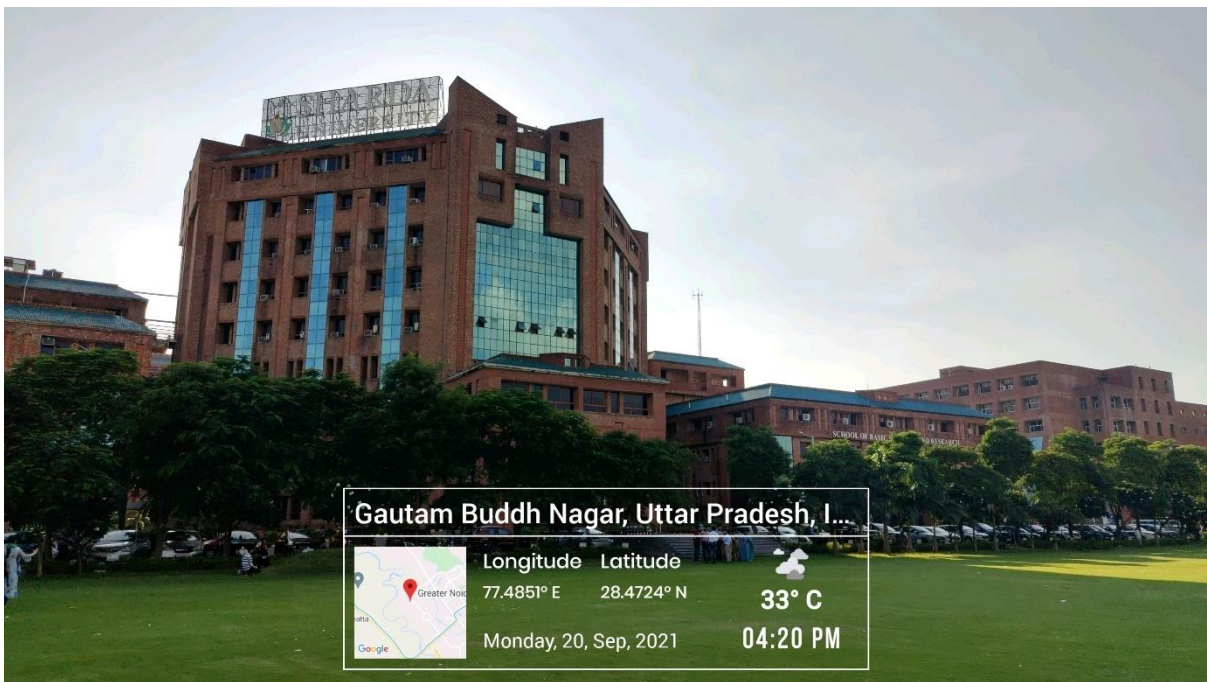
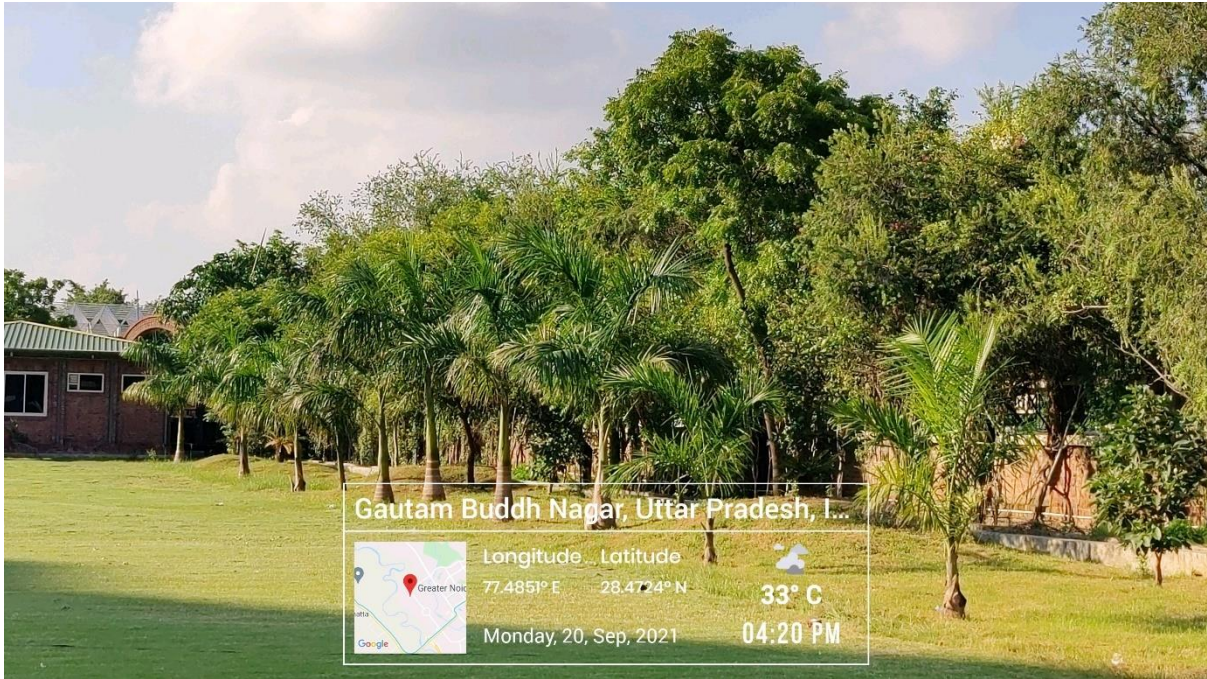


Fig.10. Promote Green Area and Plantation to Reduce Carbon dioxide

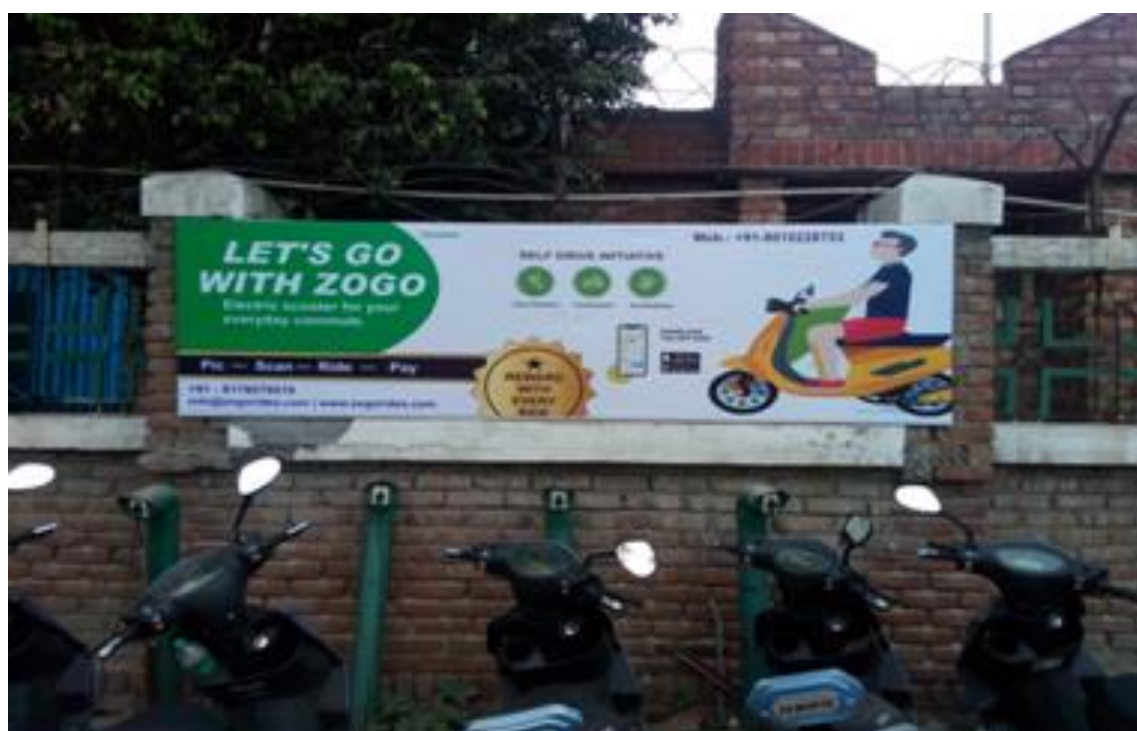


Fig.13. Eco-Friendly Transport Facility for Carbon Reduction

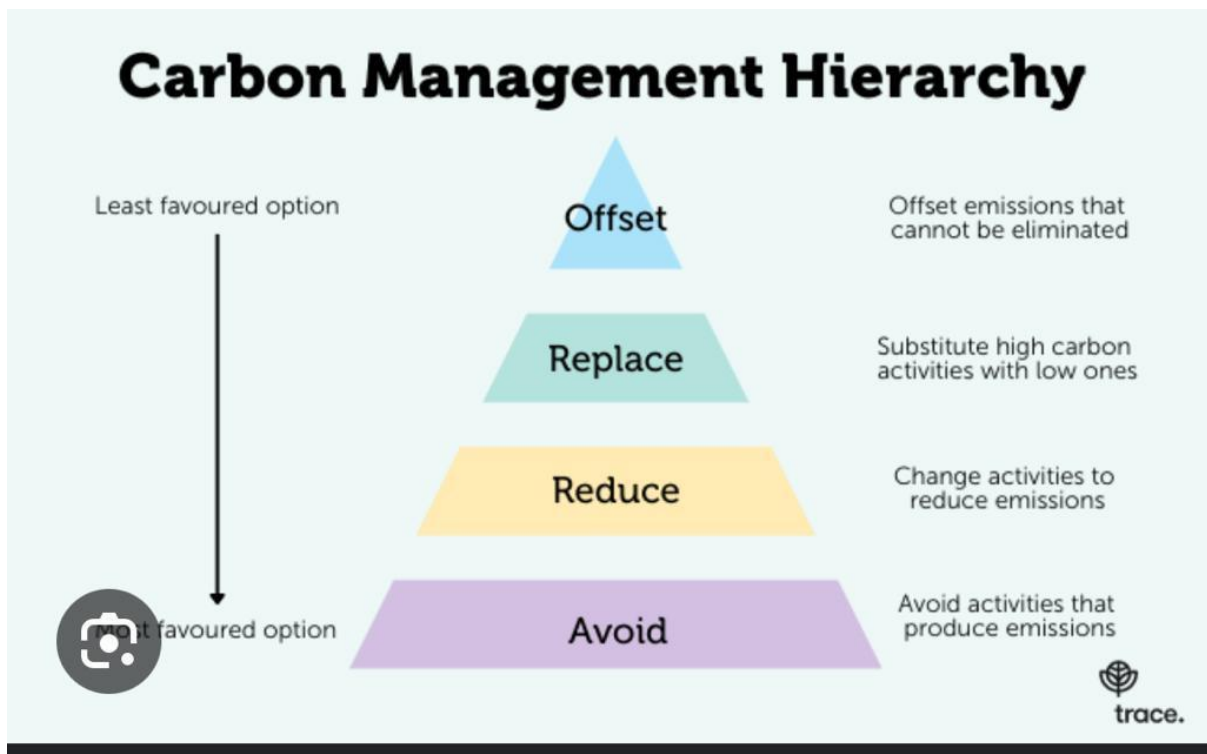


Fig.14. Carbon Management Programme organised by Sharda University

7.2.4 Plan to reduce energy consumption

Have an energy efficiency plan in place to reduce overall energy consumption.

Response: University initiative for renewable energy

Sharda University is enhancing green campus initiatives regularly in the campus by involving all its stakeholders, especially, students and staff of the university. Multifold measures are taken to manage the green and clean campus.

Green audit is conducted recently in the campus and following measures are initiated to implement the greening the campus.

- Only authorized automobiles are allowed to enter and move in the campus with a pollution check and majority of the vehicles remained outside the campus boundary.
- Bicycles and battery operated vehicles are promoted in the campus among students and staff members.
- Separate user friendly pedestrian pathways have been created to enhance the on foot movements and reduce the use of vehicle in the campus.
- Plastic bags are completely banned in the campus and paper bags are recommended to all the vendors inside the campus, if required.
- Systematic landscaping has been developed with grass and plants in all the big park of the university to enhance the use of park by students and staff members.

- Solar systems for water heating and Solar energy for street lights
- PeopleSoft ERP system is implementation for the academic, purchase and stores, finance, and other activities, with which the paper waste is minimized.
- Environmental clearance from the Uttar Pradesh state pollution boards is taken.
- Separate sewage treatment plant to treat the sewage water from campus and the treated water is used for gardening.
- The garbage generated from Campus is segregated within the campus only and sent to the designated areas through outsourced vendors as per the directions of state pollution board.
- Wet garbage generated from campus dining halls is fed into a bio gas plant to generate gas which in turn is used for mess canteen.
- Tree plantation is regularly carried out to plant new plants so as to increase the number of trees in the campus.
- LED lights are being installed in place of traditional lights so as to reduce the heat level in the university campus.

Battery operated transport facility within the campus is deployed with admission and facilitation cell for movement of students and staff in different building blocks of the Sharda University. Most common route of this facility is from Block 1- Block 7 to Central Library fulfilling the movement needs of the students. University has taken an initiative of providing e-scooter ride to the students and staff of the University. Pollution free Electric-Scooter with chargeable battery facilitates shuttle between major public transport point such as Knowledge Park – 2 Metro station and Jagat Farm bus stop in Greater Noida.



Pedestrian Friendly Pathways- University has constructed pedestrian friendly pathway to move from one block to another and so as not to move on the road amid the vehicles.

Landscaping with trees and plants - In Financial Year 2021 a total of 905 trees' saplings were planted. Sharda University conducted tree plantation drive in university. Shri KK Gupta ACEO, GNIDA was the Chief Guest he planted trees and appreciated the efforts taken by the university in improving the greenery and in protection of the environment. Shri Promod Shrivastava, DFO said that we should not restrict ourselves to planting trees but to nurture and protect the plants thereafter. The Vice Chancellor, Prof Sibaram Khara planted Kachnar sapling and highlighted on the beautiful violet flowers which bloom on it. Prof H S Gaur, Dean School of Agricultural Sciences on the occasion told that the plantation drive commenced with Shri YK Gupta, Pro-Chancellor Sharda University planting tree, thereafter a lot many fruit trees, shade trees, ornamental trees have been planted like Aonla an Indian gooseberry variety, Guava, Jamun which have medicinal and nutritious values. List of trees planted in the University and pics of different locations are enclosed for perusal please.

Crop Cafeteria - A Crop Cafeteria has been established over 50,000 sqft on the campus.

Greenhouse and Green garden- A poly green-house has been established in which high value off-season vegetables like tomato, cherry tomato, bell-peppers, cucumbers and seedlings of various vegetables and flowers are grown organically without using any pesticides.

Paperless office - The administration of university has been made paperless by using following:

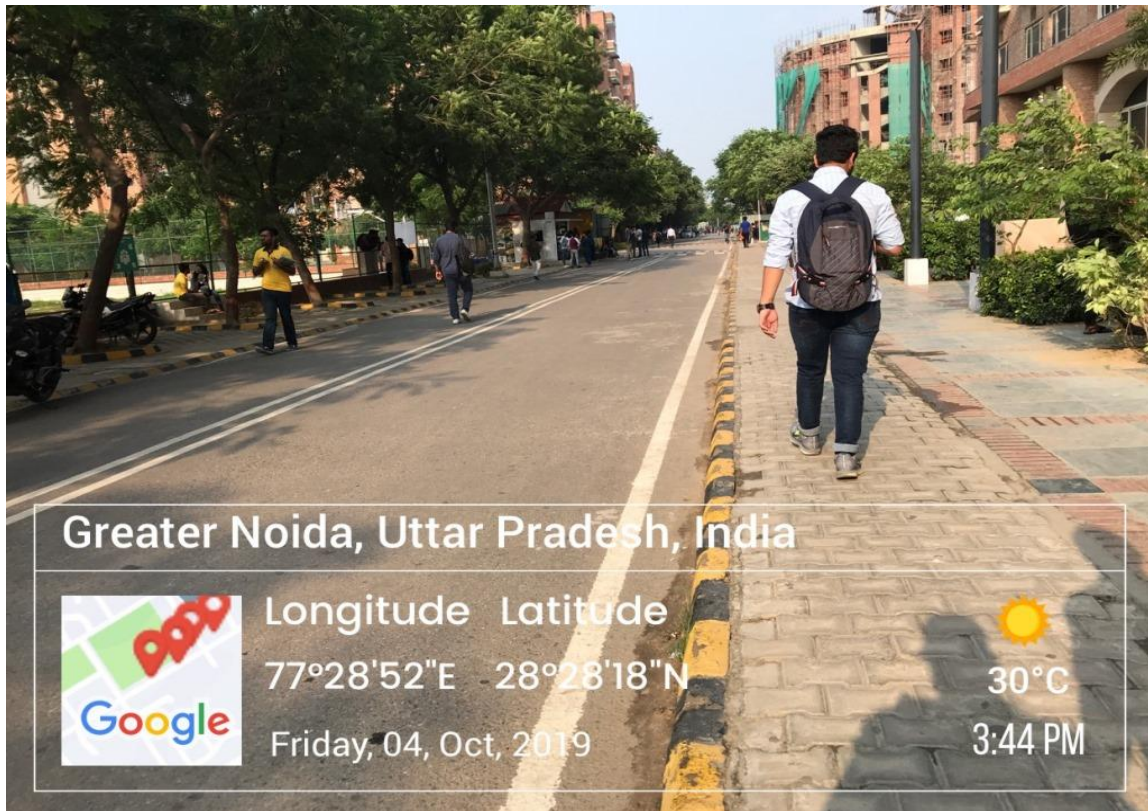
- a) All Libraries are automated and connected with Libsys7software.
- b) Attendance is automated via an App based solution, V-Attendance.
- c) E-Learning system for student-faculty interaction is online via LMS.
- d) Departments of Finance, HR and Campus Solutions are interconnected via PeopleSoft ERPv9.2
- e) HR Services are automated using HRSS employee utility.
- f) Electronic payment of fee is enabled with multiple payment options like Pay-U, Paytm, and banks.
- g) Hostel allotment systems are digitized.
- h) Passport/Visa extension reminders are automated for international students.

CNG operated University transport - The use of Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) as a transport fuel is a mature technology. In our University, we are using this fuel in our all of the Buses and Cars.

Use of PNG in University mess -To consider PNG as a pollution free fuel, economical and safer; in our campus we are using the Piped Natural gas (PNG) in our Mess for cooking the food for students and staff.

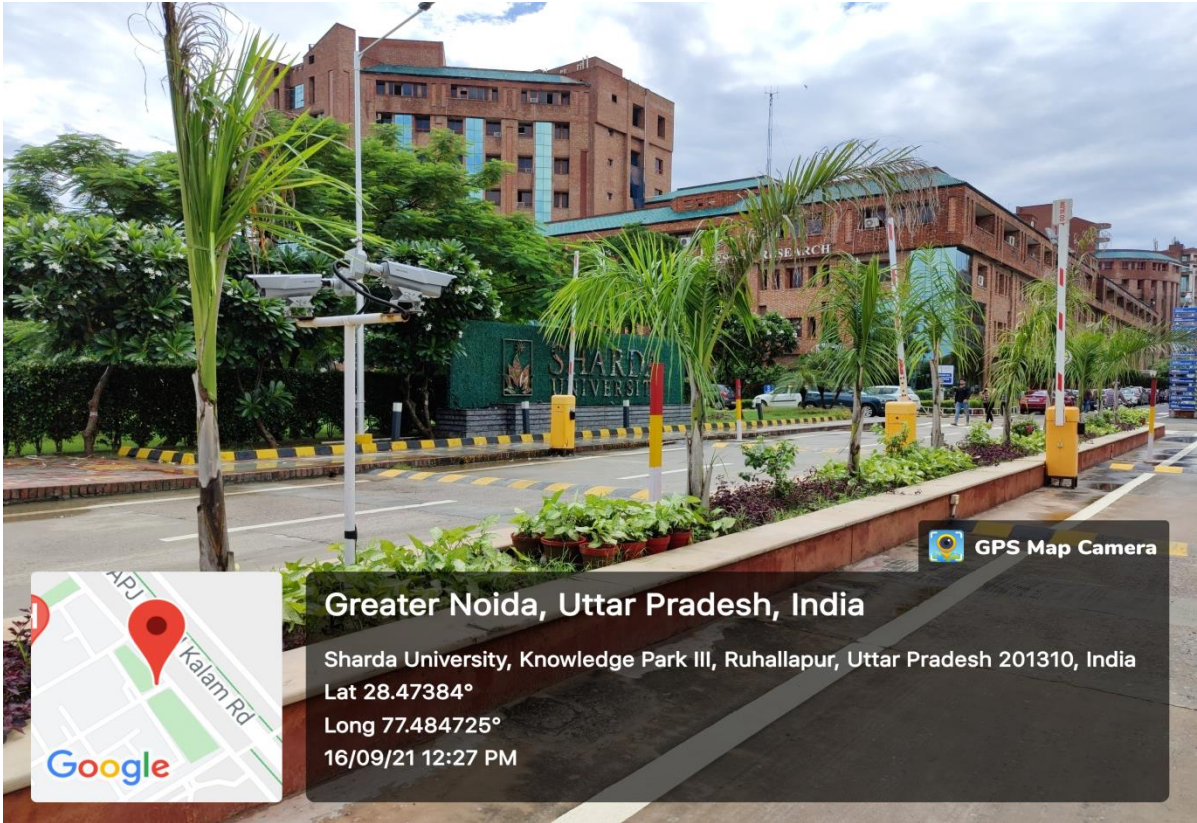
Use of Solar energy - Sharda University has installed Roof Top solar PV plant of 1 Mw peak capacity under RESCO model. The power plant is distributed over the roof top of 11 buildings. This includes 2 buildings of Sharda Hospital where Roof Top Plant of 204kW is installed. The solar power plant capacity is therefore 796 kW peak. The actual building wise plant capacities

and generation from solar PV plant are given in the annexure. The PV solar panels along with the inverter are installed on the roof top of the building where as the point of connection is the 415V three phase A.C. BUSBAR in the electrical mains panel located in the ground floor or basement of that building. The power loss in the cable has been minimized in this way. The power is purchased from the RESCO under a power purchase agreement (PPA).



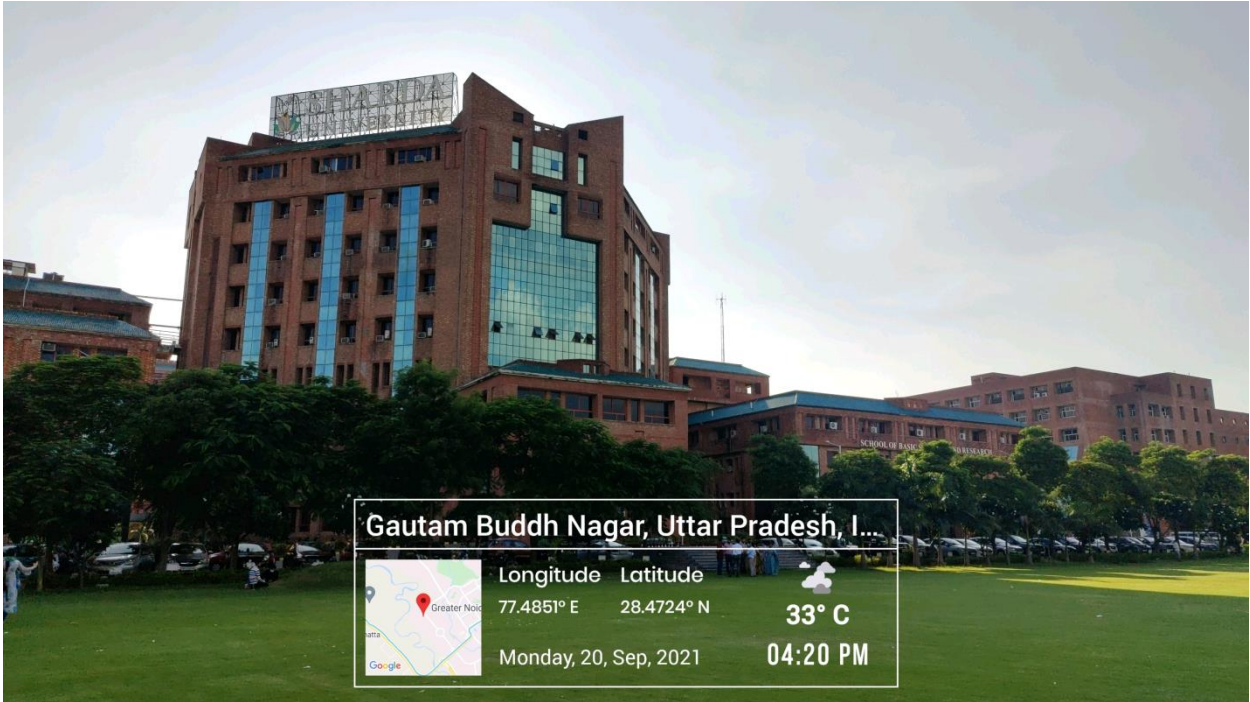

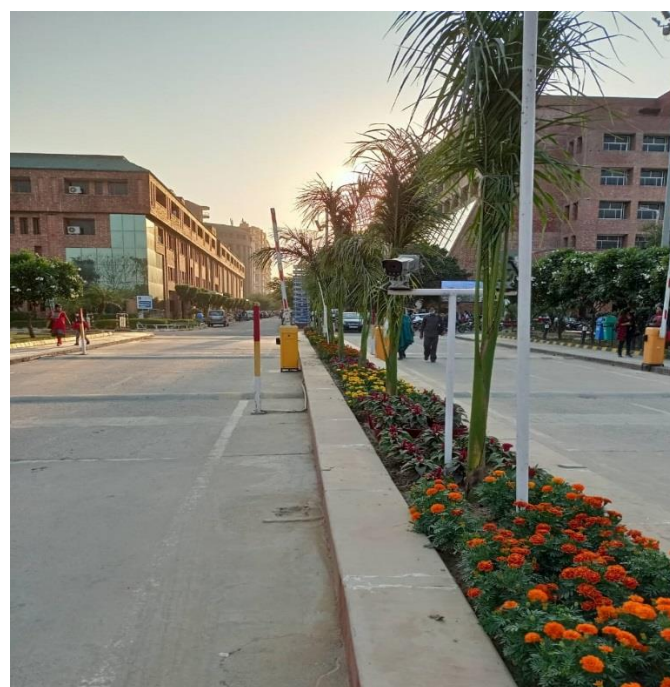

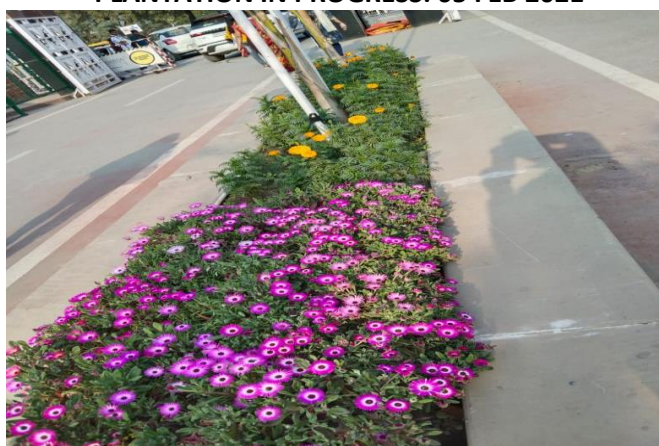

7.4.1 Local community outreach for energy efficiency

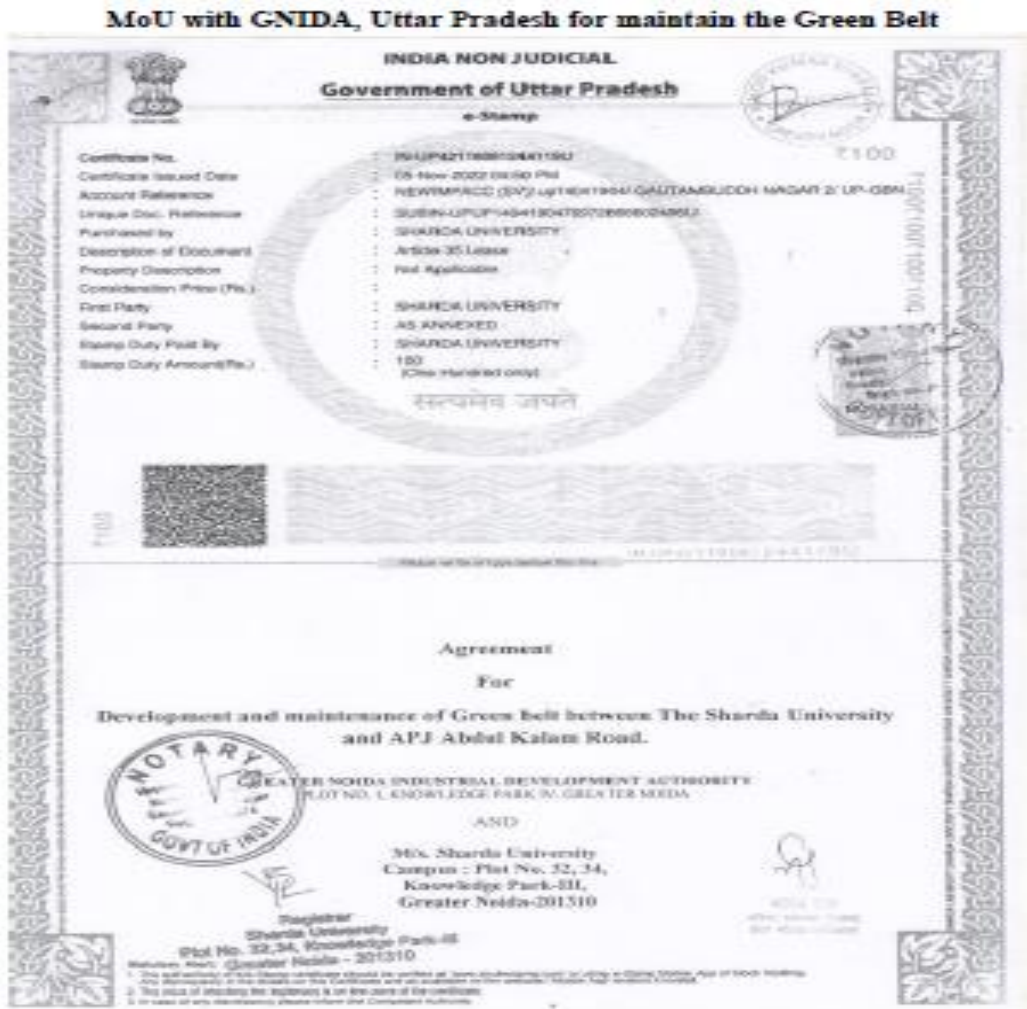
Provide programmes for local community to learn about importance of energy efficiency and clean energy

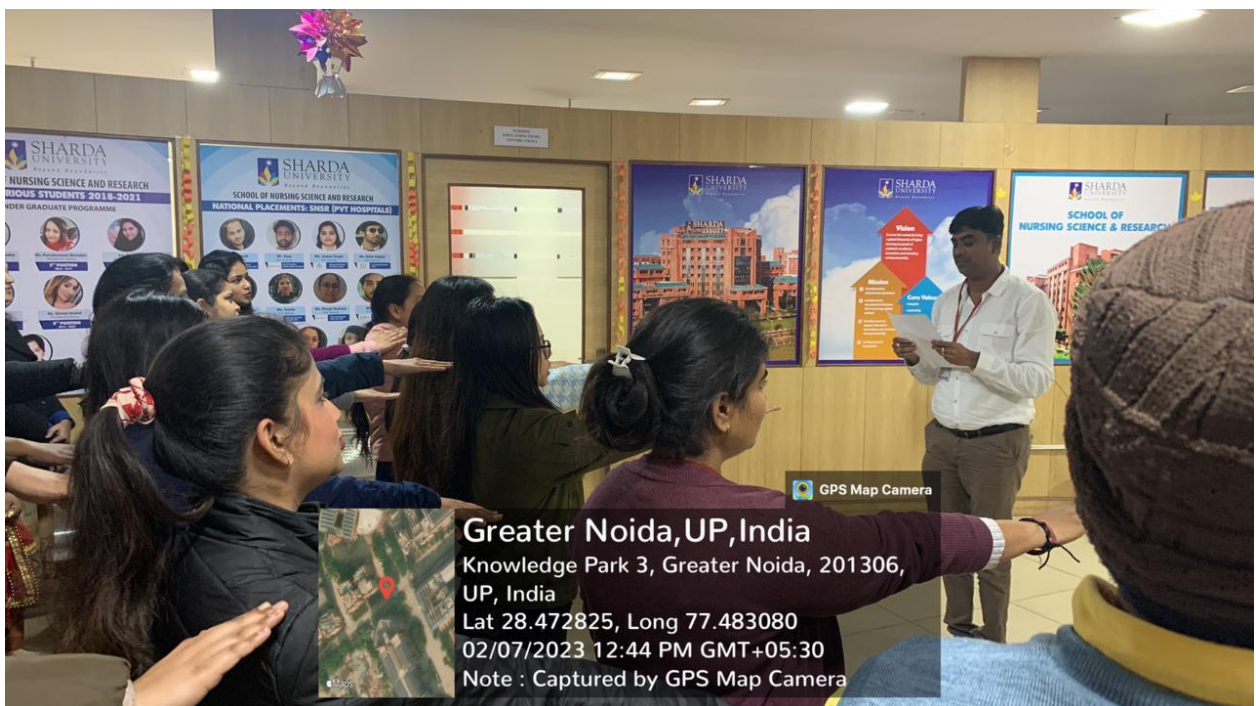

D. student from Department of Physics, developing the laboratory scale production of activated carbon synthesized from PVC with CoCl_2 and H_3PO_4 , which is cheaper and has a good yield source material. A prototype supercapacitor is also successfully developed using activated carbon as an electrode material derived from the PVC polymer and IL (1-ethyl-3-methylimidazolium thiocyanate) as the electrolyte. The performance of the supercapacitor was estimated via electrochemical impedance spectroscopy, cyclic voltammetry, and the charge–discharge technique. The supercapacitor offered a high specific capacitance of $\sim 120 \text{ F g}^{-1}$ at 5 m V s^{-1} . The performances of the supercapacitor were also estimated up to 15 days and up to 9000 cycles via cyclic voltammetry.

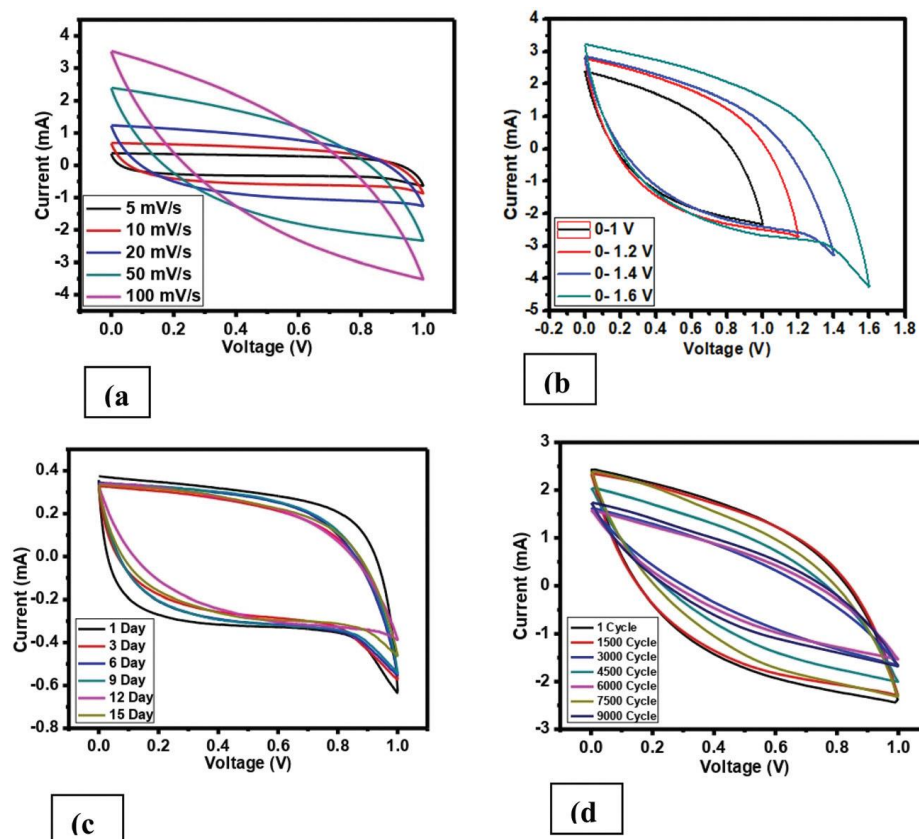


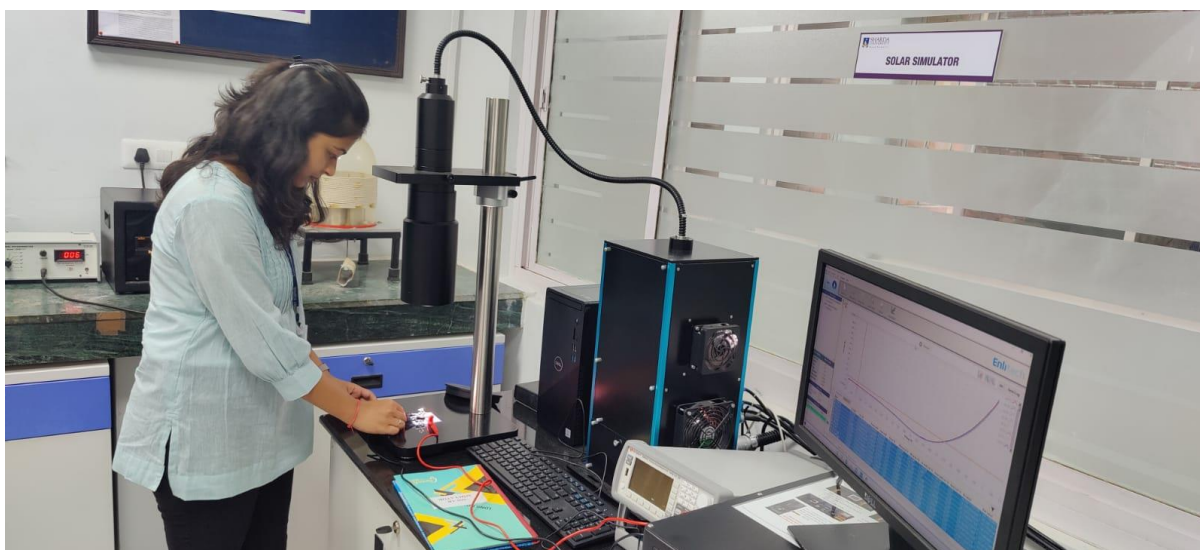
Figure 1 Cyclic voltammetry curve of the fabricated supercapacitors (a) with varying scan rate, (b) with varying voltage range, (c) on different days, (d) on 9000 cycles.

Development of highly conducting ionic liquid doped polymer electrolyte for energy storage applications

Two Ph. D. students from the department of Physics working on the development of highly conducting ionic liquid doped polymer electrolyte for energy storage applications. The main aim of their work is to optimize highly conducting solid polymer electrolytes by doping of ionic liquid in a Poly-ethylene oxide (PEO) polymer complexed Sodium Iodide (NaI) matrix. Electrical, thermal, structural, and optical studies confirm the homogenous complexation of polymer electrolytes with ionic liquid. Furthermore, the electric double-layer capacitors (EDLCs) device and Dye Sensitized Solar Cell (DSSC) has been developed using high conducting ionic liquid (IL) polymer electrolyte with maximum conductivity, demonstrating that ionic liquids have a potential possibility to choose as an electrolyte in developed energy devices.

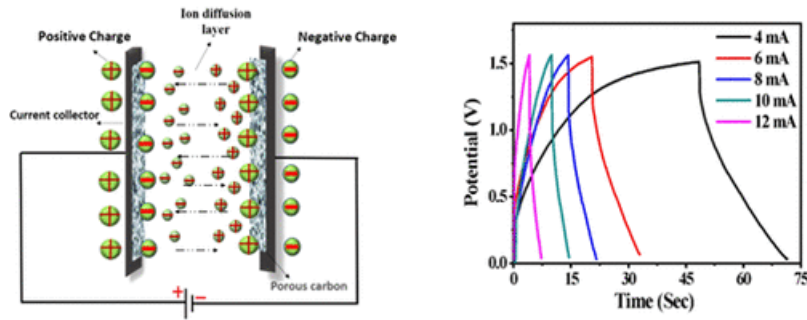


Developing Biopolymer-Based Electrolytes for Supercapacitor and Dye-Sensitized Solar Cell Applications

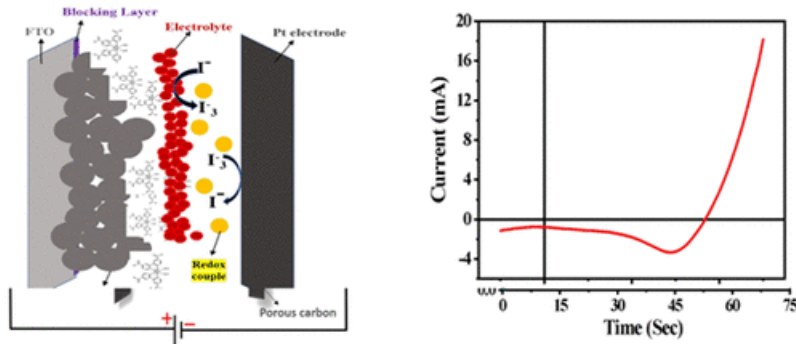
Prof. P.K. Singh and their research is work on solar cell and renewable energy under Centre of excellence in Department of Physics to achieve goal of affordable clean energy source. The biopolymer employed in this study is cornflour, and the ionic liquid 1-ethyl 3-methylimidazolium thiocyanate is used to create an electrochemical double-layer capacitor (EDLC) and a dye-sensitized solar cell (DSSC). An ionic-liquid-doped biopolymer electrolyte (ILBPE) with a high conductivity is created by incorporating various weight ratios of the ionic liquid into the polymer host. Comprehensive characterizations are done for the electrical, structural, and photoelectrochemical components.

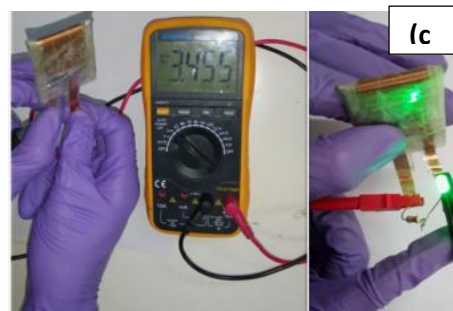
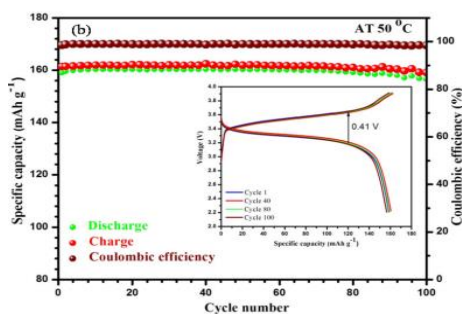
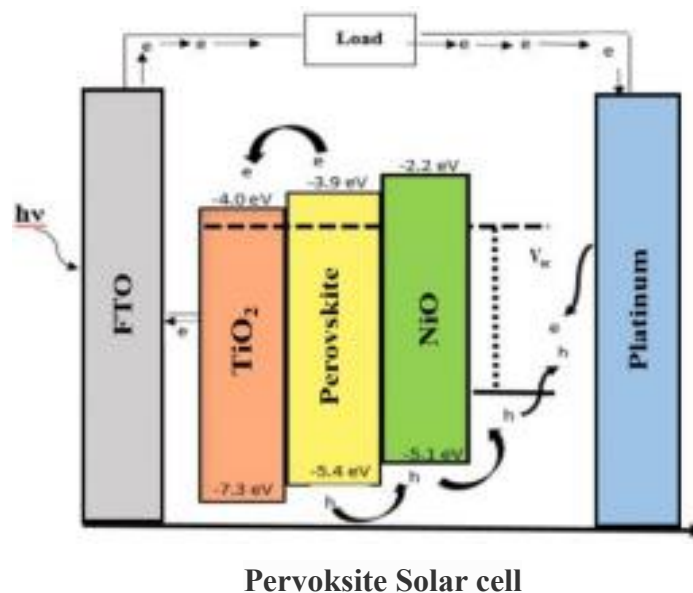

Pervoksite Solar cell for clean energy:

Dr. Monika Srivastava from department of Physics working on perovskite solar cell. The Pervoksite, HTM, and polymer electrolyte and their application in a PSC at room ambient following the sandwich structure. A planar WE/TiO₂/CH₃NH₃PbI₃/HTM/electrolyte/CE structure fabricated through solution-processed spin-coating and the electrical properties of the PSC shown the high efficiency of 13.64%, with Voc=0.63V and J_{sc}=33mA/cm² with fill factor = 0.65. This work shows the sandwich-structured fabrication of the PSC in ambient condition with a considerably good efficiency which represents the novelty of the work.

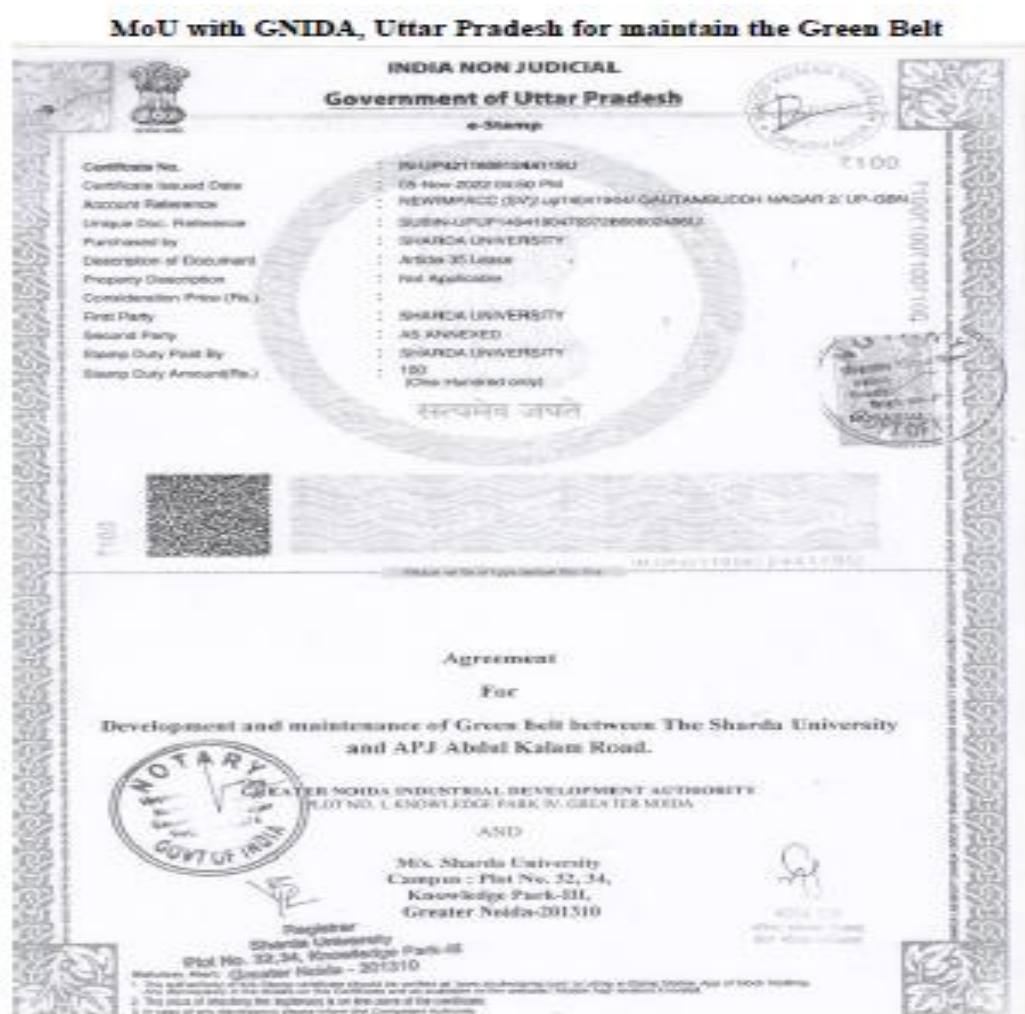

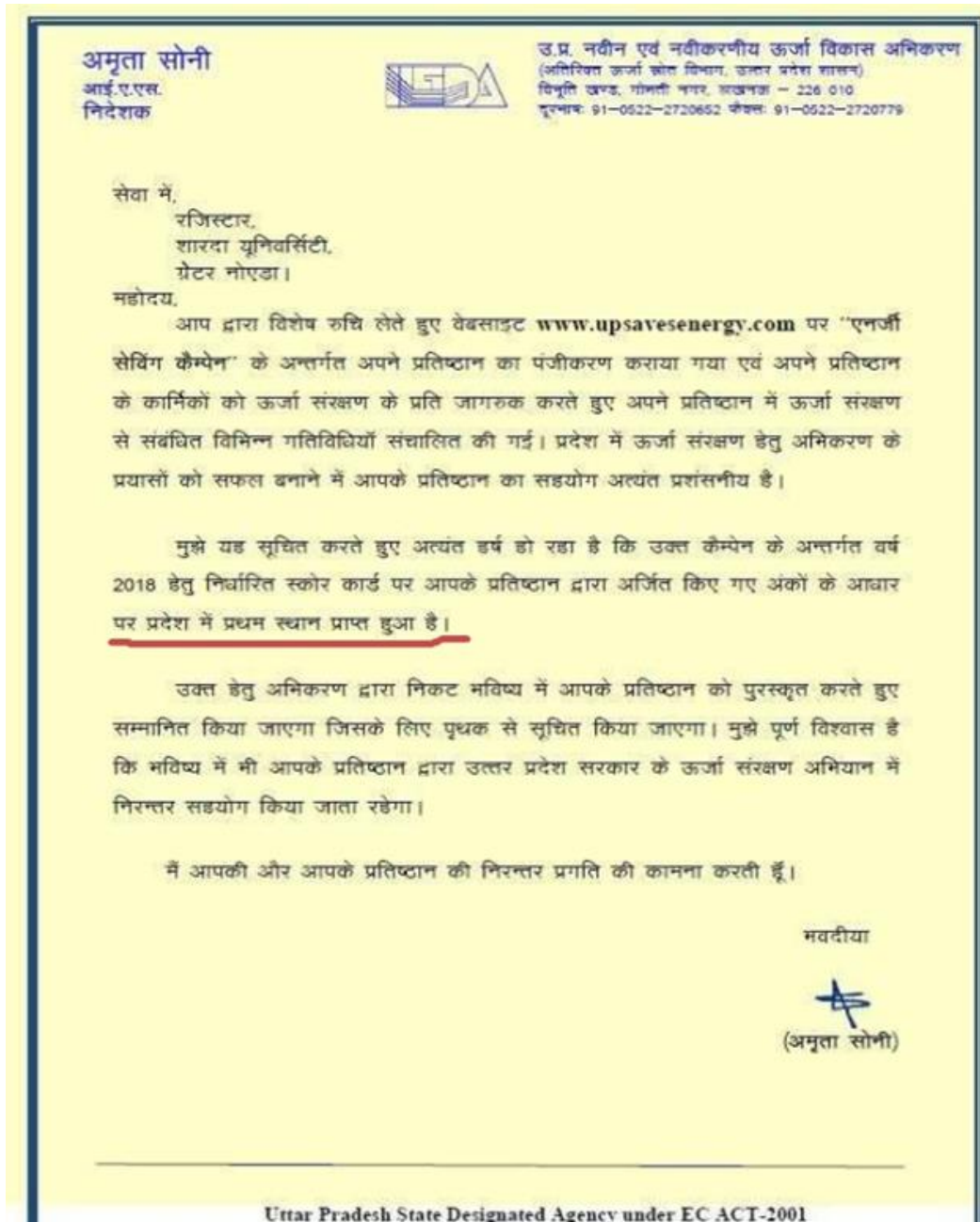

Higher Education Institutes play a crucial role in fostering innovation, entrepreneurship, and startup culture. They often implement various initiatives to support students, faculty, and alumni in their entrepreneurial endeavors. Creating an Innovation and Entrepreneurial Ecosystem is an integral part of the Vision and Mission of Sharda University. The University has taken various strategic initiatives to nurture innovation and entrepreneurship among the students and faculty and bring the cultural and attitudinal shift from job seeker to job giver. Sharda University is renowned for its emphasis on innovation and entrepreneurship by offering a range of resources to support local start-ups. These initiatives play a pivotal role in nurturing the entrepreneurial ecosystem, not only within the University but also the community at large. The University has augmented its innovation and entrepreneurial initiatives with mission statements:

- Encourage and nurture aspiring entrepreneurs in converting their ideas to potential ventures through business incubation.
- Equip innovators and entrepreneurs with skills required to develop the potential ventures into highly scalable businesses which can create large scale socio-economic impact.
- Facilitate entrepreneurs and early stage startups to scale up their ventures through access to a network of entrepreneurial ecosystem enablers.
- Promote entrepreneurship as a career among the students by integrating credit benefits with the efforts made by the students towards being an entrepreneur.
- Extend the facilities of business incubation to entrepreneurs external to the University.

Innovation Labs and Centres: Sharda University has established various prototyping labs, innovation labs and research centres. These facilities provide innovators and startups an access to a range of state-of-the-art facilities where ideas can be validated through development of proof of concept. The availability of these resources has proven instrumental in accelerating the development and prototyping phases of start-up ventures. Some of these facilities which has

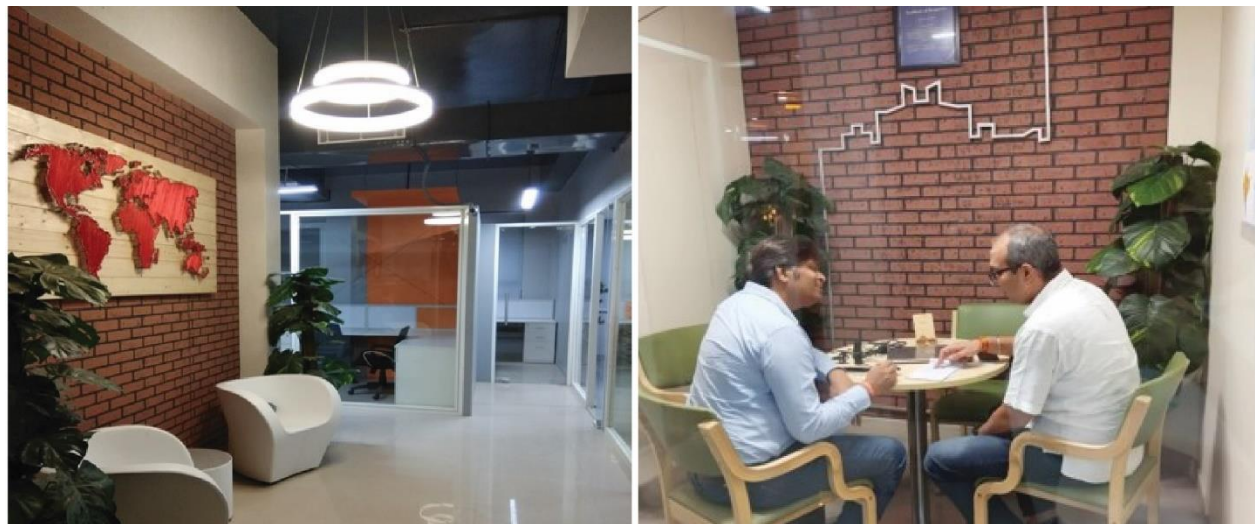
Business Incubator:

Entrepreneurship plays a vital role in ensuring a strong resource for economic development of the country. In line with the flagship initiatives of the Government of India such as Star-up India, Atal Innovation Mission and Aatmanirbhar Bharat, Sharda University established an incubation facility - Sharda Launchpad Federation (SLP). This facility is registered under section 8 of Companies Act 2013, Govt. of India and serves as a Special Purpose Vehicle (SPV) to promote innovation and incubation within the University and for the external community. The incubator is approved as a Business Incubator by Government of Uttar Pradesh under UP Startup Policy 2020 and Ministry of MSME and also a member of SIDBI Delhi NCR Incubator Network Program. The incubator has partnered with entrepreneurship ecosystem enablers such as MSME Chamber of Commerce,

EzyLegal, Paytm, YES Bank, IIT Roorkee Alumni Association, AWS Activate, Fundenable and various other startup ecosystem stakeholders.

Sharda Launchpad provides a platform for new, small and medium – scale enterprises for the development and management of the enterprise. To understand the enterprise better, Sharda Launchpad offers mentoring by the in-house-faculty and industry experts for budding entrepreneurial students and alumni. To foster the spirit of competition, Sharda students are nominated and guided for various inter and intra-college entrepreneurial contests.

Sharda Launchpad has supported more than 100 innovators through pre-incubation mentoring and 60+ startups have been supported through incubation. Startups are supported through dedicated one-to-one mentoring and group masterclasses.



**Mentoring:**

The university, through its incubator, operates a comprehensive mentoring program that connects aspiring entrepreneurs and startup founders with experienced mentors. These mentors, often comprising faculty members, successful alumni, and industry experts, provide invaluable guidance on various aspects of entrepreneurship. Various group masterclasses are conducted on multiple aspects of entrepreneurship. This includes business planning, market research, financial modeling, and networking strategies. The mentorship program has received commendation for its effectiveness in helping start-ups navigate challenges and make informed decisions.



Workshops and Training Programs:

Sharda University hosts regular training programs and workshops designed to address specific challenges faced by start-ups. The training sessions are conducted by accomplished professionals and are structured to be practical and hands-on, equipping entrepreneurs with the skills and knowledge necessary for success. These workshops provide a platform for entrepreneurs to interact, learn from industry experts, and collaborate on innovative solutions. Topics covered include funding opportunities, intellectual property protection, and effective business communication. Attendees consistently praise the workshops for their relevance and applicability to real-world scenarios. More than 40 such programs have been conducted during the year 2022 and more than 1000 students and startups have been benefitted.

Sharda University has introduced a credit course named Introduction to Entrepreneurship (course code IED001) in which undergraduate students study about various aspects of entrepreneurship and identify problem statements from industry and society and develop business model on their probable solutions.



Financial Assistance:

Sharda University offers seed funding or grants to help students and faculty turn their innovative ideas into prototypes. This funding can be used for product development, market research, and other essential activities. To facilitate and motivate student and faculty entrepreneurs, up to 80% cost of company registration is reimbursed through the incubator Sharda Launchpad Federation. The University also offers in-kind support by providing pre-incubation to aspiring student entrepreneurs at no cost. The monthly charges for co-work space are also waived off for the undergraduate student entrepreneurs. Various innovators and entrepreneurs have been mentored and facilitated for the grants under different State and Centre Government scheme such as Seed capital under UP Startup Policy and prototype grant under MSME Idea Hackathon.





Innovations and Startups on Low Carbon Initiatives:

The University and its incubator have supported various innovators and startups working in the domain of low carbon technology and carbon sequestration during the year 2022.

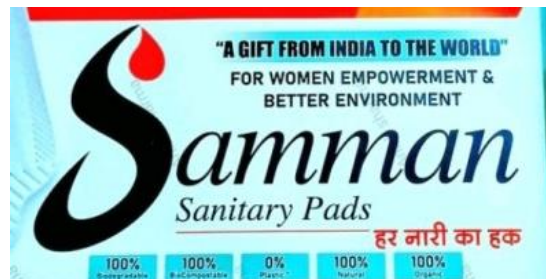
Navstream Innovations LLP:: A startup founded by the undergraduate students of Sharda University and incubated at Sharda Launchpad, the company is developing energy management system. The initial prototype is a battery management system for Electric Vehicles. The startup aims to extend it by developing system which will enhance the efficiency of solar power systems. The startup has received a grant of Rs. 15 lakhs under Ministry of MSME Idea Hackathon through Sharda University as Host Institute.

Verdant Motors Private Ltd: A team of young entrepreneurs incubated at Sharda Launchpad were supported with office space, lab facility and technology mentoring to develop the prototype and MVP of their electric two wheelers. The startup has indigenously designed and developed all the major parts of their vehicle and reached to revenue generation stage.



Pineal Innovations Private Limited: The startup has developed sanitary pads will provide affordable, plastic free sanitary pads targeting the rural population. This invention aims to utilize sugarcane waste to develop low-cost sanitary pads. This invention aims to remove absorbent gels and use natural absorbents like fuller's earth and psyllium husk or tragacanth gum or Arabic gum or acacia gum or any other gums to develop highly quality low-cost sanitary pads. This invention aims to recycle waste material like bagasse to develop natural and biodegradable, low-cost sanitary pads.

Calvem Energy Pvt Ltd: The objective of the project is to develop a rare earth magnet-free traction motor for electric vehicles that is environmentally sustainable, cost-effective, and efficient. It is proposed to develop and evaluate two variants of Reluctance synchronous motor: a conventional reluctance synchronous motor, and a ferrite-assisted reluctance synchronous motor. Further sub variants of these two variants will be developed.



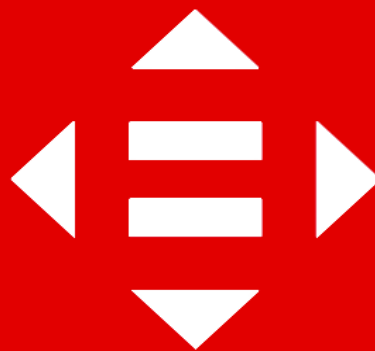
Innovations and stry related initiatives in the domain of low carbon technology:

a. University Temple - The on-campus temple building has an open access to the public and visitors while they are accessing the campus grounds.

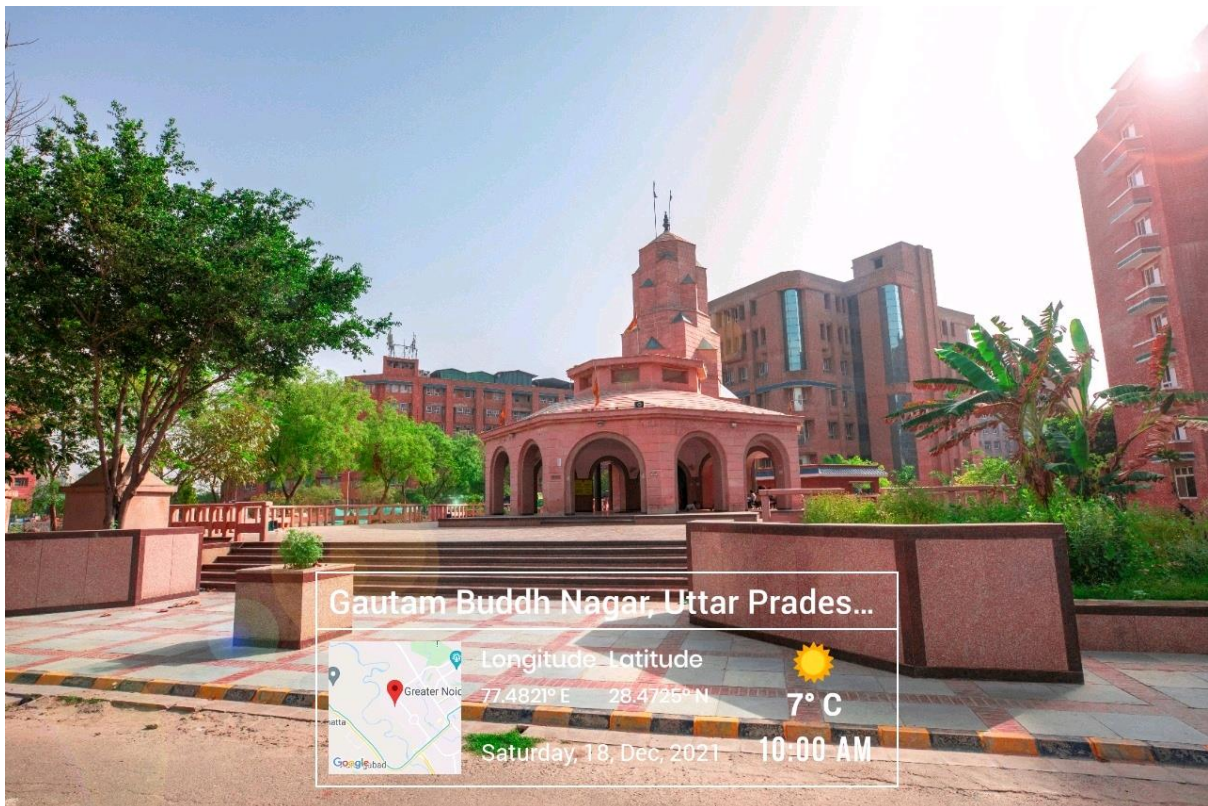


Fig 1 University temple complex

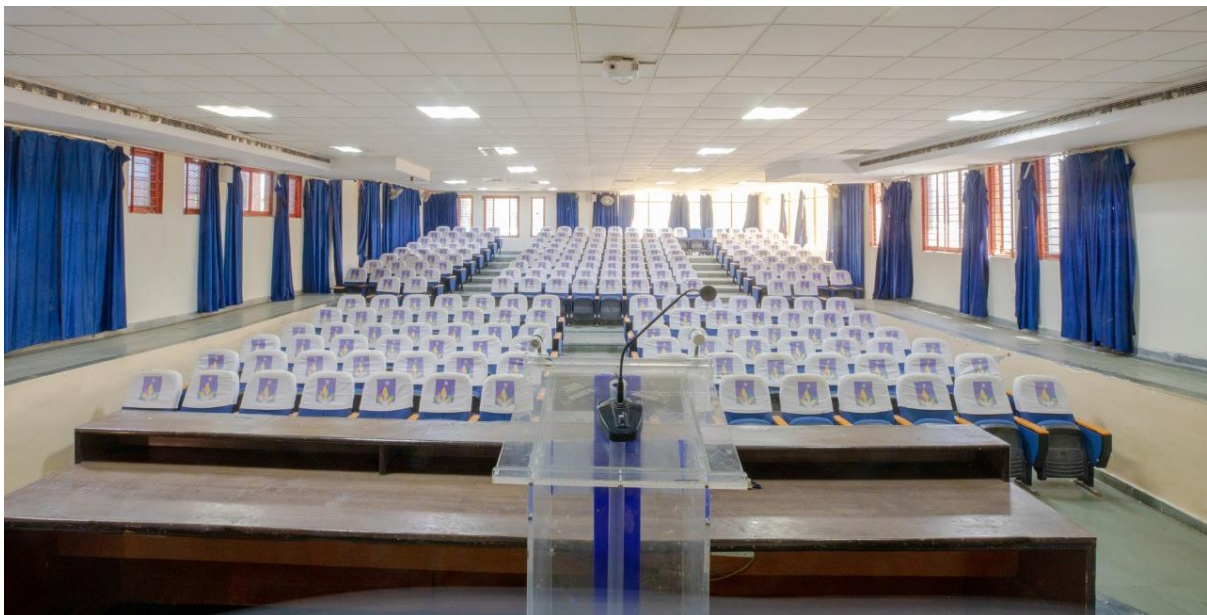


Fig 4 Vishveshwariya Auditorium

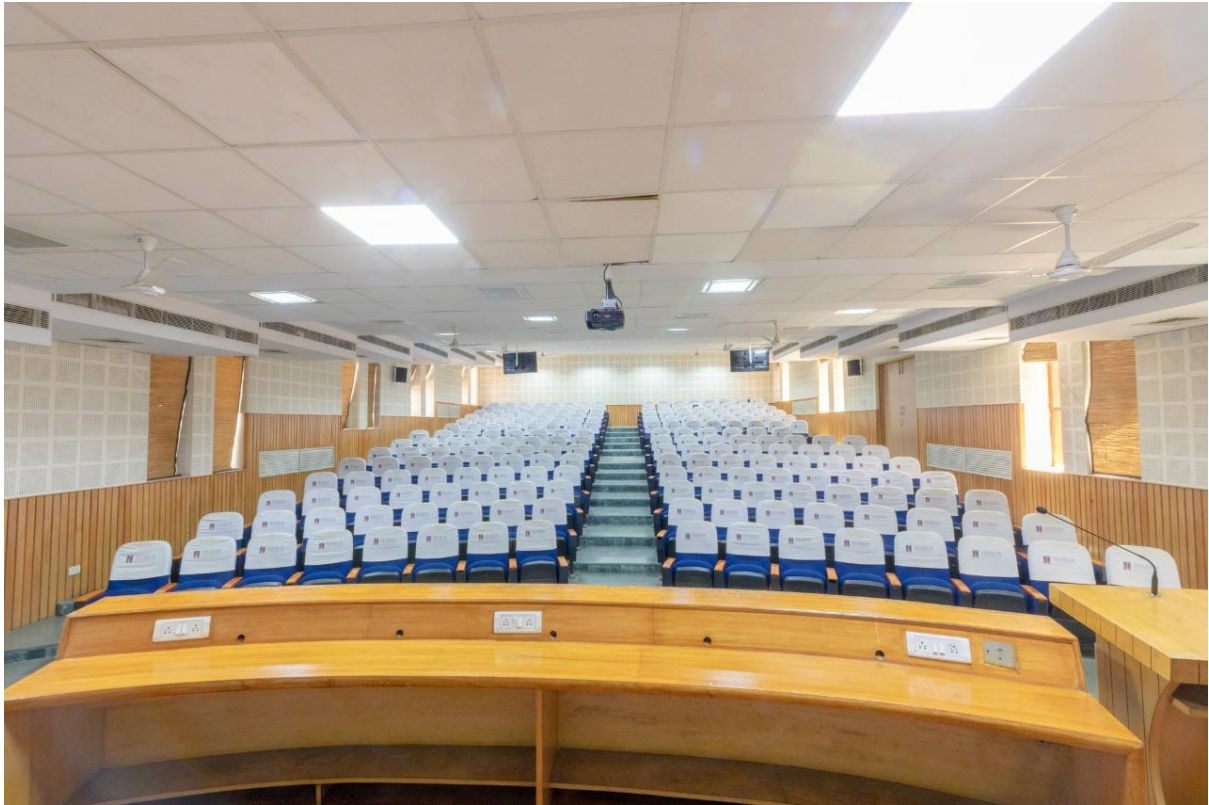


Fig 5 APJ Abdul Kalam Auditorium

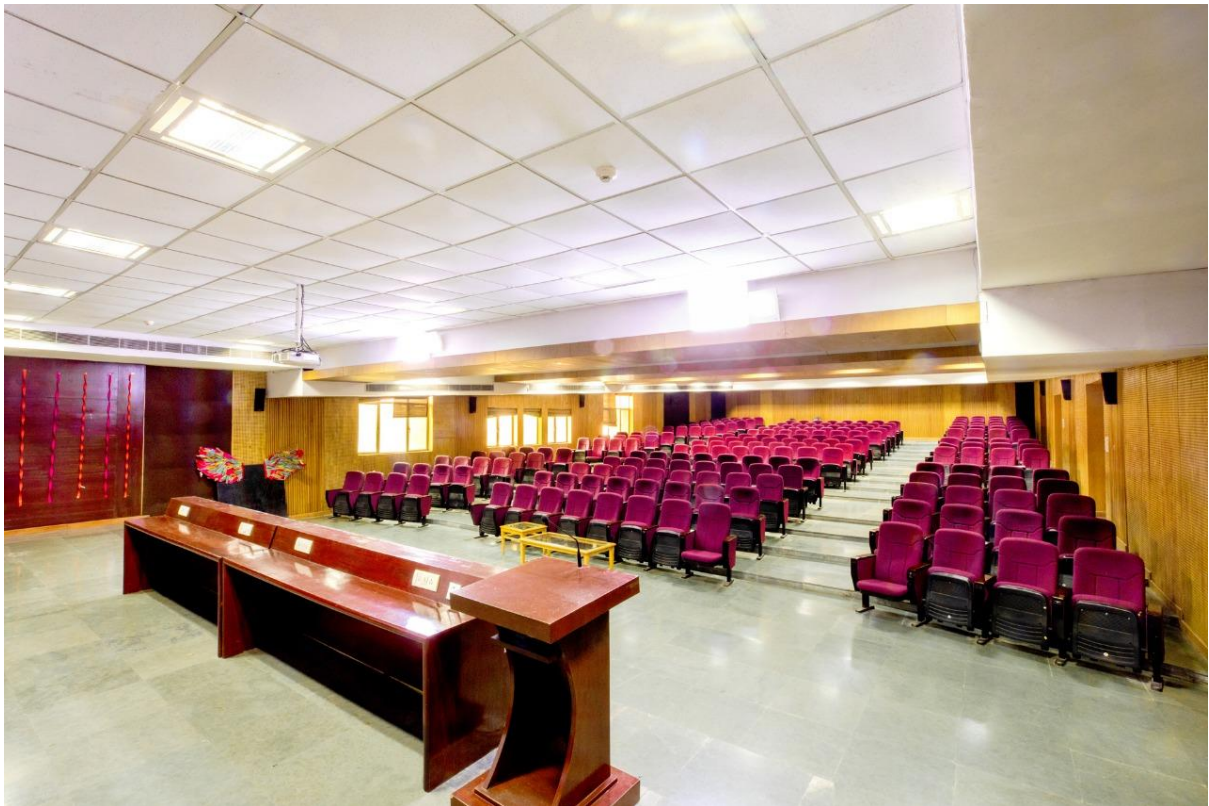


Fig 6 Auditorium at Sharda School of Business Studies

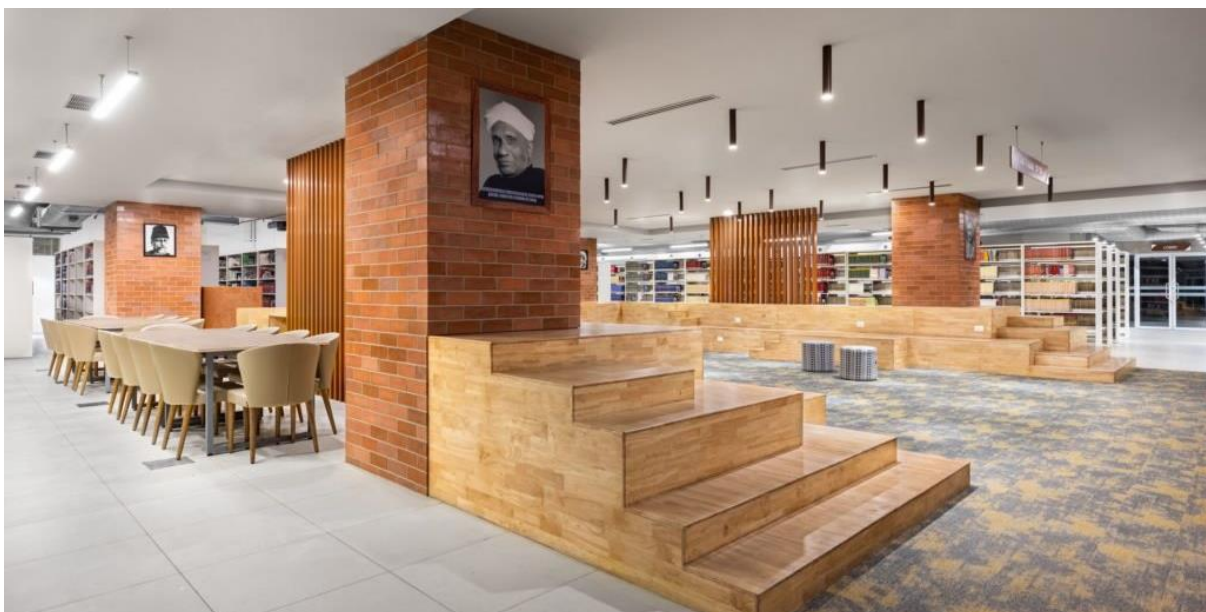


Fig 9 Central Library, Sharda University

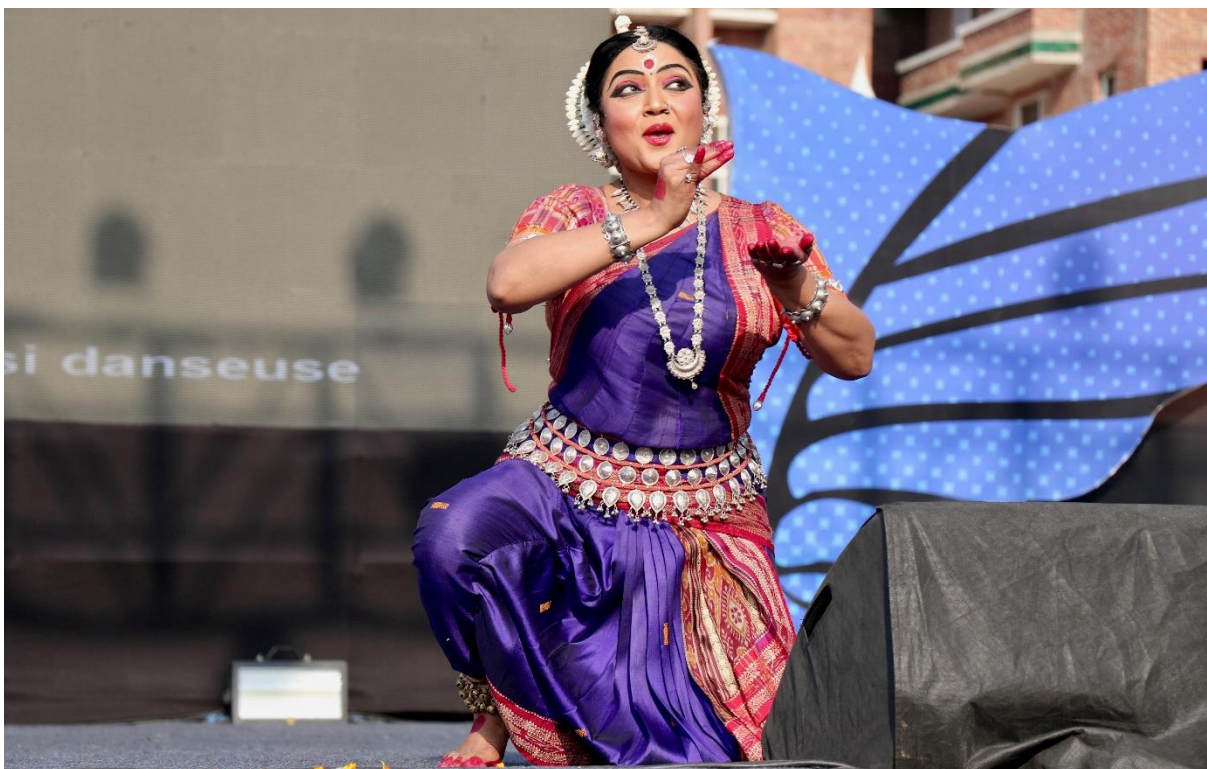


Fig 22 A performer from dance club

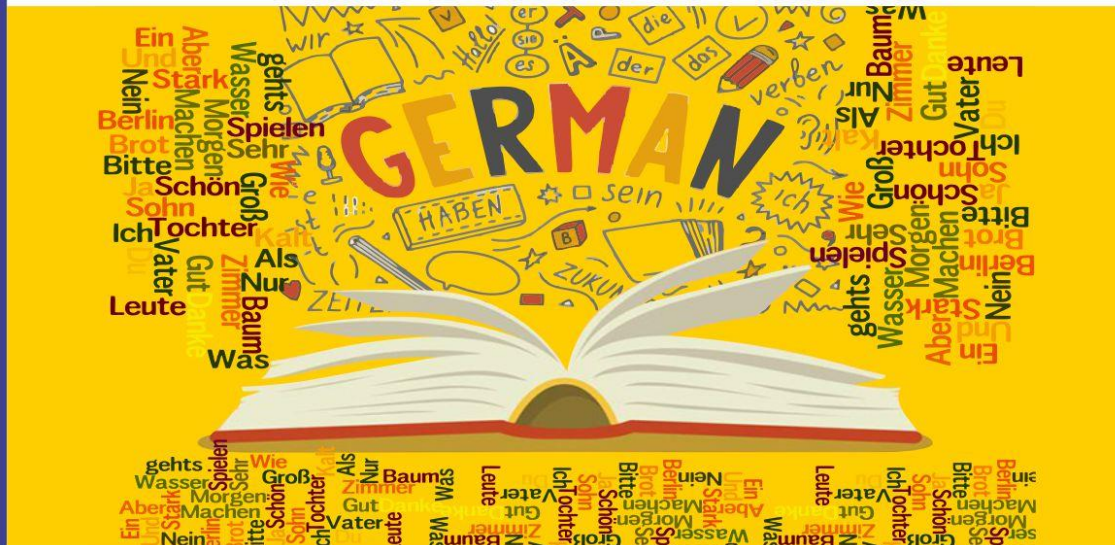

11.4 Sustainable Practices

The University has a focused approach for sustainable green practices on the campus, geared towards implementing environmentally conscious activities, having spin-off short- and long-term financial benefits. The University has adopted a conscious policy to introduce and evolve green practices to:

- Minimize soil, air, water and noise pollution through eco-friendly practices of natural resource conservation and to reduce human carbon footprints;
- Promote adoption and evolution of practices for environmental protection and direct social development for ensuring conditions for quality human life and health, apart from conservation of biological diversity and natural resources;
- Integrate credit-based courses/programmes, training, etc. in environmental sciences so that the University, as an agent of social change, could impact local and global environment;
- Ensure environment friendly infrastructure development, resource management and green buildings.

11.4.1 Sustainable practices targets

Measure and set targets for more sustainable commuting (walking, cycling or other non-motorized transport, vanpools, carpools, shuttlebus or public transportation, motorcycle, scooter or moped, or electric vehicles)

Response: Yes

Sharda University, in line with global sustainability goals and to promote eco-friendly commuting options, has set some goals and targets through implementing certain directives, promotions, enhanced infrastructure, community participation etc. Following is the list of targets that Sharda university aims to achieve in the near future

1. Enhancing Infrastructure for Non-Motorized Transport: In addition to the already existing pedestrian walkways and pedestrian friendly traffic in the campus, the university is planning to add dedicated bike lanes and secure parking facilities for bicycles and scooters to encourage more students and faculty to opt for non-motorized transportation.
2. Promotion of Electric Vehicles (EVs): Sharda university has set a target for increasing the number of inhouse electric vehicles, planning for charging stations on campus and encouraging the use of electric cars, scooters, and bicycles.
3. Electrification of existing Shuttle Bus Service: Sharda university has a shuttle bus service that connects the campus with nearby residential areas and public transportation hubs, reducing the need for private vehicles and promoting the use of public transport among students, faculty, and staff. The university is in process of replacing all the diesel operated buses with E-Buses.
4. Encouraging Carpooling and Vanpooling: Sharda university is planning to Introduce incentive programs for carpooling and vanpooling, such as designated parking spaces for shared vehicles, reduced parking fees, or other benefits to encourage more people to share rides and reduce the overall number of vehicles commuting to the university.

5. Partnerships with Public Transportation Authorities: The university is proposing collaboration with local public transportation authority to improve the frequency and accessibility of public transport options connecting the university to different parts of the city or region, encouraging more students and faculty to use public transportation for their daily commute.

Also, to make sure the effective implementation of these strategies the university will establish a department for monitoring and reporting the achieved targets for sustainable development goals. By setting and achieving these targets, Sharda University aims to contribute to a more sustainable and eco-friendly campus environment while also promoting the adoption of sustainable commuting practices among its students, faculty, and staff.

EVIDENCE –

Point 29: Green Practices for Commuting: The university shall continuously endeavour to adopt green practices in terms of transport and commuting like focusing on non-motorised transport, facilitating Electric Vehicles, usage of e-buses/CNG buses that are environment friendly, encouraging carpool and in the longer run focusing on collaborations with bus authorities for bus services.

11.4.2 Promote sustainable commuting

Sharda University demonstrates its commitment to sustainability and encourages its students, faculty, and staff to adopt more eco-friendly commuting practices, thereby contributing to a greener and more environmentally conscious campus community. The university has a dedicated shuttle service for students, faculty and staff thereby reducing the overall carbon footprint because of commuting. University also promotes researches related to sustainable commuting which has resulted in at least two researches namely- **Analysis of pedestrian behaviour due to faulty acts near metro station, Pari chowk Greater Noida and Cycleway as an alternative way in Knowledge**. At present, the university does not allow for remote working. Although, during the COVID-19 pandemic faculty and staff were working remotely and students were benefitting through online mode. Being an educational institute, the university thrives on physical presence and interaction between students and faculties, but also because of previous experiences the university is fully organized and capable to run an online as well as hybrid system of lectures.

The university is also targeting to allow remote working for some departments who are not directly involved in teaching and learning activities.

11.4.4 Affordable housing for employees

The university has not only distinguished itself as a prominent educational institution but also as a pioneer in employee welfare. 4.4.5 Quorum:

With the presence of 75% of members in a Selection Committee, it shall be considered that the Selection Committee was duly constituted.

4.5 COMPENSATION, ALLOWANCES AND INCREMENTS:**4.5.1 Pay Fixation**

The University, shall adopt a suitable pay fixation formula (including the allowances) keeping in view its financial commitments and the recommendations of the Pay Commission, from time to time.

However, in order to promote global standards of education and talent diversity, the pay package to the candidates with exceptional merit (for example: Ivy League qualification / teaching experience, international academic / research credentials), may be benchmarked with international compensation packages.

4.5.2 Pay Scale and Allowances

- (i) An employee holding a regular post substantively shall be placed in the appropriate scale of pay as prescribed by the university, from time to time.
- (ii) On substantive appointment, the initial basic pay in the scale shall be fixed at the minimum of the scale;

provided that the appointing authority may, on the recommendation of the Selection Committee, grant higher initial pay in the scale, as a special case.

- (iii) On appointment to a post involving higher duties and responsibilities, the basic pay of the higher scale may be fixed at a stage next above the notional pay arrived at, after adding one increment to the basic pay in the lower scale.
- (iv) In addition to the basic pay, an employee may be allowed to draw the following allowances:
 - a) 'Dearness Allowance' at the rates and subject to such conditions as the university may prescribe from time to time.
 - b) 'House Rent Allowance' at the rates as may be prescribed by the University from time to time.
 - c) 'Conveyance Allowance' wherever especially provided for in the appointment order.
 - d) 'Officiating Allowance' to the teaching staff for additional and substantial administrative responsibility discharged in accordance with the notification issued from time to time. A copy of the existing notification is at **Annexure-3**.

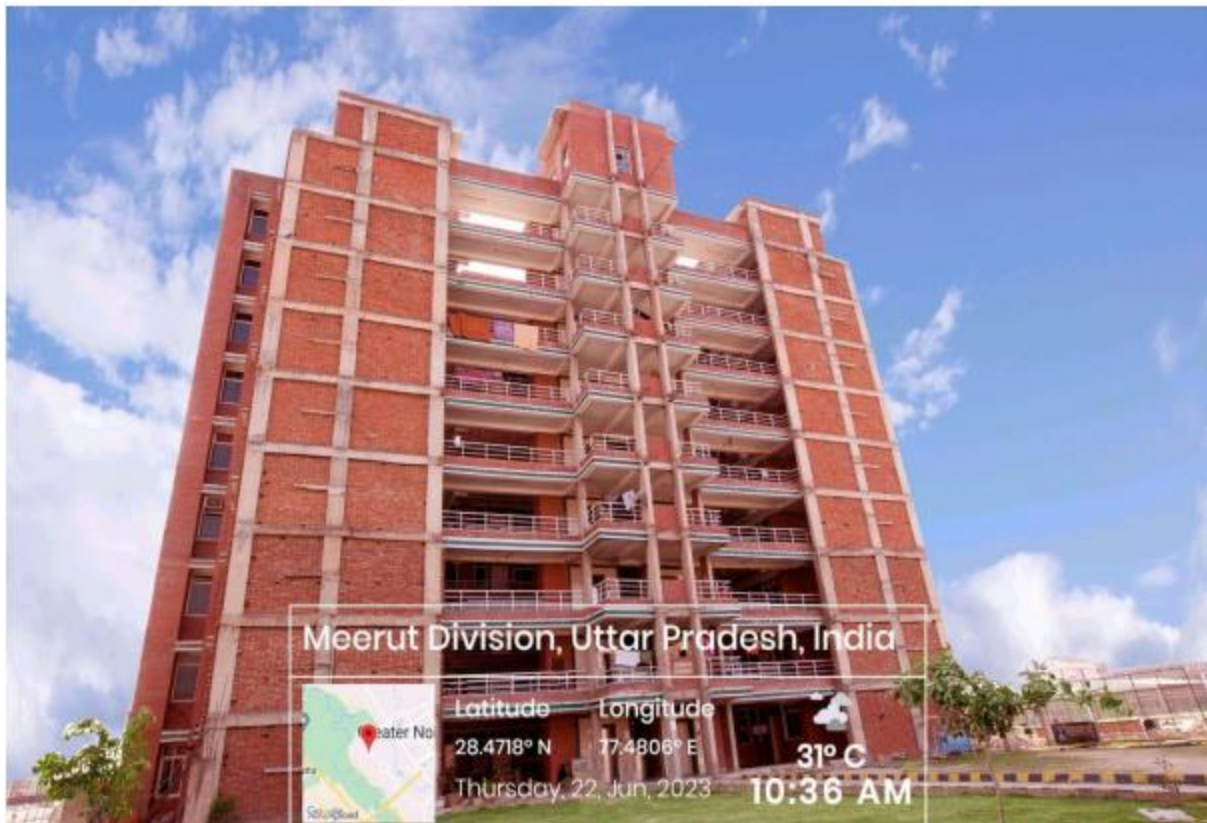


Fig 44 New Staff quarters Block 27

11.4.7 Local authority collaboration regarding planning and development

Work with local authorities to address planning issues and development, including ensuring that local residents are able to access affordable housing

Response: Yes

The university keeps working in constant collaboration with the local authorities through various collaborative and community-oriented approaches. The university also runs a community connect programme under which students and faculty of the university promoting deeper interactions between university and local communities for identification and solution of real-life problems faced by the communities in a spirit of mutual benefit. Following are the two major collaborative exercises done by the university-

1. Cycleway as an alternative way in Knowledge Park III

ABSTRACT - Pedestrian traffic accidents have become a severe safety issue around the world, particularly in emerging nations, due to increased population density, rapid urbanization, and insufficient attention to traffic laws by both drivers and walkers. Oncoming automobiles in the traffic flow are needed to pause in order to gain priority at the pedestrian crossing due to a lack of attention to pedestrian passing traffic limitations. Unrestricted motor vehicle mobility is indicated by unlimited bends, flyovers, and grade separators, putting people in danger. Enhance the speed of motorized vehicles to increase capacity and encourage a continuous flow, reducing their waiting time. Traffic accidents are caused by a variety of variables including road layout, vehicles, and pedestrians, including their interactions. The behavior on crossing of a pedestrian were observed in provision of adequate pedestrian services in the desirable place, including the improvement of their safety when passing the road. The results were achieved by analyzing pedestrian crossings before and after implementation. Pedestrians, as being the most vulnerable road users, this paper is mainly concerned about the behavior or act of pedestrian while crossing the road. The study area for this paper is taken near by the Pari chowk metro station, Pari chowk, Knowledge Park-3, Greater Noida, UP, India. On the basis of pedestrian count and their behavior, the study was done. Excessive speed, inefficient driver skill, failures to give pedestrians priority, drivers not respecting the right-hand rule, pedestrians not respecting traffic rules, drivers not respecting other road users, inadequate pedestrian awareness of traffic safety problems, due to poor road safety furniture, lack of sufficient walkway, and narrow streets are among the major contributing factors for road traffic violations in the study area. The findings also demonstrate that some local government actions, such as putting rumble strips and speed breakers in specific high-traffic locations and providing road users, particularly pedestrians, with training at schools and religious institutions, have reduced the number of traffic accidents.

2. Analysis of pedestrian behaviour due to faulty acts near metro station, Pari Chowk, Greater Noida

ABSTRACT - Cycleway has been used as an alternative way in many parts of the world. And lately it has been implemented in India as well. Places like Bengaluru, Pondicherry, and Chennai etc. have been using such modes for transportation for a while now. The scope of this idea being implemented in Knowledgepark is immense as the crowd over here is very suitable for this. The

majority of people in this region are students. Cycling can be a low cost, less virus transmitting mode of transportation. Also due to the small size of the targeted place (Knowledge park), this can be implemented more effectively and more people are likely to participate. There is increase in cycle use, and it is obvious that these gains are supposed to arise from individuals opting to pedal rather than drive. As a result of the growing interest, there are likely to be more demands for thorough examination of proposed schemes in terms of increased cycling levels, modal shift, and, ultimately, quantitative benefits to present and future cyclists. Local governments and others must be able to analyse cycling facilities in order to determine whether or not to invest in them and, in the event that finances are restricted, to choose between several systems. The models developed as a result of the study discussed in this paper are expected to be used to evaluate various cycle facilities and proposed schemes, estimate modal share repercussions, and assess investment benefits

3. 4th Technovation Hackathon & Innovation Budge 2022

Apart from the research collaborations the university hosts technical event 'Hackathon' focusing on technological advancement of cities. It was a technical event based on the parameters of making **Smart City**. The students worked on the following themes and came out with some feasible solution such as-

- Smart Health and Hygiene
- Smart Safety, Security and Surveillance
- Smart Transportation and pollution control
- Smart Citizen and Governance

1559 students participated in the event. There were prizes for students which were worth Rs 3.5 Lakh

University Practices

Sharda University, has a dual status as:

- (i) A microcosm inhabited by about 20000 humans engaged in many diverse activities over an area of mere 63 acres.
- (ii) An institution of higher learning and social change and orientation to impact local and global environment. It is thus necessary that the University adopt and evolve green practices.

Reduction in use of electricity:

The University will make all round effort to reduce the amount of electricity consumed for lighting, air-circulation, air-conditioning, lifts, water mining, instruments and other gadgets by the following approaches:

- Create awareness and inculcate the culture of using lights, fans, ACs and lifts only when and where necessary; to switch off the lights and other gadgets when leaving the room for more than five minutes in case of lights and fans and 30 min in case of ACs and to avoid use of lifts for going up lesser than two floors or going down lesser than three floors.
- Occupancy sensors will be installed in common areas to regulate the use of lights and fans when the area is not occupied for more than 3 minutes.

Innovation and Increase in generation and utilization of renewable energy:

Presently, the University has extensive solar power generation system producing a total of 1125 MWH per annum and has been awarded as Number One University in Uttar Pradesh in generation

and use of renewable energy. However, the University will harvest twice more solar energy and use it towards replacing traditional grid electricity.

Reduction in use of water:

The most important natural resource sustaining life on earth is water. A lot of water is wasted due to improper usage patterns and inefficient dispensing and storage systems. The following steps are will be taken to reduce the quantity of water used:

Sprinkler and drip irrigation systems are used irrigation of trees/plants/crops/lawns etc., wherever possible.

Water efficient taps/faucets/dispensers will be fitted and used to gradually replace existing ones if inefficient.

Open water storage and channel systems will be avoided.

Waterless urinals will be installed in new buildings.

Collection/Recycling/reuse of waste water:

The University has got rain-water harvesting systems in most buildings and also collects waste water that is treated in a STP plant of 0.40 MLD capacity. The treated water from the STP is used for irrigation purposes. This practice will continue and steps will be taken to further improve the collection and treatment of waste and its reuse.

Reduction in generation of biodegradable and non-biodegradable solid waste

The University generates solid waste of various kinds from the residences, hostels, offices, laboratories, canteens, hospital etc. The University takes steps to reduce the generation of solid waste.

Biodegradable waste is composted through a microbial process.

Four different types of composting system are available on campus.

A biogas plant is also functional.

Reduction in the use of mineral fuels and increased use of electric/solar powered motor vehicles, car-pools and bicycles

Recovery and reuse of paper/wood/ metal waste:

The University offices, faculty and students and on-campus businesses use large amounts of paper. Some of it is not usable as paper, but large amounts of unused paper is also discarded. The University will take steps to recover unused paper and recycle the used paper for product development for educational, artistic or commercial purposes.

Reduction in the use of mineral fuels

Increased use of electric/solar powered motor vehicles,

Car-pools

Bicycles

Safer disposal of electronic waste after extraction of useful components:

Electronic goods in all spheres of life, especially in communications, office equipment, laboratory instruments, televisions, computers, etc. are used. Large amounts plastic, Bakelite, integrated circuits, glass, transistors etc. are generated with discarded with old and defective gadgetry

Promotion of awareness of green practices and their importance among students and community:

Active student groups in each School and Hostels are constituted and coordinated by designated faculty. This activity is linked to the NSS as “Eco-Task Force”.

Creative use of solid waste for artistic and architectural designing:

The students in general and those in the School of Arts and Design are encouraged to use paper pulp, card boards, old wood, metal etc. to create art pieces based on themes related to various aspects of different States of India and other countries.

No-Noise Zone:

The University has extensive teaching zones, laboratories, offices and hospital areas, all of which are intolerant of noise. Therefore, the campus has been declared No-Noise Zone and signs of “No-Horn” and “Silence Zone” are placed strategically.

No-Smoking Zone

The University is a public place and legally smoking tobacco is banned as per law. “No Smoking” notices have been placed at strategic locations.

Reduction in Air Pollution:

- i. There is a ban on the burning of any materials including plant dry matter that emit smoke.
- ii. The dependence on diesel generators is minimized.
- iii. Dust Management - Covers and water spray

Introduction of green-building concept in existing and new buildings:

Most of the existing buildings of the University have large windows and corridor and have large verandahs and open spaces. Thus, the buildings are well ventilated and have good amount of natural lighting, with some exceptions.

Aware through Open Electives and Community Courses

The University may run an open elective course for creating awareness of various green practices and their importance for the environment and conservation of natural resources. The Community Connect Courses will be used to enable the students to learn the sources of pollution and systems for their management as well as to spread awareness on pollution control methods in the community.

Reduction in use of electricity:

The University makes all round effort to reduce the amount of electricity consumed for lighting, air-circulation, air-conditioning, lifts, water mining, instruments and other gadgets by the following approaches:

- Create awareness and inculcate the culture of using lights, fans, ACs and lifts only when and where necessary;
- Switch off the lights and other gadgets when leaving the room for more than five minutes in case of lights and fans and 30 min in case of ACs and to avoid use of lifts for going up lesser than two floors or going down lesser than three floors.
- Occupancy sensors will be installed in more common areas to regulate the use of lights and fans when the area is not occupied for more than 3 minutes.

Day Care Center for young children at Sharda University

'Little wing's Day Care' is a facility created by the University for high quality child care on campus for the children of faculty members, staff and senior students. Day care facility is being taken care of by senior faculty members. Full time female staff members are working for serving the children of all ages. The children are being taught during their stay time in the Day care facility. Different kinds of useful learning aids are available for the children. Parents of the children are also providing their feedback so as to improve the services regularly.



Biogas plant:

A biogas power plant is installed to facilitate undergraduate and post graduate students in the study and usage of renewable energy. The 15 cubic meter biogas plant is set up behind Mandela Hostel. Food waste of 100- 300 kgs approx per day drawn from Mess canteens and added with cow dung water mixture is used as raw material. The raw material content takes 3-4 days for biogas formation which is used to regenerate approx. 4KVA electric energy. Thus, food waste is converted into a resource and creating value in the form of electric power generation. The plant is utilizing the recent technology to generate the efficient energy.

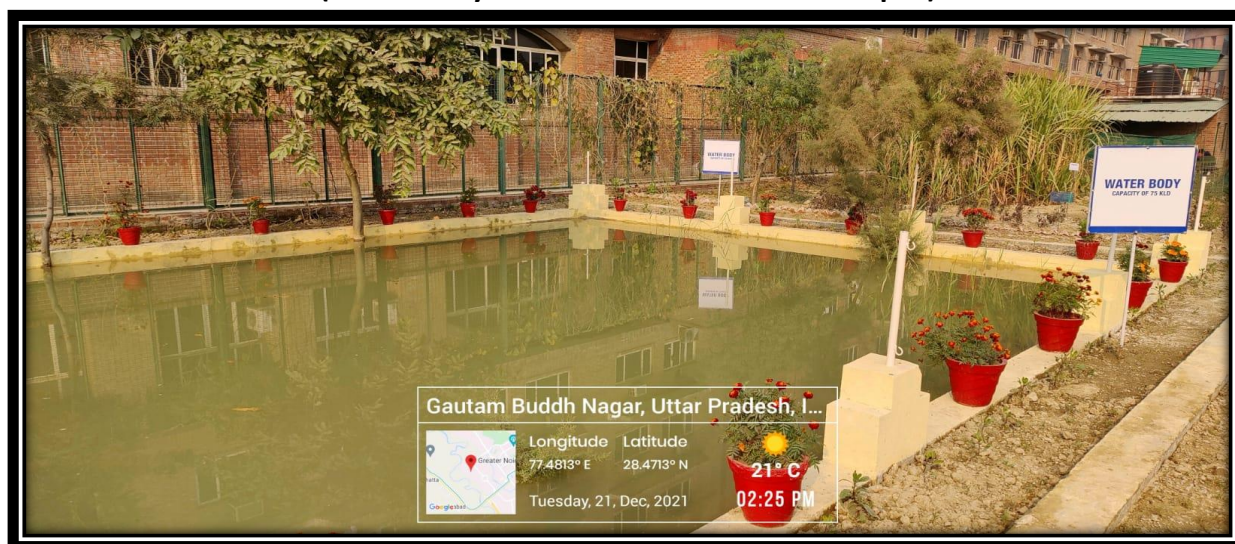

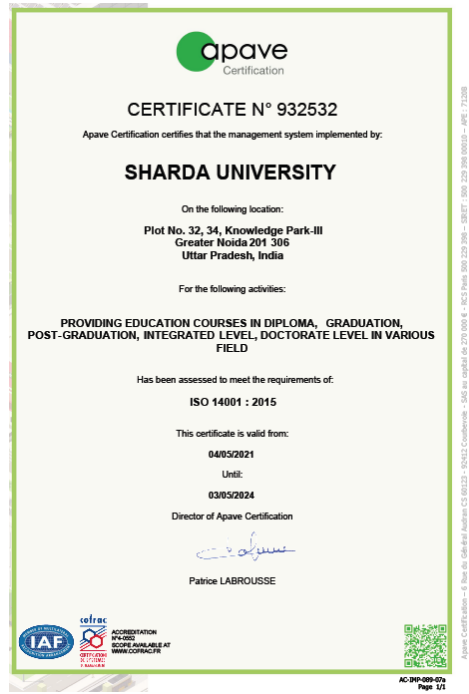
Maintenance of water bodies

13 CLIMATE ACTION



Sustainable Development Goal 13 focuses on taking urgent action to combat climate change and its impacts. The goal emphasizes the need for global cooperation to address the adverse effects of climate change and to build resilience against its impacts.

- **Inclusive Curriculum:**

At Sharda University, we undertake introducing students to the conceptual and theoretical aspects related to climatic change and related aspects, through subjects like Artificial Intelligence in Business Environment (DSC085), Biodiversity Conservation and Management (MWE210), Environmental Data Analysis (MWE252), Environmental Impact & Risk Assessment (MWE201), Global Climate System and Sustainable Development (MES109).

In line with the same, a number of events are conducted on a regular basis which focuses on the issues related to climatic change.

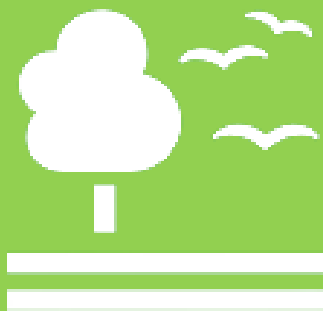

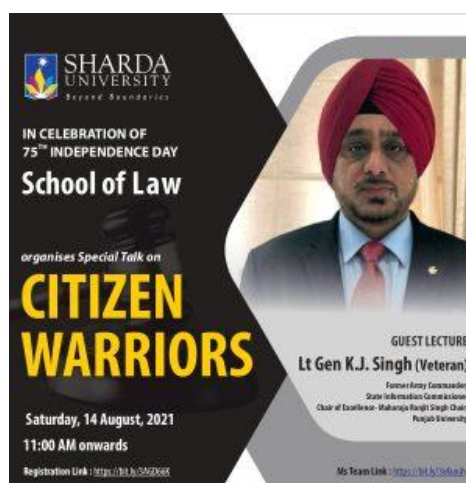
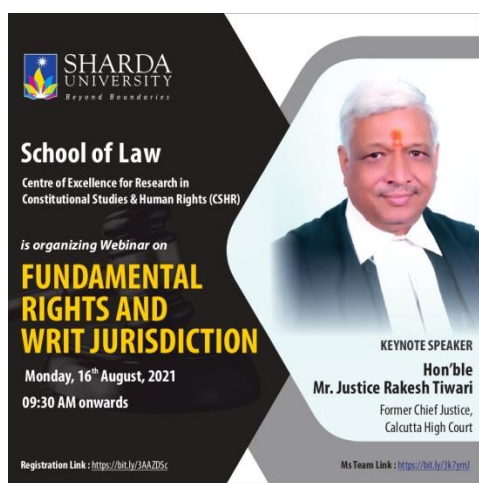
I. Inclusive Curriculum:

Additionally, a number of related events have been conducted for the overall exposure of the students to the concept of SDG 16 and allied areas.

- A webinar in collaboration with Association for Transgender Health in India was conducted in the name of **“DEMYSTIFYING GENDER -FOSTERING GENDER FRIENDLY ENVIRONMENT”**. The main objectives of the event were

The '02 Days Workshop on Process & Skills for Moot Court Competition from February 24th to 25th, 2022, was a vital stepping stone for law students. The '6th Anand Swaroop Gupta Memorial Virtual International Moot Court Competition' from March 31st to April 2nd, 2022, showcased the university's global outlook and commitment to preparing students for international legal challenges. Moot court competitions play an essential role in fostering the skills required for advocating justice and contributing to SDG 16.

On April 8th, 2022, the university hosted the '4th Mock Parliament Competition' centered on the agenda of a 'Uniform Civil Code.' This event encouraged students to engage in debates and discussions surrounding legal reforms and justice, aligning well with the pursuit of SDG 16.

A 'Guest Lecture on Ambedkar and Social Justice in the 21st Century' on April 13, 2022, paid tribute to the father of the Indian Constitution, Bharat Ratna Dr. B.R. Ambedkar. The lecture delved into the crucial role of social justice and equality in creating a just society.

Sharda University continued its commitment to fostering knowledge and understanding by hosting a 'Webinar on Laws Without Flaws' on April 27th, 2022. This event delved into the nuances of lawmaking, ensuring that strong and just legal frameworks underpin society.

The 'Intra Moot Court Competition, 2022' from August 31st to September 2nd, 2022, was another testament to the university's dedication to nurturing future legal professionals. Moot court competitions are instrumental in preparing students to contribute effectively to the legal landscape, promoting justice and strong institutions.

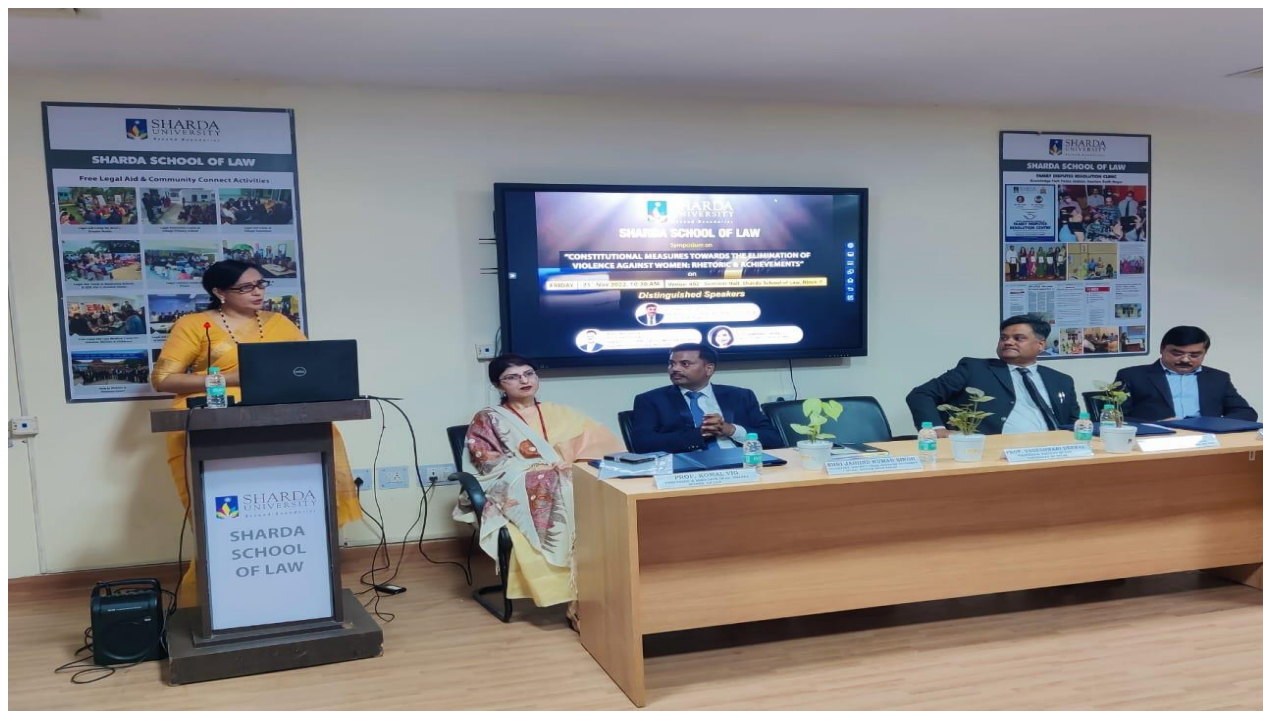

4. Family Dispute Resolution Clinic: A Transformative Force for Peace and Justice in Collaboration with Gautam Budh Nagar Police and Sharda University School of Law

FDRC, the Family Dispute Resolution Clinic, stands as a remarkable initiative born from a collaborative partnership between the Gautam Budh Nagar Police and the School of Law at Sharda University. Dr. Ritu, the visionary founder and coordinator of FDRC, has been at the helm for the past three years, leading this unique endeavor since its inception in July 2020. The clinic's track record is nothing short of inspiring, having positively impacted over 900 families to date and remaining steadfast in its commitment even during the tumultuous times of the three waves of the Covid-19 pandemic. This unwavering dedication earned FDRC recognition as one of the innovative initiatives by the Uttar Pradesh Government.

Under the guidance of Dr. Ritu, the clinic has conducted an impressive 3500+ counseling sessions, achieving a remarkable success rate of 86% and above for three consecutive years. Dr. Ritu's exemplary performance has not gone unnoticed, as she received commendations twice in 2020, 2021, and 2022 from the Commissionerate of Police, Gautam Budh Nagar. Her contributions have extended beyond regional boundaries, with accolades from the National Commission for Women and the prestigious ITC Nari Shakti Award. Her dedication also earned her appreciation from luminaries like CJI Justice N.V. Ramanan and Law Minister Kiran Rijiju. The Family Dispute Resolution Clinic operates diligently, providing counseling services every Friday and Saturday, and even the challenging circumstances posed by the Covid-19 pandemic did not deter the team's commitment to their duty. Remarkably, the clinic boasts an 83.44% success rate in resolving family disputes over the past two and a half years. The team's dedication and exceptional results have garnered attention and praise from various quarters, making FDRC a prominent and influential entity in the field of family dispute resolution.

In conclusion, Sharda University's multifaceted efforts in 2022 underscored its holistic commitment to making a positive impact on society and the world. These activities demonstrated the institution's dedication to creating a world marked by peace, justice, and strong institutions.

17.4.2 Education for SDGs specific courses on sustainability

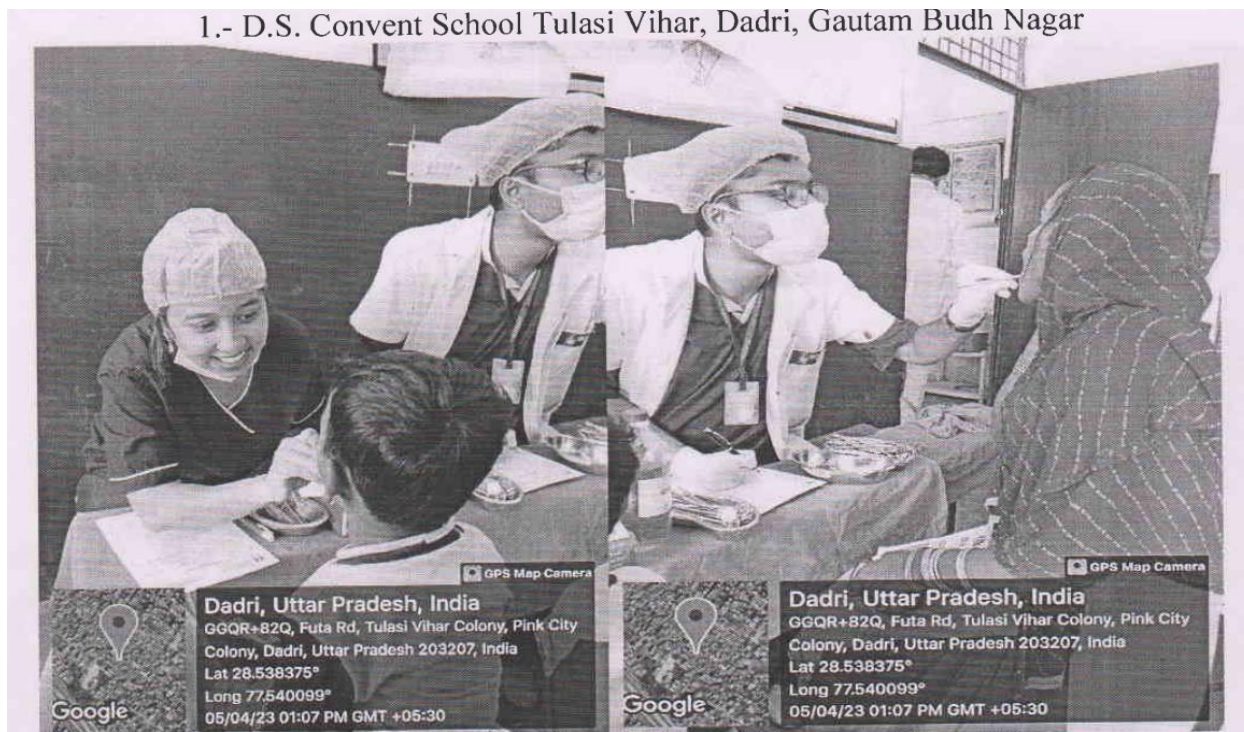

Sharda University has been actively engaged in providing education for SDGs in the wider community through its meticulously developed outreach activities. Some of them are as follows:

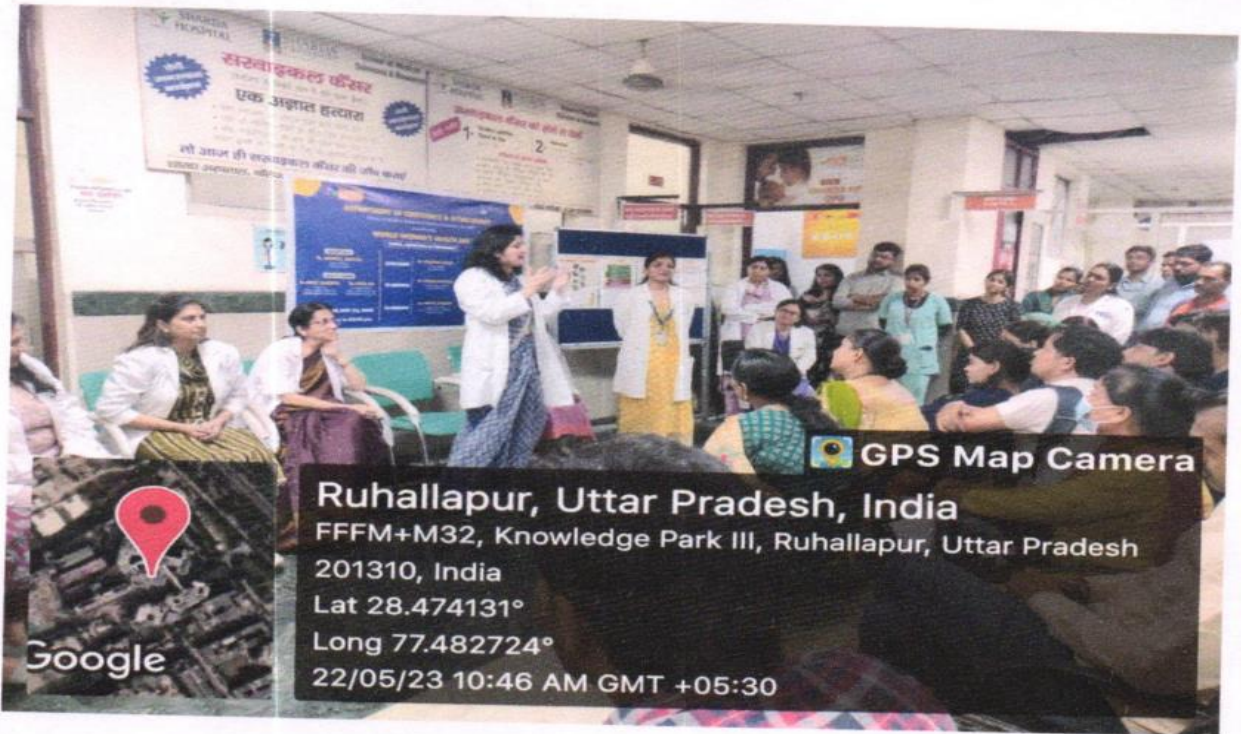
